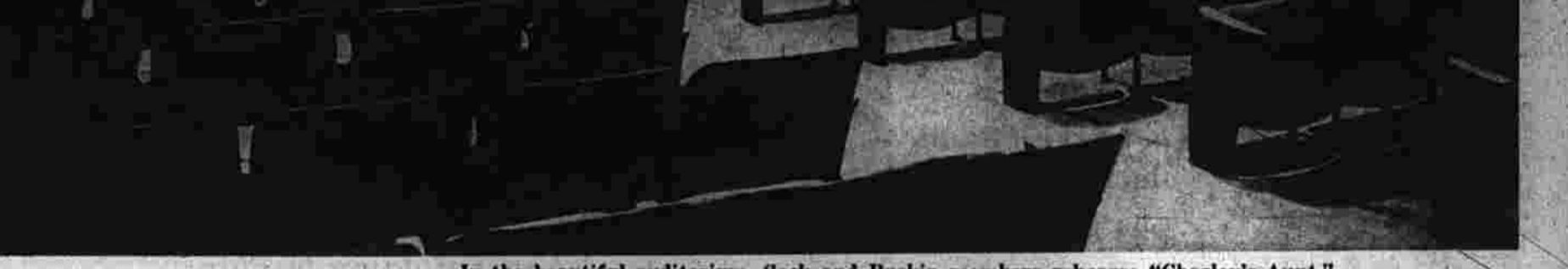

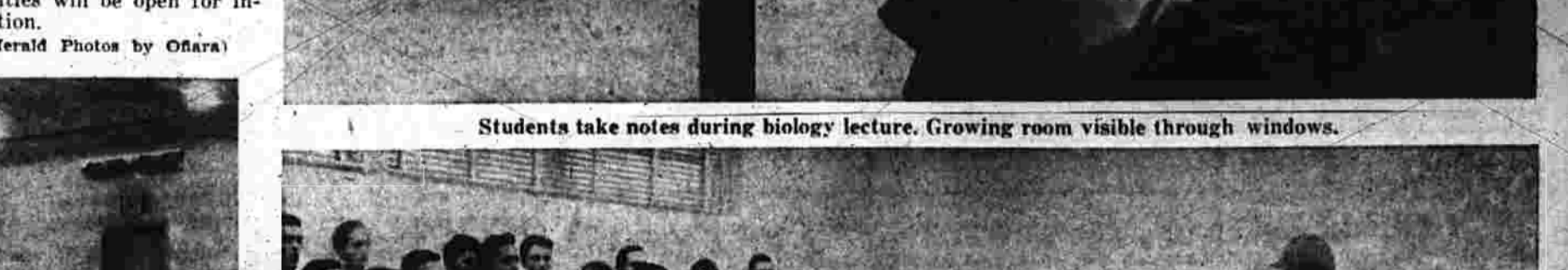

An Equal Compassion?

Hamid Bourguiba, premier of Tunisia, made a broadcast the other day. He expressed regret over the arrival of the United Nations Police Force units in Egypt, hoping that would lead to a peaceful solution of that crisis.

He said, next, that his police units could be sent to Hungary, "where patriots fighting for the liberty of their country have been crushed by a brutal foreign force."

Next, Premier Bourguiba said it would be desirable to have such United Nations forces sent to Algeria "to put an end to butchery not less horrible than the butchery at Budapest."

Only One Safe Thing

One of our most distinguished scientists in the field of atomic energy, William F. Neuman, who is chief biochemist at the atomic medical project sponsored by the Atomic Energy Commission at the University of Rochester, chose to stay out of the campaign controversy over the perils of bomb testing, but he does intend to engage in a post-election crusade on the subject. He wants to impress us with the fact that scientists do not know what they are talking about when they proclaim things one way or another about radioactive atomism.

He himself is engaged in experiments with animals to try to ascertain where the danger point is with regard to strontium contamination. But he does not expect these experiments with animals to offer any secure data for at least 10 years.

Meanwhile, there is one thing he will not buy. He will not buy the glib assurance of some experts that there is no present danger from strontium. Without being able to fix accurately the maximum possible concentration of strontium, his rough guess is that the world's children of today are scheduled to get from the strontium already released into the world's atmosphere and scheduled to continue to sit down to earth for the next 10 or 15 years, about one-tenth of the strontium they can stand.

Connecticut Yankee

Fighting the Nov. 8 election over on the basis of the imaginary assumption that the party lever machine had been abolished in the last year, the Republicans indicated their opinion that Senator Prescott Bush might have done well enough on that basis, but cannot deny that Tom Dodd would probably have made the race much closer. We think there is no doubt at all that had the party lever procedure been removed, the committee would have been somewhat different. We don't think the smashing Republican control of the Legislature is any great handicap to Governor Ribicoff, but we don't think the voters really intended it, however it may be assumed.

The party lever ought to be taken off, or made at least optional. But, as always, it is likely to prove difficult to sell that point to the party which happens, at the moment, to have benefited from the machine of the party lever. The Republicans, barring serious stateplanning, can hardly be expected to look this gift lever in the mouth.

There was a time when their own Ray Baldwin was successful in bucking Roosevelt presidential bids in Connecticut, when they appreciated the splitting of votes. But now they have Eisenhower, and it is the Democrats who have Ribicoff and Dodd, and parallel to what Baldwin used to be for the Republicans, the Republicans are not likely to develop into militant crusaders for voting machine reform.

If the party positions were reversed, the Democrats would be defending the party lever. It is as simple as that.

The most interesting point is the legal point raised by Vivian Kellogg, which is an earlier process for how sound it is. But it is, in brief, that there is actually no law which declares that the party lever system shall be used on the voting machines, and that the change which would free the individual voters for candidates in simple mechanical change which is within the authority of election officials to make, without any change in the law.

The law itself does need to be changed, in our opinion, to permit what is being done. Vivian writes that the "Vivian wants dependent candidates and parties to get on the ballot officially.
