UN Squabbles Over Mideast

United Nations N.Y., Dec. 20 (AP)—U.N. delegates headed home today for a Christmas recess after arguing into the night on troubles in the Middle East. Other unfinished business. The latest round on the Middle East ended on the 19th when Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld announced that he had accepted a partial withdrawal from the Sinai peninsula by Jan. 15, but that he could not say when all Israeli forces would be out of the area.

Hammarskjöld spoke in reply to demands by Jordan and other Arab delegates as to how fast the Israelis were pulling out.

Wadsworth added however, that the United States has received information that the Israeli national forces were being retrained in Egypt. He said the U.S. Ambassador in Cairo had been asked to convey to the Egyptian government the American concern in this matter.

No resolution was presented during the debate which began on British-French requests that Hammarskjöld should investigate the national forces being retrained in Egypt.

U.S. Delegate James J. Wadsworth made an 11th hour attempt to out-vote the proposal, but he failed as the end to "this phase of the dispute."

Wadsworth added however, that the United States has received information that the Israeli national forces were being retrained in Egypt. He said the U.S. Ambassador in Cairo had been asked to convey to the Egyptian government the American concern in this matter.

Karlsruhe, Germany, Dec. 22 (AP)—Otto John, former West German intelligence chief, was sentenced to four years in prison today for treasonable relations with the Communists during his 17-month stay behind the Iron Curtain.

The sentence was announced by the Federal Supreme Court here after a 6-week trial.

Seventy witnesses were heard in the trial that climaxed West Germany's most spectacular Cold War scandal. John claimed repeatedly that he was dragged and taken across the border into East Berlin on July 20, 1954.

Bonn Court Rejects Claim of Red Kidnap

Karlsruhe, Germany, Dec. 22 (AP)—A Bonn court today rejected a claim of kidnap by the Red Army in East Germany.

The court said that the Red Army had not proven its case.

Nixon Wants More Refugees for U.S.

(Continued from Page One)

The Vice President says that the United States must do more than it has done to help solve the refugee problem. He is expected to recommend to President Eisenhower that America take in more than the 21,500 refugees already approved.

Nixon today pledged American help for refugees who fled East European Communist countries prior to the Hungarian revolt. He says the present on a visit to the Glensbach Refugee Camp five miles south of Salzburg, Austria, are about 600 refugees at this camp. About 80 per cent of them are Hungarians.

"This camp, you will note, is not a typical one of the recent movement of refugees," Nixon said. "But it symbolizes a problem for the administration and Congress. As you know, those who participated in the uprising came to the United States without the usual requirements of our immigration laws."

The Glensbach refugees have been there three to five months. Austrian officials estimated there are 20,000 more of such refugees in other camps in the country.

From Salzburg, Nixon was to go to Munich. There he was to meet with West German Finance Minister Fritz Schaefter on the problem of Hungarian refugees in that country. The Nixon government has promised to take one refugee for every 10 who remain in Hungary.

The Vice President also was to watch the departure from Germany of a U.S. military aircraft for refugees. He will greet the American colony in Munich early tonight, and then attend a dinner to be given in his honor by Bavarian Minister President Wilhelm Hegner.

Talking off from Munich Sunday morning in a big Air Force Piper-Cessation, he is expected to land at JFK airport in New York after afternoon Foreign Minister Gundermunde's announcement will be at the airport. The Vice President also planned to call on Iceland's Premier Agnarsson, attend a reception for Britishers and Americans, and hold a short news conference.

Nixon is expected to return to Washington Monday morning.

In Washington, Rep. Otis Burleson (D-Tex.) protested reports that the number of Hungarian refugees to be admitted had declined. It was a serious mistake to admit any.

Burleson, a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, made public a letter he sent to Secretary of State Dulles in which he said:

"I consider it a serious mistake to have admitted any refugees and advise that our government, in being swayed by an emotion which is wholly unrealistic."

He added he had reports that many of the refugees admitted are young men who should remain in their homeland to fight for its freedom.

He suggested that the refugees be "assisted" those who are willing to remain behind to carry on their fight for independence from the Soviet Union.

Burleson said he had opposed the original Refugee Relief Act, adding:

"From what I can learn, it has done nothing for the United States except to curry favor of certain minority groups."

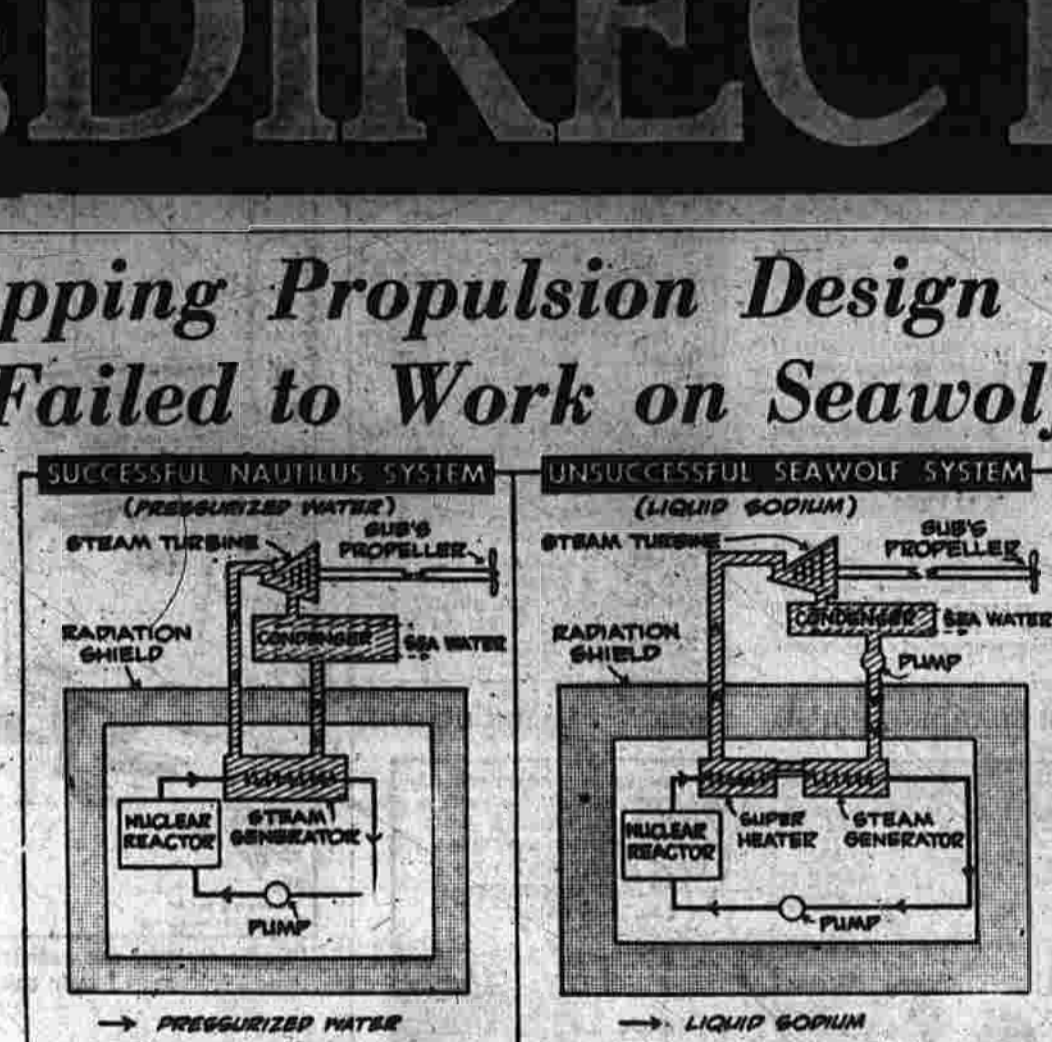
