**Rockville-Vernon PHNA Drive Nets \$5,900; Late Contributions Awaited**

Rockville, Nov. 15 (Special)—A total of \$5,900 was collected during the recent fund drive of the Rockville Public Health Nursing Assn., according to Seymour E. Lavitt, drive chairman.  
Lavitt said contributions yet to come in may bring the total to about \$6,300. The amount collected directly to the PHNA office, 13 Park St., was \$5,900. He said but emphasized this is the largest sum ever collected in the association's annual fund drive.  
Lavitt pointed out that city residents gave a lower average per person donation than Vernon and Ellington residents. Of 3,000 names on the Rockville lists a total of \$2,242.25 was received which, he said, averages out to 75 cents per person. In the rural Vernon canvass a total of \$1,103.15 was collected from 1,283 potential givers, or an average of 86 cents per person, and in Ellington \$1,017 was collected from 1,100 potential givers for an average of 92 cents per person.  
Special gifts amounted to \$75, business and professional gifts \$127, and associations \$172, he said.

**Tax Hike Not Asked In New State Budget**

Highway expenditures of \$14.2 million mark a jump of \$34 million over those voted for the present 2-year period coming to a close. This is made possible through greater tax and other revenue flowing into the treasury.  
Budget Director Schuchman, in backing up the budget figures, said he is also able to present a balance sheet which shows that the state is also able to pay off on all new taxes by not figuring on new and higher expenses which will most certainly be voted by the Legislature.  
It is virtually certain that Governor Blodgett will ask the Legislature next year to include a budget which will call for no new taxes. To do this the Governor will be able to advocate only a small increase in new services and in state employee pay brackets. Thus, he will leave it up to the Legislature to be under strict GOP control, if needed, to underwrite them.  
In turn, the Republican Legislature next year get around the new tax possibility by claiming that the state is already under a low side and that a sufficient gap exists to add new spending without raising taxes. This would present the Governor with a tight budget administration in order to avoid a deficit.  
Both parties in the past have used this device.  
Major budget increases in the proposed budget include:  
Bond interest and retirement, \$30 million—up \$6.4 million;  
State Real Estate Tax, \$4.1 million—up \$1.7 million; grants to towns for education and school buildings, \$62 million—up \$7 million; teachers' retirement, \$14.6 million—up \$4 million; department, \$202.2 million—up \$23.5 million; and welfare, \$73 million—up \$8 million.  
The program also calls for \$55.7 million in bonds for new buildings.

### The Doctor Says

**Basal Metabolism Test is Aid in Studying Thyroid**

I S. asks, "What does a basal metabolism test prove? If a person's test shows minus 22, is it serious? Can it be treated successfully? Will smoking hurt?"

The basal metabolism test serves as an aid in studying the action of the thyroid gland. This gland, lying at the base of the neck, in the presence of certain abnormalities of this gland, particularly the disorder known as toxic goiter, the result of the test is expressed as a plus figure. If the gland is underactive, the result is given as a minus figure.

The metabolism test is simple enough for the patient. After a good night's sleep, he goes to the doctor's office, laboratory or hospital without eating any breakfast or drinking anything. The patient lies down on a bed or cot, and breathes normally through a tube. What is breathed in and out is measured and recorded. There is no danger of suffocating, as some nervous people seem to fear. Nor is the test hard on the heart.

The calculations are made afterwards. The patient's height and weight must also be known. These figures are put together in a formula and the final calculation tells whether one is burning the body tissues too rapidly, too slowly, or at a normal rate. When the doctor gives the results, he says the metabolism was plus or minus so much.

The basal metabolism is only one method of testing the activity of the thyroid gland. Ordinarily, however, a figure for the basal metabolism between minus 15 and plus 15 is considered about normal.

If the metabolism is much more than plus 15, one is probably using up food and tissues too fast. This may explain nervousness and loss of weight. Usually (but not always), this is the result of a toxic goiter, and medical or surgical treatment may be needed.

A basal metabolism record as minus 22 is what doctors call a "border-line" figure. In some cases in whom this figure is found may or may not improve if he is given thyroid extract by mouth. It should probably not be considered as really "serious." If it is the result of lowered thyroid action, it can be corrected simply by giving thyroid pills in the right quantities.

It is probable that smoking does not exert any specific harmful effects.

Over the years, the basal metabolism test has been of enormous help to physicians in making a diagnosis and in observing the results of treatment.

### Reds Seen Planning Revision of Policies

 Vienna, Nov. 15 (AP)—Communist leaders in the Hungarian revolution appear to be planning a revision of their policies.

In the satellite world, it seems likely the Iron Curtain will be patched up where it is possible and remain broken where that cannot be avoided, pending a slow approach toward re-establishing firm control throughout the empire.

Outside, it seems likely Moscow's policy will harden once again, in a Stalinist way. Russian military might has won a victory in Hungary but it lost a telling political battle. The revolution now is in the free world has given communism a setback from which it may never recover.

Communism now is more difficult to sell in free countries. The Russians perhaps will fall back on small hard Communist cores abroad, concentrating on harassment and subversion and giving up the attempt to bring the whole of Europe under their control.

### Baby Attendant Sentenced To 10-22 Years on Slayings

New Haven, Nov. 15 (AP)—Babbed back and forth until his eyes attendant Virginia Japers, her blonde hair away and her face red and tear-streaked, was led from a courtroom yesterday to begin serving 10 to 22 years in prison.

Miss Japers, 33, was convicted of the fatal slaying of two of the infants she cared for.

A big woman, she weighs 220 and stands six feet. She entered the courtroom smiling, and joked with attendants.

She sat with her plump arms folded tightly over her blue sweater as a state's attorney read her confession. She heard in her own words of the "uncontrollable urge" that made her grasp 11-month-old Abby Kaplowitz by both arms, press her thumbs against the tiny chest, and shake the child violently.

That was last August. She did the same to two-month-old Jennifer Malkin in 1953. Both died. Police said she admitted killing a third child—too long ago to allow prosecution.

She heard her own words, the closest she ever came to offering a motive: "I guess I was angry in my own mind because they wouldn't stop crying."

She heard her lawyers tell about her childhood, when because of her size and awkwardness, she was the butt of cruel jokes. She heard about her adolescence, when she had "no social life at all" and she heard of her life as an adult, when she showed an all-consuming love for babies, collecting their pictures, buying them presents, spending all her time caring for them.

Termed "Physical Mink" by a "physical mist" in society from childhood and a "violet" by the own size.

She heard how she shook the Malkin baby until "its head bobbed."

### Marine Pleads Guilty to Hitting Dozen Recruits

Parra Island, S. C., Nov. 15 (AP)—Marine Pfc. Frederick A. Renton, accused of more than a dozen cases of striking and mistreating recruits at this sprawling Marine base, pleaded guilty at his court-martial trial yesterday to two specifications of two charges against him.

Several more charges remained against the 19-year-old New York City youth as the trial entered its second day.

Renton pleaded guilty yesterday to forcing two recruits to perform manual physical exercises at the point of a naked bayonet.

He admitted forcing Pvt. Robert A. Palama and Clement R. Ploof Jr. to suspend themselves from their elbows and toes while the point of a bayonet was held under their stomachs.

Renton was accused of holding the bayonet himself in the case of Palama while another recruit, Edward E. Jensen Jr., allegedly was forced to do it in the case of Ploof.

Another trainee, Joseph W. Androlowicz, testified that he beat another recruit on the instigation of Renton.

Pvt. Harry Dunevant told the court that he was beaten up in a shower room. He testified that though he was "dazed and bleeding," Renton, who was the non-commissioned officer on duty at the time, refused to see to it he got medical aid.

Another recruit, Pvt. Richard J. Burke of Cleveland, Ohio, testified that he was struck by Renton because he went to sleep in class.

Pvt. B. C. Howe of Northampton, Mass., testified that he was hit twice in the stomach for being slow in taking his mattress out of a barracks to air.

Since charges have been filed against Renton, he has been reduced in rank from corporal to private first class and has been restricted to the base. He could get a total of 20 days and six months if found guilty of all the specifications against him.

The husband mother entered the hospital voluntarily Oct. 1 for observation and tests which normally take 30 days. She left at her own request and against the advice of hospital officials Oct. 18.

No Symptoms of Psychosis "During the short time that Mrs. Ruotolo was observed, she presented no symptoms showing mental illness or psychosis and was believed at the time she applied for her release, there were no indications for this hospital to seek any additional comment."

"We realize that this observation period was very short and there though no overt symptoms of mental illness were present during this time, it is quite possible that symptoms might fall into present at some future time."

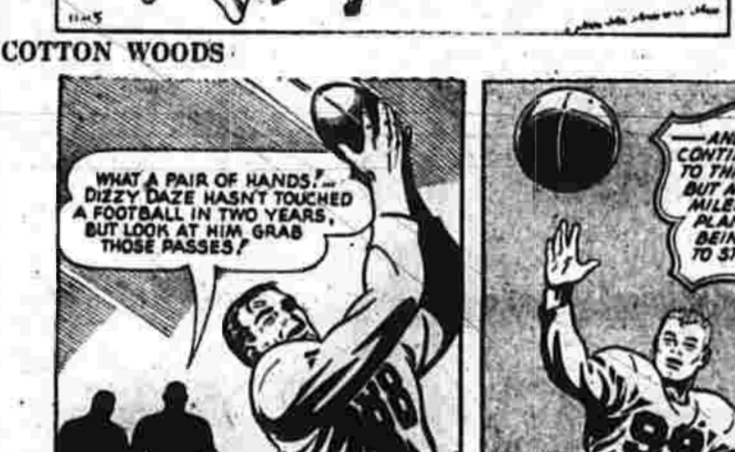
