Burmese Pay For Friendship Of Red Chinese

By MURRAY FROMSON
Nankang, Burma-China Frontier, Nov. 23.—Burma appears to have paid another installment of its purchase of Communist China's friendship.

By withdrawing their invading troops from one part of Burma, the Communists are getting permanent possession another, far more strategic sector.

The Burmese concession gives the Chinese a road into rebellious Tibet, which is relatively ice-free the year round, and two routes aimed directly at Assam, India's northernmost province. In return, the Communists agreed to withdraw from the Wa States which they invaded in 1953.

Nepal's withdrawal from this, in the strange context of Burma's nervous neutralism, is what a foreign office calls China's "fair and reasonable proposal."

The area Red China won, apparently in negotiations with former Prime Minister U. Nu recently, concerns the Wa States in northern Kachin State.

There seems to be some mystery as to what will happen to the 31,000 people living in this region and another tract near Bhamo, Kachin, where the Kachins, who have had their family roots in these areas for centuries.

Army officers near here echo the questions being asked in Bhamo by some skeptical government officers and foreign diplomats, the most important of which is: How long will the Communists remain satisfied?

The settlement merely legalizes a situation which Burma could do nothing about in the first place. An estimated 4,500 Chinese Communist troops moved into both the Wa States and Kachin up to last August. They dug emplacements and gave no indication of withdrawing.

The Burmese Army became increasingly upset over the occupation. It had only 7,000 soldiers in all of upper Burma. Most of them were busy fighting local insurgents and local Communist bands who, with outside arms help and 4,000 men, have kept parts of Burma in civil war since 1948.

Said one Burmese commander: "We looked at our own forces. Indeed, at their troops and then looked over the border. We considered."

Five Armies on Border
Along Burma's twisting 1,500-mile frontier with China, the Communists supposedly have five armies of about 50,000 men each.

Near Nankang, the center of the Burma-China border, about one Chinese division is believed to be in Bhamo.

This town straddles the frontier also, abides a secret army of informers for the Chinese.

There are about a million Chinese in Burma—a major share illegally. Most of them are settling in the frontier states.

It is easy to cross the border. There are dozens of unguarded places along the frontier.

Shan farmers at border post 42 near here say both Chinese troops and civilians cross into Burma regularly. The troops usually don't visit, but some of the civilians stay. Many of the civilians, hill tribesmen areas from China's autonomous regions, are permitted to remain in Burma legally if they have come within a 25-mile radius.

Reports of Soviet deportations of rebels continued to filter out of Hungary, despite government denials.  
**Hungary Deportations**  
The New York Times, in a dispatch from Vienna, said Gen. Ivan A. Sevcenko, the state security chief, was reported in Budapest to take charge of the deportations.  
The dispatch said that Soviet troops in five days ago to direct Soviet forces and a branch of the Hungarian secret police, headed by Maj. Gen. Laszlo Piro, in the deportations. **Austria Asks Assistance**  
The Intergovernmental Committee for European Migration (ICEM) said the 10,000th Hungarian refugee had left Austria. The Austrian government pleaded with the western countries to take the refugees to their promised new homes.  
West Germany, which had planned to accept 1,000 refugees, has removed all restrictions on the inflow.  
Austrian refugees who returned from what they called "a horrible night at the border" said Russian soldiers shot at least 20 Hungarian refugees during the night. "I saw three Hungarians die before my eyes," one reporter said.

**Drotsky Escape Bridge**  
The Russians in the area, Adj. Gen. L. M. Drotsky, had blown up a main bridge spanning the Danube River. But the Russians jumped into the cold water and swam across.  
Then, the Austrians said, the Russians began shooting into groups of refugees in the area and crawled on toward the border.  
The Vienna newspaper, the Kurier reported that a 22-year-old Russian soldier surrendered to Austrian soldiers at the border, turning over his tommy-gun and 70 rounds of ammunition. He said he did not want to have any further part in Russian brutality against Hungarians. The KAPF said.  
In Moscow, 35 prominent Soviet writers acknowledged that Russia was "heavily responsible" for the situation which led to the Hungarian revolt and subsequent Soviet intervention. In a letter to the Literary Gazette, the writers said the Hungarians were dissatisfied with their situation and that their leaders lacked the will to liquidate the intolerable violations of the Socialist law in the country.

**Storm Causes Minor Damage**  
Manchesters escaped the brunt of a wind and rain storm which hit the Connecticut Power Co. in the State and nation on Thanksgiving.  
But the howling wind did drop three limbs on power lines in various parts of town, according to the Connecticut Power Co.  
A spokesman for the Southern New England Telephone Co. said the wind and rain knocked 43 phone out of service in various parts of town. A few others were still out of service early this morning.  
One power line break brought the South Manchester Fire Dept. out at about 10:30 p.m. when a live wire fell on Spruce St. It started a small fire which was put out by the rain before firemen arrived. Companies Nos. 1 and 4 responded.  
Local police investigated two accidents which occurred when cars skidded on wet leaves. There were no injuries.  
In one, a car driven by Charlotte G. Carlson, 16 of 99 Homestead St., skidded and ran into the rear of an auto being operated by Mrs. John Rogers Mansfield, who had stopped for a day's rest at Hartford Rd. on Main St. Damage to the front of the Carlson car amounted to \$500.

She had been ill three months before she died.  
Born in Orem, Neb., Miss Blahusen was educated in Sheboygan Falls, Wis., at the Stratford Institute in Manassas, Wis., and at the Yale School of Nursing where she received her degree in 1932. Eight years later she received a master's degree from the Yale School of Public Health.  
Miss Blahusen leaves her mother, a resident of Wisconsin, and two sisters, Mrs. Myra Light of New Vernon, N. J., and Mrs. Ruth Barnes of Washington, D. C.

Once an 80-day court order stops the strike, the employers and the I.L.A. are required under the law to continue to work to settle their contract dispute.  
However, the I.L.A.'s counsel, Louis Waldman, has indicated there may be a repetition of what happened in 1953 when Eisenhower moved in to end another dock strike—in one of the other two occasions in which he has invoked the T-H law's emergency provisions.  
The I.L.A. waited in 1953 until the 80-day injunction ran out and then resumed its walkout. Similar strategy this time would mean a new dock strike in February.  
In New York the I.L.A. said it has been "economically" assured by the New York Shipbuilding Association and the existing New York area bargaining unit to cover the strike in Portland, Maine, to Hampton Roads, Va., and other ports.  
Then, adding the shipping pact of cooperation between employers and workers in the existing bargaining unit, the I.L.A. would be able to move for a court order to limit bargaining to the New York area.  
The shipping association denied it had weakened its opposition to the widening the existing bargaining unit to an association spokesman.  
The I.L.A. also has a contract with the National Labor Relations Board, which was signed Wednesday which bans the I.L.A. from insisting on a bargaining unit larger than the existing one certified by the NLRB.  
Other port issues in the New York phase of the strike are amount of cargo in home and amount of pay for men called in to work on dock, and whether a new contract should run two or three years.
