Hoover Top Man In Oil Diplomacy

Washington (NEA) — The sudden illness of John Foster Dulles will bring little comfort to anyone hoping for a weakening or softening of America's position in the world.

As the reins of the State Department pass to the hands of Herbert Hoover, Jr., the Under Secretary of State, there will not be the slightest change in the pace or direction of U.S. foreign policy.

President Roosevelt bought this insurance more than two years ago when he personally selected the tough, silent son of the former President of the United States to take over the vital No. 2 spot in the State Department.

The Secretary made sure Hoover would be qualified if he ever had to take over completely by giving him an absolutely free hand to run things during Dulles' many absences.

And Hoover himself justified the hope which the State Department had in grasping the complex problems of the department in an amazingly short time and administering the department with an efficiency it has seldom experienced.

Hoover looks like a polished diplomat. And when it's necessary he can act like one. He is handsome, tall and erect. His steel gray hair, neat, well-cut, double-breasted suit add to the air of culture and reserve which he exudes.

He does not smile much. But neither does he ever lose his temper.

What does not show through this glossy exterior is his hardiness and limitless drive. These qualities were developed while Hoover was building a multi-million dollar petroleum engineering firm at remote, dirty oil fields around the world.

Hoover is one of the few men in Washington who has announced that he does not want personal publicity, and means it. This has kept him out of the public eye, but has also proved that he is not interested in a future political career beyond his present position.

All his life young Hoover has worked hard to escape the shadow of his father's prominence. And this effort is apparent in his retiring, almost anti-social attitude.

Although Hoover has not been the darling of the cocktail set and from any social activity, one of his big assets has been the people he knows in important places around the world. This knowledge has frequently been of great value to the department.

In the current crisis in the Middle East Hoover's intimate knowledge of the complexities of the international oil business is invaluable. Oil politics is one of the roots of the trouble there.

Hoover first came to the attention of President Roosevelt by playing a key role in solving the Iranian oil crisis. He was able to accomplish this because he had previously won the respect of all parties concerned by the honest operation of his petroleum engineering firm.

Despite Hoover's attempt to keep out of the public eye, which he has done successfully, he has managed to develop some ardent enemies since taking over the second spot at the State Department.

There are those who claim he has "killed" several serious "blunders." There are those who disagree that the Dulles foreign policy and naturally don't like anyone who has a hand in directing it.

And there are those who just don't like the name of Hoover.

But Hoover has chosen to ignore his critics and enemies. He has been content with the approval of his efforts. And he is also apparently ready to go back to his private life which he seems to prefer whenever that time might come.

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Silent Senator Hayden Still Dean of Congress

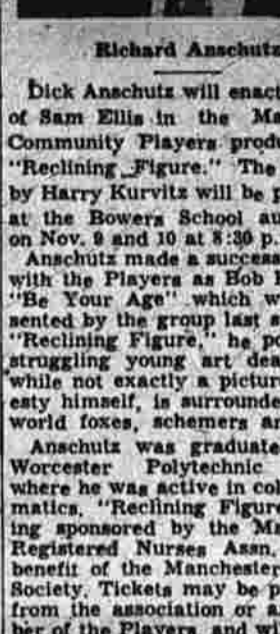
Phoenix, Ariz., Nov. 8 (AP)—Carl Hayden, Arizona's 78-year-old "Silent Senator," is going back to Washington as dean of Congress. He hasn't said anything about this new honor. No one expects he will.

With the retirement of Sen. Walter George of Georgia, the Senate's senior legislator, Hayden becomes the oldest lawmaker on the hill in point of service. He outranks house speaker Sam Rayburn by one year, having started as a freshman representative in 1912, the year Arizona became a state.

Honored for Drought Role
Just a few days ago, Hayden was honored by a Feed Dealers Assn. for his efforts to help Arizona cattlemen get drought relief. He was introduced by a prominent state politician and eulogized at length. Hayden got up and said: "I learned a long time ago that when you've got the votes, you don't have to talk."

Then he sat down.
Back in Washington, Hayden's Appropriations Committee. He almost always pleads the press of business to avoid going to parties and rarely makes a speech.

"When I came to Congress an old hand told me that I could play for the headlines and be a show horse, or I could buckle down and be a work horse," Hayden explained. Oregon Gives Democrats Five Congress Seats

Portland, Ore., Nov. 8 (AP)—Oregon will have a Democratic governor next year and will be represented in Congress by five Democrats and only one Republican.

Holmes, a state senator and Astoria radio station manager, who was swept into office as voters rejected Sen. Wayne Morse as a Democrat and gave a routing majority to President Eisenhower.

Gov. Elmo Smith, over Republican victory, reflected the recent Democratic swing in voter registration in the state. The governor-elect staged a strong campaign after Barry, winning the Democratic primary last May despite the fact that his only opponent withdrew from the race before the election.

In that contest, his opponent was Law Wallace, veteran Democratic office worker, who pulled out of the race because of ill health in 30 of Oregon's 36 counties.

Holmes, 47, the new Democrat elected Oregon governor, since 1934, is married and the father of two sons, 21 and 18. He served four sessions in the state senate, where his special interest was in the field of education. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon, where he studied journalism.

Gov. Elmo Smith, the man he will succeed, assumed the governorship early this year upon the death of Gov. Paul Patterson. Rep. Walter Workford is the only Republican to survive the Democratic congressional landslide.

U.S. Voters Saw Little Difference in Parties

By JAMES MARLOW
Washington, Nov. 3 (AP)—What the elections proved seems simple enough, although men who make a living analyzing voting habits will come up with plenty of psychological jargon and scientific formulae.

The voters liked President Eisenhower far more than they did Adlai Stevenson, and more than they liked the Republican party. Otherwise they couldn't see much difference between Democrats and Republicans.

The evidence is plain enough: Eisenhower won overwhelmingly, but his Republicans were beaten by the Democrats for control of Congress. The Democrats won only the slimmest margin, capturing just enough of the 531 seats to take control.

Nevertheless, the voters have been twice as professedly Democratic as they were in 1954 and again this year gave the Democrats control.

The Democrats and Republicans as parties are almost identical, both stand for moderate extensions of the New Deal and Fair Deal. Beyond that they don't differ. The Republicans, after years of anticommunism and of the social

Police Seek Escapes in Boston Area

Four men who escaped from a state prison in Walpole to Suffolk Superior Court, Boston, when they pulled out "gun guns," a contraption secretly made in a prison shop which can be fired with elastic bands.

They returned \$10 when Mahoney complained he had no money with which to get home.

Mahoney's car, a gun and the body chains which linked Moylan and Feney were found abandoned nearby.

A set of handcuffs still dangling from Moylan's left wrist when he was picked up by a patrolman who recognized him.

Moylan said he was unaware there was to be an escape until he was handed a "gun" in the prison vehicle.

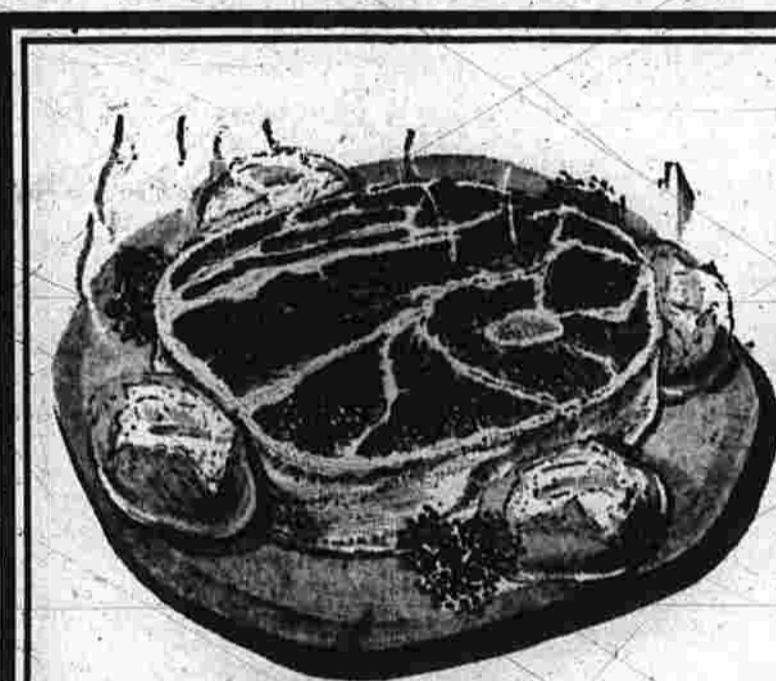

Red Paper Sees Ike Victory but Defeat for GOP

London, Nov. 8 (AP)—The Moscow Radio said today the American election results were a personal victory for President Eisenhower but a resounding rejection of the policies of the Republican party.

"It is still too early to draw any exhaustive conclusions from the results of the U.S. elections but already many American political observers stress that the victory is due primarily to Eisenhower's personal popularity, connected with the part he played during World War II as well as such measures as for example, his participation in the Geneva conference of the heads of government of the four great powers."

"The home and foreign policy pursued by the Republican administration in recent years, does not meet with the approval of the majority of the American people. That is how one can appreciate the results of the congressional elections. American electors voted not against the Democrats as such, but against the Republicans, thus denouncing their disapproval of the political course of the ruling party."

The Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda reported Eisenhower's reelection without comment in a five paragraph dispatch from the Soviet news agency Tass New York office. The item appeared on the next to the last page of Pravda's 8-page edition.

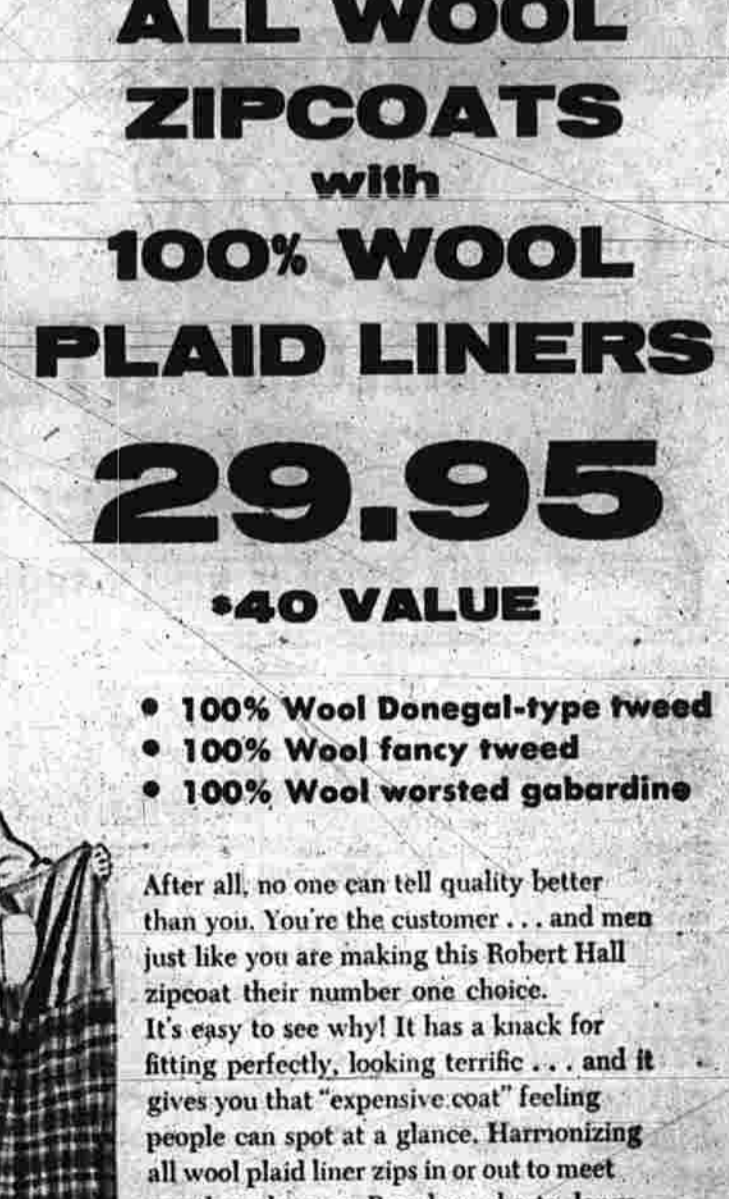
