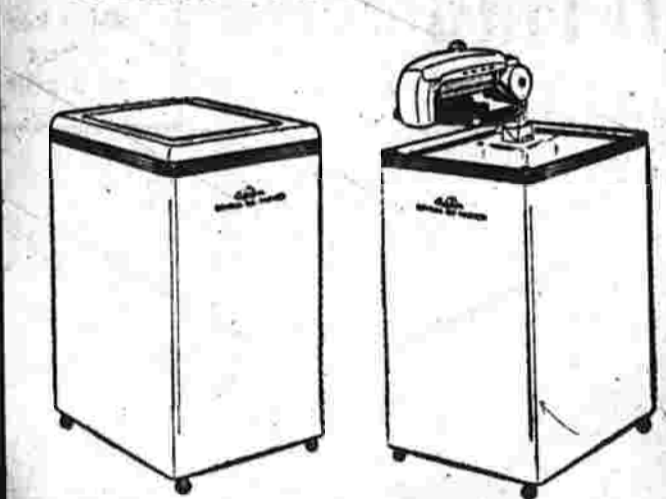

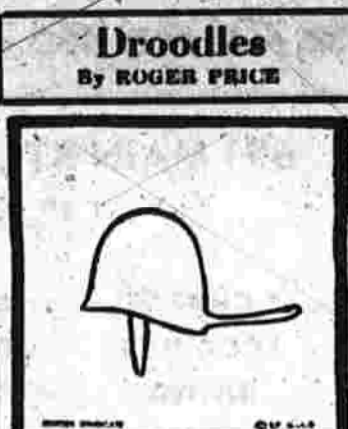

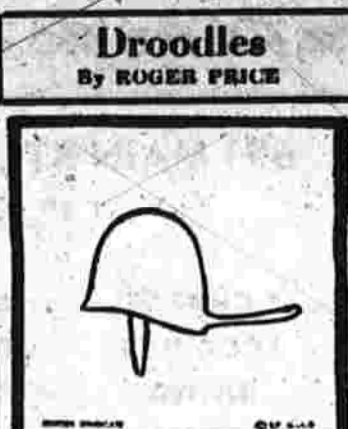

'Happiness Pills' Seen Peril to Patient, Nation

By KENNETH TAYLOR (AP Science Reporter)

Seattle, Nov. 28 (AP)—Are the tranquillizing drugs robbing Americans of the tension, excitement, worry and "edge" which have sharpened their ability to defend themselves in danger and speed the country's progress?

There are signs that such a possibility lurks in the unscientific use of the "happiness pills," say two psychiatrists who have observed 4,000 people taking tranquillizers.

The pills themselves are not at fault and are potentially of great use in medicine. There is evidence that they can cause undesirable effects to both the individual and to society. Dr. Herman A. Dickel and Dr. Henry H. Dixon, told the American Medical Assn. yesterday.

Dr. Dickel and Dr. Dixon, from the University of Oregon Medical School, told the scientific session of the AMA they found among the 4,000 people these hazards:

1. Danger to the health and even the lives of persons who react "abnormally" to the drugs.
2. Danger to the patient's philosophy of morals and emotions.
3. Danger to the physician and to medicine generally because doctors are being subjected to enormous pressure to prescribe the pills.
4. Danger to society because it is being led to believe that no one ever should have to be afraid or to feel anxiety.

Unusual Reaction to Drugs

The hazard to health and life comes in people who develop unusual reactions to the drugs, said the psychiatrists. About 80 of the 4,000 became depressed enough to attempt suicide. Others developed types of mania which require more serious treatment and hospitalization. About 400 of the 4,000 patients had these reactions. Dr. Dickel said.

About 1,700 of the 4,000 were "prejudiced into serious psychiatric difficulties" because the physicians who first gave them the drugs misinterpreted things that happened afterward to the patients.

Another group of 126 felt no good after taking the pills that they failed to follow up with other medical measures and became much worse than before.

The danger to society, the psychiatrists said, involves the traditional belief that Americans are self-reliant, able to hold their own against adversity. On the

Big Waves Peril Northern Coast Of Ohau Island

Honolulu, Nov. 28 (AP)—Hundreds of the Weather Bureau said high waves would continue pounding Ohau's north shore today and tomorrow and more residents prepared to evacuate if necessary.

Thunderous 30-foot waves crashed ashore yesterday causing damage to half a dozen beachfront homes and several injuries. 20 deaths were reported. Reports that a floating body had been seen were unconfirmed.

Some of the residents of the area are military personnel.

Last February they suffered losses in a flood that did \$200,000 property damage.

The waves pounded the area from Waimea Point through Sunset Beach.

Only a few miles around the coast at Waikiki Beach the surf was quieter than usual.

The Weather Bureau said the freak conditions are caused by a large low pressure system some 2,000 miles north of here.

The open ocean is running low, heavy waves of 10 to 15 feet, but does not present dangerous conditions to shipping unless winds increase, a coast guard spokesman said.

Typhoon Olive, packing center winds of 75 miles an hour, struck the southeastern Looian island, in the Philippines today. The Manila Weather Bureau said the storm was moving westerly at 9 miles an hour.

There were no immediate reports of damage on land.

U.S. Freighter Abandoned in Gale Off China

Manila, Nov. 28 (AP)—Hundreds of Asian seamen were missing and the crew of an American freighter was reported abandoning ship today as a storm continued to sweep the South China Sea and the western Pacific.

Globe Wireless intercepted a message from the 8,200-ton freighter Charles E. Dant saying the Captain had ordered his 46 crewmen to jump overboard in the gale off Lingayen Gulf, on the west coast of Luzon island.

The U.S. Navy ship Miskin was standing by and presumably took the men aboard.

The Dant took a bad list when the cargo of copper concentrates was hauling from the Philippines to Tacoma, Wash., shifted in heavy seas. The total U.N. Emergency Force (UNEF) in Egypt rose to 1415 with the arrival of 160 Indian troops in the canal zone. Maj. Gen. E. L. M. A battalion normally is about 1,000 men.

The bulk of the police force still is at Abu Suweir, airfield, behind the Egyptian lines in the Canal Zone.

Excise Cut Asked For Auto Industry

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—An automobile manufacturers' spokesman asked Congress today to cut the excise tax on automobiles back to the pre-World War II level.

The present 10 per cent tax is levied on the manufacturer's price, not the retail price.

Robert E. Ryan of Studebaker-Packard Corp., speaking for the Automobile Manufacturers Assn., said more than \$500 of the price of an automobile retails for \$2,000 is tax, including a \$148 federal excise tax.

In testimony prepared for House Ways and Means subcommittee studying excise taxes, Ryan said automotive products are practically the only items on which no relief has been granted from high taxes imposed at the time of the great conflict.

He said the industry is not asking for a cut in excise taxes on trucks and buses as deep as that cut it proposes on passenger cars, because the financing of the big new highway program might suffer.

"Instead," he said, "we ask that the 10 per cent excise tax rate on trucks and buses be cut to 5 per cent, with the entire proceeds of this tax transferred to the highway trust fund."

Bolton Zone Unit Petitioned On Route 6 Decision

Bolton, Nov. 28 (Special)—A petition of 18 residents of Rt. 6, petitioned the Zoning Commission's deliberation on the request of the Clark Wellpoint Co. for an extension of the business zone in their neighborhood. Zoning Agent Donald F. Tedford confirmed today.

The petition made nine points, some of which Tedford felt were well-taken, in its request that the McKimney tract on Rt. 6 remain residential in zoning classification. Although the petition was given due consideration and was the subject of lengthy deliberation, the Commission was given an oral opinion by a Manchester attorney last night that petitions submitted after a public hearing are illegal.

Tedford said the opinion was based on a recent court decision and that the Zoning Commission will be given a written statement for its records and guidance in future cases.

Text of Petition
Text of the petition contained the following nine points in support of the request of the signers that the tract in question remain as a residential zone.

1. The hearing on Nov. 19 disclosed certain facts that change to the business zone would be detrimental to Rt. 6.

2. The term "business" as defined in the zoning regulations is so broad that until this category is clearly defined the Zoning Commission could unintentionally grant an unjust and detrimental precedent by granting this zoning change.

3. The Zoning Commission is charged with responsibility of interpreting and ruling upon regulations which were established to protect the rights and privileges of the property owners of the community as well as individual citizens and individual neighborhoods.

4. The present business zone on Rt. 6 are retail and the Clark operation is more accurately defined as an industry and such should not be allowed in a small business and residential zone.

5. If the present business location of the Clark Wellpoint Co. can be used as an example of how this proposed site on Rt. 6 will look, it would be an unwelcome addition to any residential neighborhood.

6. The Zoning Commission must also take into consideration the fact that the 60-acre tract adjoining the McKimney property on the east is presently a private park and recreation area controlled by the Boy Scout organization and under certain conditions could revert to the Town of Bolton as a public park. We are sure that the citizens employes of the Planning Board would not place an industrial area next to a park.

7. There is a possibility of the relocation of Rt. 6 making it a secondary road and therefore more desirable as a residence zone.

8. A petition is now pending with the Public Utilities Commission by the railroad to discontinue the passenger line running through Bolton. This opens the possibility that Hwy. 6 might be extended to Bolton. Can it be? What effect would industry have on property values on that road?

9. The tax revenue from the petition of 18 residents of Rt. 6, regardless of the location in town, is a well-known fact that the introduction of any form of industry to a neighborhood is its ruin. If this sort of thing is allowed all over town, there is no zoning and no property investment is safe. There is plenty of undeveloped land in Bolton which would not infringe on residence homes and we do not feel it is a great hardship to Mr. Clark to be denied the requested privilege.
