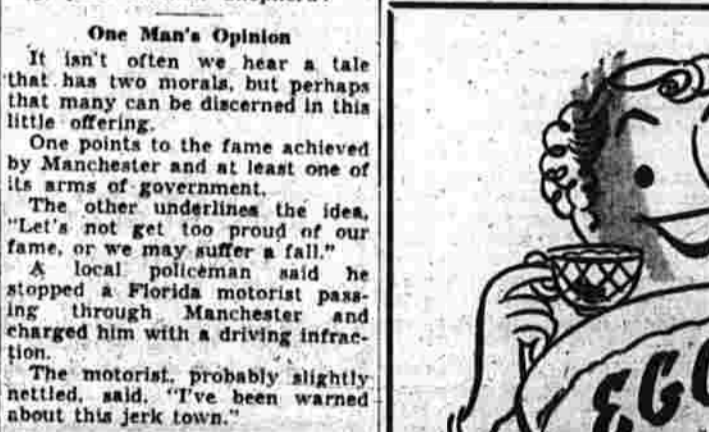

The Unused Weapon

When Russia says, as it is saying now, that it will get its troops out of all its satellites if we also pull back the military force we have advanced around the world to positions of global encirclement of Russia, that is not only a propaganda offer. It is also a statement of a certainty, of something Russia would have to do.

We would, in fact, make this certainty retroactive. We would say that the United States would not have the power, for some time, to compel Russia to get out of Germany, Poland, Czechoslovakia, and Hungary.

But our power of compulsion, of course, has not been within the ordinary classification and understanding of compulsion. The ordinary understanding of compulsion is what we have actually been following. In this we have tried to compel Russia out of its military positions on the territory of other nations by developing similar positions of strength for ourselves. The result has, quite naturally, been the opposite of that intended. We have not only increased Russia's prestige in Russia, but given Russia her version of an excuse for doing so.

Our effort to drive Russia out of East Germany by developing military strength in West Germany has not driven Russia out of East Germany, but rather it has dictated that Russia remain there.

Conversely, we could have had Russia get out of East Germany any of these recent years if we could have made up our own minds to get out of West Germany.

From a realistic point of view, the new Russian propaganda offer, then, nothing new. We have had, have now, and will have the unilateral power to force Russian military retirement. The trouble is that our power to force Russia's military retirement lies in a retirement of our own, and that, so far, we have been more concerned with holding and extending our own forward military positions than with driving the Russians out of theirs.

It is also true that Russia has the same unilateral policy privilege with regard to us. If Russia really wants us to get out of Germany, and out of Europe, and out of many of our forward bases around the world, Russia will not just talk about it. Russia will withdraw itself, and leave us to deal with the consequences.

The months we could stay in West Germany after Russia got out of East Germany would be numbered. If we didn't number them ourselves, out of our own policy instincts, the people of West Germany would number them for us.

The curious fact about all this is that whichever side found itself able to be the first to withdraw would not only force the other to withdraw too, but would receive most world credit for creating the atmosphere of peace.

It is curious, too, that we have this situation of two great powers possessing this unusual power over one another, but that neither has the courage and imagination to use it simply because the weapon which doesn't sound powerful, and doesn't possess the image of a weapon. But the truth is that whichever one managed to reach for this particular position would be winning what might be the final victory of the cold war.

Dark Age Techniques

The fight for freedom has many fronts and many chapters, and the repression of this fight has similar techniques everywhere. It is hard to find an act of violent, unscrupulous repression which, in our time, stands alone.

We thought, for instance, that

Britain was returning to the policy of the dark ages when, over a year ago, it suddenly arrested and carried away to an exotic island in the Indian Ocean, Archbishop Makarios, the leader of the fight for independence in Cyprus.

Britain had been pretending to negotiate with him, before it yielded to the temptation to try to break the spirit of the people of Cyprus by seizing him and sending him off on a British battleship to his present island prison. Incidentally, the spirit of this has not been what the British hoped and expected it would be. Although there are many more British troops there, Cyprus is still as violent as ever.

Just a few weeks ago, the French pulled a similar coup, in which trickery and deceit were used. A group of Algerian rebel leaders boarded a plane to fly to a conference with other North African native leaders. The purpose of the conference was supposed to be to work out a common front for dealing with France. And the French knew of the proposed conference and of the proposed flight of the Algerian leaders, and pretended, at least, to give their approval.

But when the five Algerian leaders were in the air, a supposedly neutral and civilian plane, the French could not resist the temptation to kidnap them, and try to break the Algerian resistance by the capture of five of its recognized leaders.

Incidentally, the result of this French kidnapping, in betrayal of assurances the French themselves had given, has not been to break the Algerian revolt, but to stiffen it, and to outrage the native leadership in Tunisia and Morocco.

Now there has come, in Hungary, the trap and the deception. By the Russians, and Imre Nagy, the Communist who seems to have become anti-Communist. Their Hungarian puppet, Kadar, pretended he wanted to negotiate with Nagy, but that he must have his say first in the Yugoslav embassy first. Nagy was given a solemn promise he could come out safely. When he came out, the temptation to seize him, and try to break the spirit of the Hungarian revolt by capturing and deporting the man who had become a symbol of the revolt, was too strong for the Russians to resist. So they spread their net of treachery and stark age methods across our present page of history.

As in Cyprus, and as in North Africa, this act of medieval violence is not likely to break the spirit of the Hungarian revolt, as the Russians hoped and intended, but to stiffen it, and to cause its opinion to stir new and more passionate condemnation of Russian policy in Hungary.

The making of martyrs is not only inhuman and uncivilized, but it is also policy foolish.

Molotov's New Job

There is still no authoritative opinion on whether Molotov, moving into another position labeled comparable to that of head of accounting in the Russian government, has been edged away from power, or put into greater power. Russia itself, unfortunately, does not label the significance of its own moves.

The new job for Molotov could mean either thing. It is true that the office, in the past, has been insignificant. But it also seems possible that the office, with its bookkeeping supervision of all governmental activities, could be turned into a post of considerable power, if the man holding it had the right political position.

The West has to hope that, with Molotov in it, the job remains what it has been in the past. For although we have our moments for denouncing the Bulgarian-Khrushchev regime, there is little doubt that it represents a gain for Russia and the world, over the Stalinist past. Its policies and actions are actually invited, and accepted, the partial revolution which has taken place in Poland.

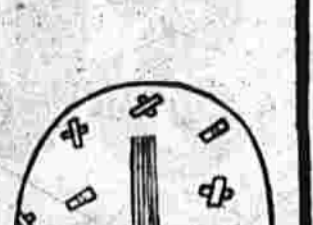
Its own survival has been jeopardized, obviously, by the tragic events in Hungary where, perhaps to defend itself at home, it has turned toward Stalinist methods itself.

And it was apparently in an effort to buttress his domestic position that Khrushchev, two nights in a row, indulged himself in abuse of the West, much as our own Mr. Dulles has occasionally gone tough in his own country in order to bolster his own domestic right wing.

If the present regime is toppled, Molotov comes back, that will be because the present regime will be considered weak because it has tried to be mild at home and abroad. The reputation of the present regime on that basis would be good news for nobody.

Negroes Found No Different From Whites in Intelligence

By Herman H. Alver, Washington, Nov. 26 (AP)—An official of a psychological measuring service reported today he has been able to find no scientific evidence that Negroes are less intelligent than white people.

Robert D. North, assistant director of the Educational Records Bureau, New York, said in a report prepared for the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, Jewish service organization.

"If the nation's school systems were segregated on the ability to learn, color lines would be crossed in a way that would benefit students of white mental supremacy."

North said that according to scientific evidence whatever differences show up in intelligence tests between the races may well be due to differences in the circumstances under which individuals grew up.

Discriminatory Factors— "The evidence that hereditary factors account for differences in so weak as to be virtually nonexistent," he said.

"The intelligence which we measure is the ability to learn and use acquired knowledge or skills. . . . Those who have greater cultural benefits tend to do much better."

"Aside from such things as quality of education, North said, some factors cannot be accurately analyzed."

For example, he said: "How much is an ego child's incentive to learn . . . affected by a community attitude that educated Negroes are 'uppity.' Exactly how much weight should be given to a white child's indoctrination with the idea that he belongs to a superior race?"

The committee said that unless something is done to cut down accidents, the next 10 years will see 500,000 persons killed and 10 million injured on American highways.
The committee urged that the Governors' Conference last June in Atlantic City, issued its report on highway safety. Saturday through Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff is chairman.
Among its 30 recommendations for highway safety were these:
Adoption by all states of a uniform traffic code.
Increased safety education programs.
Expansion of safety education programs.
Reduction or elimination of physical hazards through engineering. (Under this recommendation the committee said "the most mobile manufacturing industry should be encouraged to coordinate its design safety program.")
Greater emphasis on licensing of drivers.
Greater research into the human factors connected with traffic accidents.
Increased appropriations for safety programs.
The governors said there is nothing new in their report.
"In the main, we have now to prevent accidents and, in the main, we know how to insure highway safety," they said.
The committee urged that the states use the knowledge and facilities that we have."

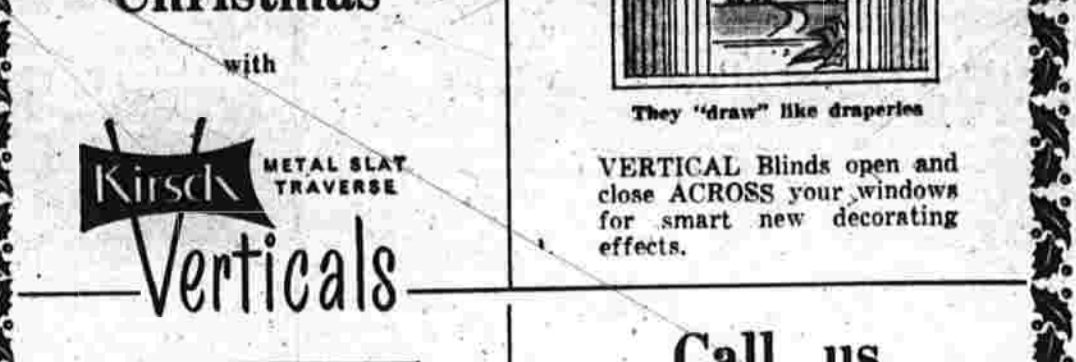

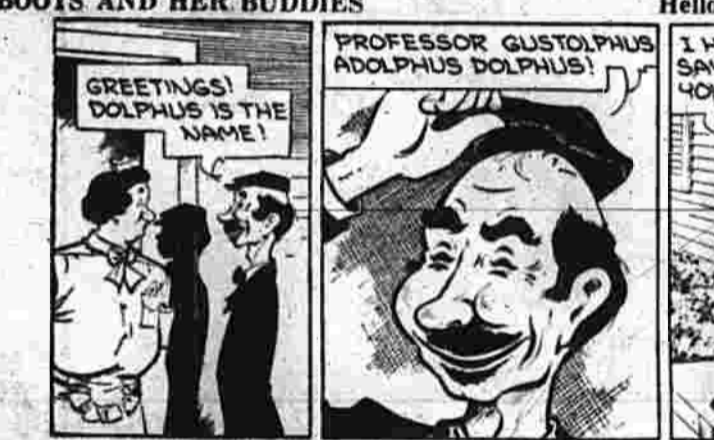

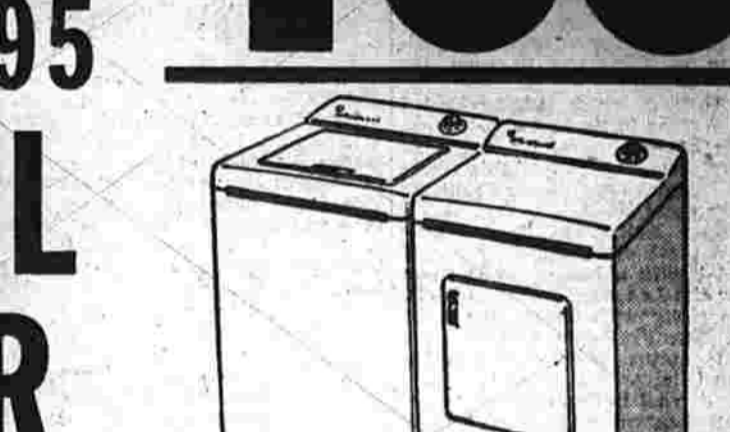
