**Eisenhower Given Views of Red China**

(Continued From Page One)

Americans still held in Communist China "will be released" but he said it would be "embarrassing" to discuss the problem of the Chinese Americans in any detail since the matter was one for another government and that what he could say about it might not be true. But he said he had discussed the matter with the Indian statesman who had just visited him and he said he would discuss it with him.

Will Meet Chou Again  
Nehru said he had a second meeting with Chou En-lai at New Delhi on Dec. 30.

One of the first questions put to Nehru was whether he had given Eisenhower any message from the Chinese Communist Premier.

"I did not bring any particular message from Chou En-lai," he said. "Naturally I had talks with him and I gave the President the gist of our talks in regard to matters of common interest."

"As you know, Chou En-lai is a rather remarkable man and impressive. He gave me a very clear point on certain problems in Asia. I conveyed it to the President not in a message but in my own thinking. We have certain complaints on steps taken or not taken."

"They say—and here I am merely repeating—that you have given several steps forward but there has not been any favorable reaction from the other side," he said.

Nehru emphasized that he was not saying whether this was right or wrong but that it was a matter of historical stipulation.

Understandably, U.S. Aides  
Speaking generally of his long talks with President Eisenhower, Nehru said they have helped him gain "a much better understanding of American policy."

And, he said, his meetings with the President have given him much more knowledge of American thinking, which is very important.

Among other observations by the Indian leader were these:

"We are anxious of course that steps be taken to reopen the (Suez) canal, subject always to the sovereignty of Egypt. We don't want steps that will harm Egypt in any way."

In response to a question, he said he thinks the Suez Canal should be open to all nations of all nations.

Some suggested that the World Court at the Hague be asked to settle the dispute.

Some World Court should be asked to interpret it," Nehru said.

A reporter alluded to Nehru's broadcast last night in which the Indian leader expressed confidence that peace will prevail although he said the "war of nerves" is not over.

He noted also that Nehru had spoken of India as standing for freedom of the human spirit and asked how the Prime Minister regarded this "refusal to condemn Russia's action in Hungary."

"It is not a question of condemning anybody," Nehru replied. "India itself sponsored a resolution in the United Nations on the situation. It is a question whether we are going to do more by condemning or by putting forward a constructive proposal. We thought the constructive approach better."

He expressed his own disapproval of what happened there in "very strong terms."

Another question concerned possibility of establishing full diplomatic relations between Israel and India, and the effect of such a step on the Middle East situation.

Nehru said: "About a year after Israel came into existence we recognized it. It is true we have not changed diplomatic relations but we felt we should be able to help in this matter more by not changing such missions. As you know, our relations with the Arab nations are very considerable and we felt the only way to settle matters in this matter was to come together themselves and work out a settlement."

Asked whether President Eisenhower had indicated any plans to visit India, the Prime Minister replied: "I know you wouldn't want me to commit the President. But I do hope he comes. I'd be happy if he comes."

Formosa Not China  
Another reporter asked what would happen to Nationalist China if the United Nations admitted Red China. Nehru commented: "Constitutionally speaking, there is only one China. In this situation, neither the Formosa government nor the Chinese government recognizes the existence of the other. I don't think that in the circumstances of today, and the historical circumstances of the past, the two can continue. Obviously, the Formosa government is at most the Formosa government. It is in Formosa. To call it China is stretching a name."

In reply to another question, Nehru said he believed that many changes in Russia since the death of Stalin "have been in the right direction."

He expressed hope these changes would continue and move along at a faster rate.

The Indian leader said in his view "changes in Russia are fundamental" and that they will not be reversed by Khrushchev.

**Rockville-Vernon Foreclosures Fail to Halt Plans for New Development**

Rockville, Dec. 18 (Special)—Despite foreclosures on four completed homes in Moreland Acres, the Gatter development, said today he plans construction of 120 higher brick homes.

According to the prosecutor, the man orally confessed to setting four church fires here last Sunday and the blaze last March which destroyed St. Mary's Roman Catholic Cathedral. Major Richard E. Owen and two housekeepers at the cathedral died.

On Sunday the historic first Methodist Church was damaged to the extent of some \$200,000 and another church suffered some \$500 damage about a mile and a half away.

Smaller fires fized out at two smaller churches the same morning with only negligible damage. They were the Church of the Living Bible, where gasoline was poured and ignited in a rear vestibule, and the State Street Methodist Church, where a half gallon jug of gasoline was hurled through a window, burning a chair.

Miami Beach, Fla. (AP)—It's nice sometimes to find that dreams really can come true. The blue-eyed, middle-aged lady, looking down from the balcony to the sun-worshippers on the beach.

"Yeah," said her husband, research of all they surveyed, except the ocean itself.

They are Al and Sadie Tish who, with their two sons, Larry, 23, and Bob, 20, in a single decade have become the world's largest family resort owners.

"Every penny in this hotel is mine," said Sadie. "We are a closely knit family, and the money all comes from the same pot."

Each hotel the Tishes buy becomes a monument to one of the family, and the American to Larry's baby—he deserves all the credit.

It is hard to describe the hotel. It last week's NBC convention its 475 rooms housed more than 800 guests who were cared for by a staff of more than 900 employees. It has a lobby big enough to play half a football game in and quietly features an indoor museum and the world's only indoor rain forest.

Some one-bedroom suites have two private entrances and two bathrooms. A \$100,000 art collection hangs on the walls and so do the heads of 21 American nations. There are enough wood, metal and concrete in the hotel to build 500 air-conditioned homes.

Without leaving the hotel grounds you can swim in the ocean, see a doctor, eat in six restaurants, order a \$25,000 diamond bracelet, get a newspaper, get a message or a haircut, buy a share of AT&T stock, a \$2.50 14-day bear, or an aspirin tablet.

Have the Tishes gone mad in a luxury hotel world? Not a bit. Their magnificent hospitality one step too much—eyes for Miami Beach, the frontier of the Frantic Dollar.

"No," said Sadie, "the surface of the property to be here has been barely scratched, in spite of it's quick."

"But we will have Florida sand in our shoes," said Sadie. "We kept coming back to our first dream. For a while we were afraid, over Miami Beach was overbuilt, over-sold, and overcovered. But year after year we checked, and found that more and more people were coming here. Do you know 7 million people visited Florida last year?"

"Yeah," said Al.

In the spring of 1955 they bought a holding site here a 650-foot beachfront, and 17 months later \$17 million later they had the American Hotel.

The original million dollars or so they started with has been parlayed into properties which the Tishes themselves value at \$50 million or more.

Those and many other daisy dingers were turned up by the Council. To wit:

**Gopher No Fool**  
The gopher that kept peering at Farmer Paul Thomas of Las Vegas, Nev., was no fool. When Thomas showed a lighted concussion bomb down the gopher hole, the gopher shoved it right back.

Thomas frantically buried the bomb away. It landed near his barn, exploded and burned up 12 tons of hay. The gopher loved every minute of it.

Local courts which include, besides those which were surveyed, the common pleas, superior and supreme courts. ... The local courts employ more than 1,200 persons, most of them on a part-time basis, and particularly in the municipal courts, there is a big turnover among personnel. ... In June 1955, when the last municipal court appointments were made, these courts employed 611 persons. All but 56 were replaced after the appointments. ... Municipal court judges are appointed by the governor for 2-year terms with confirmation by the legislature. ... Frequently, however, the legislature is divided with Democrats controlling the Senate and Republicans the House, and no agreement on court appointments is reached. In these cases, judges named by the governor serve as interim appointees. ... The municipal courts are a major source of political patronage, although the survey did not explore that phase of the situation. ... Judges themselves appoint the prosecutors, clerks and other court personnel. ... Trial judges are elected every two years in the towns where they serve. Probate judges, serving in districts although designated a district position only one town or one county are elected every four years. ... Compensation Varies. The report said that one notable difference among local courts is in the compensation of judges. ... Probate judges' income realized from fees ranged in 1955 from less than nothing (two judges reporting losses) to \$28,000. ... A summary of the report released by the bar association also said: "Other differences among the local courts are found in the professional qualifications of the judges, and the frequency and location of court sessions. ... 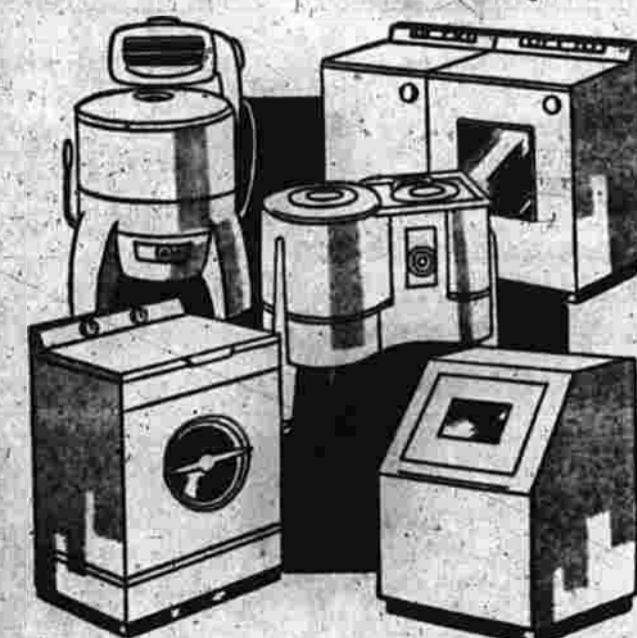

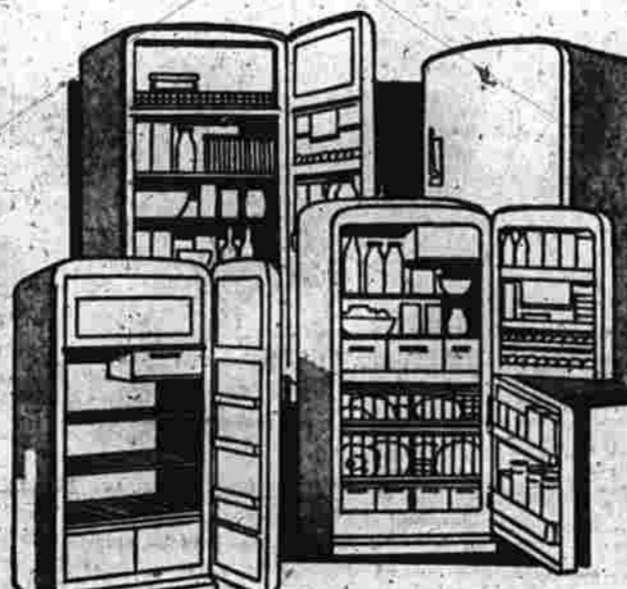

### Butler Feels Job Still Safe Despite Vote

Washington, Dec. 19 (AP)—Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler appeared confident today his job is safe despite the November vote outcome and a disagreement with congressional leaders.

Butler issued yesterday a call for a meeting of the national committee in San Francisco on Feb. 18. Associates said he is confident he can dispose of any move for his ouster which might crop up then.

The chairman's friends said Butler had little direct connection with Adlai E. Stevenson's unsuccessful campaign for the presidency. They said he was more concerned with the congressional campaigns in which the Democrats retained control of both houses.

Butler's political friends sought to make peace with congressional leaders who had been stably linked by Butler's move to a policy advisory group of 29 members.

Democratic Senate and House leaders made it plain they regarded this as an attempt to invade the congressional policy field.

Denying this emphatically, Butler said all the proposed group wants is "consultation and cooperation" with congressional leaders, adding that this would "enable us to achieve the objectives of the advisory committee."

Calling a meeting of the group

for Jan. 4, Butler said the congressional leaders who declined to serve on the committee won't be replaced, he said. The executive committee, meeting the same day, will have to decide whether similar vacancies outside of Congress will be filled.

If they aren't, the advisory group will consist of about eight persons. Among those who have accepted membership are Stevenson, Sen. Kefauver of Tennessee, the vice presidential nominee and former President Truman, Sen. Humphrey of Minnesota and Kefauver are the only congressional representatives thus far.

Rep. Edith Green of Oregon, having withdrawn her acceptance, will work with the 14-member executive committee the funds at state legislation, foreign policy, intraparty affairs and "development of new ideas and principles."

"The world does not stand still from convention to convention and platform to platform," he said.

#### Widow Seeks Decision

Norwich, Dec. 19 (AP)—The widow of a dentist whose bid to practice was revoked for six months on a charge that he violated a law prohibiting advertising has asked Superior Court to make a final decision on the appeal.

### Court May Decide Rhode Island Vote

Providence, R. I., Dec. 19 (AP)—The Rhode Island Supreme Court may decide who is going to be governor of the state.

Republican Christopher Del Seato was declared elected Tuesday by the state election board after a delayed count of some 10,000 absentee ballots.

Challenge Ballots Legality

But Democrats promptly challenged the legality of about 5,000 absentee ballots, cast by civilians, on grounds they believed forged election day, contrary to the state constitution.

At least one high Democratic office holder declined to go along with his party.

Rep. Fogarty (D-R. I.) said it is his "inclination... that the right to vote is a sacred one and that our laws should be interpreted if legally possible to give effect to that right."

In the final count, Del Seato defeated incumbent Democratic Gov. Dennis J. Roberts by 427 votes, 194,974 to 194,547.

The count of absentee votes overcame a 207-vote lead held by Roberts at the conclusion of the machine-vote tally on election day.

Even before the final gubernatorial count, the legality of the civilian absentee ballots was challenged by three defeated Democratic candidates for the State Legislature.

### Democrats Name Assembly Heads

Hartford, Dec. 19 (AP)—Democrats in the State Legislature, heavily outnumbered in both House and Senate, elected their leaders for the two years they will serve.

In the Senate, where Democrats are outnumbered 21-5, they picked Sen. Arthur H. Healey of New Britain.

In the House, where the margin is 249-30 in favor of the GOP, Democrats picked Rep. Samuel S. Googel of New Britain.

The caucus named as assistant minority leaders, Sen. John M. Scanlon of New Britain and Rep. William O'Brien of Portland.

The Democrats urged speedy adoption of the measures suggested by the interim committee on rules for making the Legislature more efficient.

They also favored a change in the roll-call rule of the House. Under present rules, a 30 per cent vote is needed to force a roll call, and the Democrats number only 12 per cent.

Sen. Healey is a lawyer, serving his second term in the Senate. He is chairman of the temporary State commission to study housing in the State and a member of the Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

Rep. Googel is serving his fourth term in the House. He is chairman of the New Britain Democratic Town Committee and is a former deputy secretary of the State.

### Air Retaliation Force Set to Move at Once

Denver, Dec. 19 (AP)—The U.S. Air Force is capable of launching a retaliatory strike force "in minimum time," the air chief of staff said last night.

Speaking to Air Force Academy cadets, Gen. Nathan P. Twining, disclosed that more than 1,000 B-47 Air Force medium bombers flew nonstop missions averaging 8,000 miles in a 2-week period ended Dec. 11.

He also recalled that a few days earlier eight B-52 jet bombers circled the continent in 24-hour flights, logging as many as 17,000 nonstop miles.

First Test of Type

This is the first time that the nation's Strategic Air Force has tested the operational capability of its strike force in such large numbers such a short period of time," Twining said.

"This demonstrated ability of nations to deliver powerful weapons by air has clearly taken the profit out of war," he noted in a lecture commemorating the Wright brothers' first flight in 1903.

The operation meant that with in a fortnight the avit bombers, refueling in the air, flew a total of eight million miles.

"Twining said the Strategic Air Command (SAC) in its mission 'dramatically demonstrated the potentiality of our B52 the world's hardest-hitting, longest-ranged jet bombers.'
