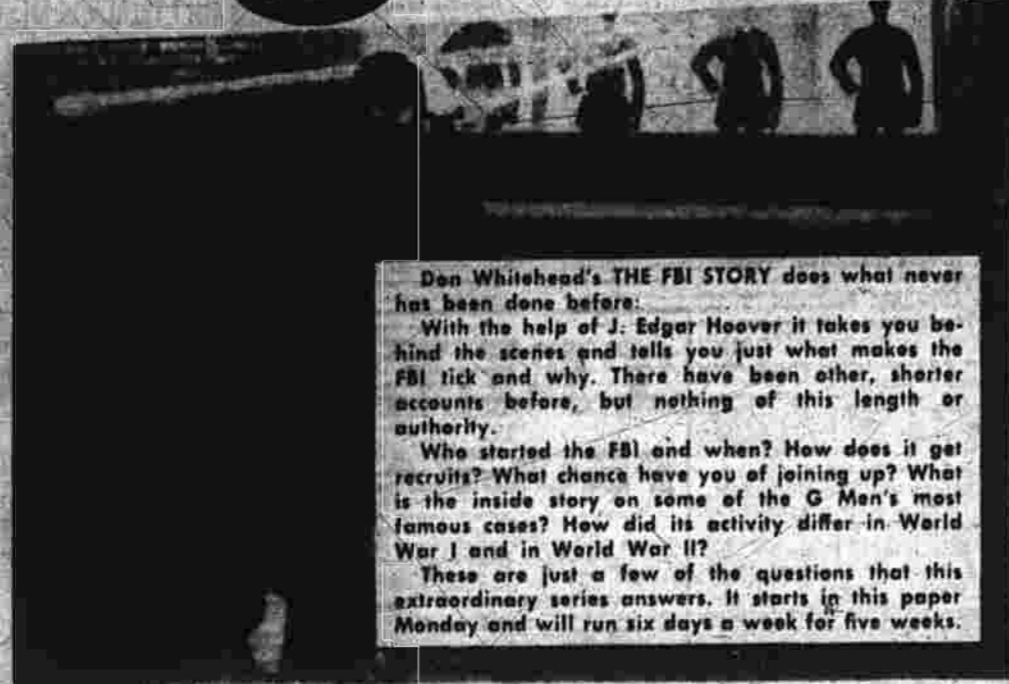

Traffic Deaths At Record 405 For New Year's

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The traffic death toll during the long New Year weekend appeared headed today for a new record for the holiday but far under the pre-holiday estimate of 490.

Traffic deaths since 6 p.m. (local time) Friday to last midnight totaled 405. That compared to the New Year holiday record of 497 set in a 102-hour 4-day period in 1953-54. Delayed reports may boost this year's mark to a new high.

In other accident deaths, 69 persons lost their lives in fires and 106 others were killed in other types of mishaps for an over-all total of 574. The weekend traffic toll was far below the 700 deaths on the nation's highways during the Christmas holiday period, which was a record for any holiday.

Over 1,000 for Holidays However, the combined total for the two holidays set a new high with more than 1,100 traffic deaths. It marked the first time in history the total for the two holidays reached more than 1,000. The record was set during the 3-day celebration period at the end of 1955 and the start of 1956.

The National Safety Council, which last week had predicted 450 traffic deaths, lowered its figure during the holiday. "The drivers and the traffic enforcement officers deserve a big vote of thanks from everybody for teaming up to hold down the toll," Ned H. Boardman, council president, said in Chicago.

The council said major factors in the lower traffic toll during the New Year period, compared to Christmas, included less travel, better weather conditions and tougher law enforcement. It also said the heavy Christmas toll had

Nikita Predicts Tough Policy For Satellites

Moscow, Jan. 1 (AP)—Soviet Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev has backtracked on his denunciation of Stalin.

Remarks by the party chief at the Kremlin New Year's eve party were interpreted as further indication of tough measures to combat moves by U.S. satellites toward independence from Moscow as well as an effort by Khrushchev to bolster his own position.

Asian diplomats reported that Khrushchev, in giving a toast at the party, said: "Stalin was a great fighter against imperialism. He was a great Marxist. The imperialists call us Stalinists. Well, when it comes to fighting imperialists, we are all Stalinists."

He appeared disconcerted particularly at the satellites, since the Kremlin has charged repeatedly that the Hungarian rebellion was a Fascist plot formed by "western imperialists." Khrushchev seemed to be promising that any such future outbreaks would be met with the same military crackdown which Stalin would have used and which finally prevailed in Hungary.

In contrast with the line he laid down in his "de-Stalinization" speech at the Communist party congress last February, Khrushchev

Storm Smashes Oil Drill Rig in Persian Gulf

Manama, Bahrain, Jan. 2 (AP)—Oilmen disclosed today a storm has wrecked a \$12 million offshore drilling rig, left 20 Arab workers dead or missing and dealt a crippling blow to a 4-year hunt for oil under the Persian Gulf.

The disaster struck a 1,200-ton steel floating tower of the Shell Oil Co. last Thursday night in the shallow waters of the Gulf that separate the rich oil fields of Iran and Saudi Arabia.

A spokesman for Shell, which had invested more than \$25 million in the maritime search, said: "Although the platform is still standing, it is doubtful whether it can be salvaged. An examination is being made by experts from abroad."

Oilmen expressed belief it would take two years to get steel for a new platform and that this might influence the company to abandon offshore drilling in this area—part of a complex of oil-rich desert lands that is a part of one of the largest groups of American technicians living outside the United States.

Delayed advice gave this picture of the incident: The rig, similar to those used in pioneering offshore drilling on the Continental Shelf of the United States, was being prepared for re-

Bomb Hoax At Hartford High School

Hartford, Jan. 2 (AP)—After an anonymous telephone call about a bomb being placed in the building, 1,500 students at Bulkeley High School on Maple Ave., were evacuated shortly after noon today.

Hartford, Jan. 2 (AP)—Hartford Public High School turned 2,100 students into the street at 8:22 this morning, eight minutes before classes were to be resumed, after a hoax warning that a bomb had been planted in the school.

Two dozen firemen and policemen searched the three buildings making up the high school from attic to coal bins, but found nothing. Their search lasted two hours.

The students were just going to class after returning from Christmas vacation when it was decided to clear the building. Teachers notified each class and the youngsters were cut into the street in small groups.

Call to Detective Bureau The scare began with a telephone call to the Detective Bureau at 8:02 a.m. by Joseph P. MacDonald, 32, a taxi driver. He said later it was the voice of a man. The message was brief: "A bomb has been placed in Bulkeley High School," the caller said.

Captain MacDonald immediately called Principal Thomas J. Quirk at the high school. There was a brief consultation between MacDonald, Assistant Fire Chief Thomas F. Lee and Principal Quirk and it was decided the safest course was to close the school and search it.

"We had no time to lose," said Principal Quirk. "We have 2,100 youngsters here and we certainly couldn't take any chances."

Indian Mother Has Quint Girls

Madras, India, Jan. 2 (AP)—Police cordoned off the hospital in Pondichery today to keep back curious crowds thronging to see India's first quintuplets.

The quint, all girls, were born to a 29-year-old Indian servant woman living near Tiruvannamalai, 50 miles from Pondichery.

Mrs. Murialle Cornelle, 40, a nurse at the hospital, said the quint were the first in recorded Indian maternity history. They arrived in quick succession early on the day before New Year's.

They weighed, in order, 3 pounds, 8 ounces; 4 pounds, 6 ounces; 3 pounds, 8 ounces; 3 pounds, 12 ounces and 3 pounds, 5 ounces. They will be named on the 10th day, according to Hindu custom.

The Tamil-speaking mother, who earned about \$2 a month as a servant, wept as she said that her husband, 35, is unemployed and she already has three other daughters to bring up.

Doctors reported today that the quint, like their mother, are "doing fine."

Ice Rips, Traps Navy Freighter At Antarctica By DON GUY McMurdo Sound, Antarctica, Jan. 2 (AP)—A great ice floe, driven by near-hurricane winds, slammed the U. S. Navy freighter Arneb against the coast of Antarctica's frozen Ross Sea New Year's Day.

An ice berg ripped a 5-foot hole and a series of cracks in the Arneb's hull.

The powerful icebreaker Northwind crunched to the side of the stricken ship. Ice chunks bent one of the Northwind's propellers. Today, both ships were trapped in the grinding ice pack, struggling to fight free.

Capt. Nels C. Johnson of the Arneb radioed that water was trickling through the cracked seams, but pumps had the flooding under control so far.

The jagged hole 5 feet long and 16 inches wide—was above the deck on the starboard side. The Arneb's crew mustered in the holds to shift the cargo and shore up the torn sides with timbers.

Probes Continuing In Cathedral Ruins

Hartford, Jan. 2 (AP)—Two groups of men probed the skeleton of St. Joseph's Cathedral yesterday as one studying the possibility of restoring the structure, and the other seeking the cause of the fire that destroyed it.

St. Joseph's, mother church of Connecticut Roman Catholics, was destroyed by a fire that raged out of control for more than four hours Monday. The loss was estimated at \$5 million.

City Building Inspector William J. Ennis said the fire did not weaken the thick stone walls of the church and added that he thought it could be restored.

Ennis scheduled studies of the 64-year-old cathedral with his staff and engineers, and the architect and contractor for the Archdiocese of Hartford.

A reason Not Indicated Meanwhile, Police Chief Michael J. Godfrey said there are no indications the fire was the work of an arsonist.

Legislative Joint Call Possibility

Washington, Jan. 2 (AP)—President Eisenhower wants to appear before a special session of Congress on Friday to urge that he be given standby authority to take prompt action against any Communist aggression in the Middle East, Speaker of the House Rayburn (D-Tex.) said today.

Rayburn told newsmen Eisenhower's plan is acceptable to House leaders, but that he would not speak for the Senate, which would have to agree to any plan for a special joint meeting.

Secretary of State Dulles meanwhile will talk to House leaders this afternoon on the subject, Rayburn added.

Speed-up Schedule Rayburn spoke shortly after White House press secretary James C. Hagerty disclosed a speed-up schedule to get fast Congressional action on the major foreign policy question.

Rayburn said administration officials had asked him whether it would be all right for Eisenhower to speak to a special joint session Friday, and that "I told them it would be all right to come."

The Texas Democrat said the Senate would agree to the joint session was still up in the air in view of a session-opening fight threatened over a proposed change in Senate rules.

However, Rayburn said, "I assume they (the Senate) would probably be willing to recess for a little while to hear the President of the United States—that's the usual procedure."

As for the briefing from Dulles, Rayburn said the Secretary of State had been given a go-ahead on a request to talk to House leaders in Rayburn's office this afternoon.

Rayburn said Dulles would confer with chairman and senior Republican members of the Armed Services and Appropriations committees and with members of the Foreign Affairs committee. Presumably on hand, also, will be Rayburn and House GOP Leader Martin (Mass.) and their top lieutenants.

Hagerty had said earlier that White House and State Department liaison men were at work with key members of Congress on a request for Eisenhower's formal message dealing with the Middle East proposal.

And Hagerty held open the possibility that the message might be presented to House leaders with Congress convening tomorrow, next week was the

BRITAIN DENIES ABRIGATION London, Jan. 2 (AP)—Britain today rejected Egypt's abrogation of the 1954 British-Egyptian treaty giving this country conditional rights in territory the Suez Canal zone. Britain considers the pact still in force. The abrogation was announced last night by Egyptian Information Minister Abdel Kadir Hafez.

QUAKE IN ALEUTIANS Berkeley, Calif., Jan. 2 (AP)—University of California's seismograph recorded severe earth shocks last night centered near the remote Aleutian Islands of Alaska. The shocks ran up as high as 17s on the Richter Magnitude Scale. The 1964 earthquake in San Francisco had a 8.25 rating.

RAILWAY STRIKE SET Montreal, Jan. 2 (AP)—Operations on the Canadian Pacific Railway's 17,000-mile network ground toward a halt today in preparation for a 4 p.m. (local time) strike call. A nearby part of Canada's rail system was affected.

Wind, Snow Block Rescue of Pair 11 Days on Mt. Blanc

Chamonix, France, Jan. 2 (AP)—An 80-mile wind and continuing snowstorm today again prevented rescuers from reaching two frost-bitten mountain climbers marooned 12,000 feet up on Mt. Blanc for the past 11 days.

The two men, Jean Vincendon of France and Francois Henry of Belgium, spent another night aboard a damaged helicopter which made a crash landing while trying to rescue them two days ago. The four helicopter crew members and four other Army men parachuted from another helicopter last Saturday as marooned.

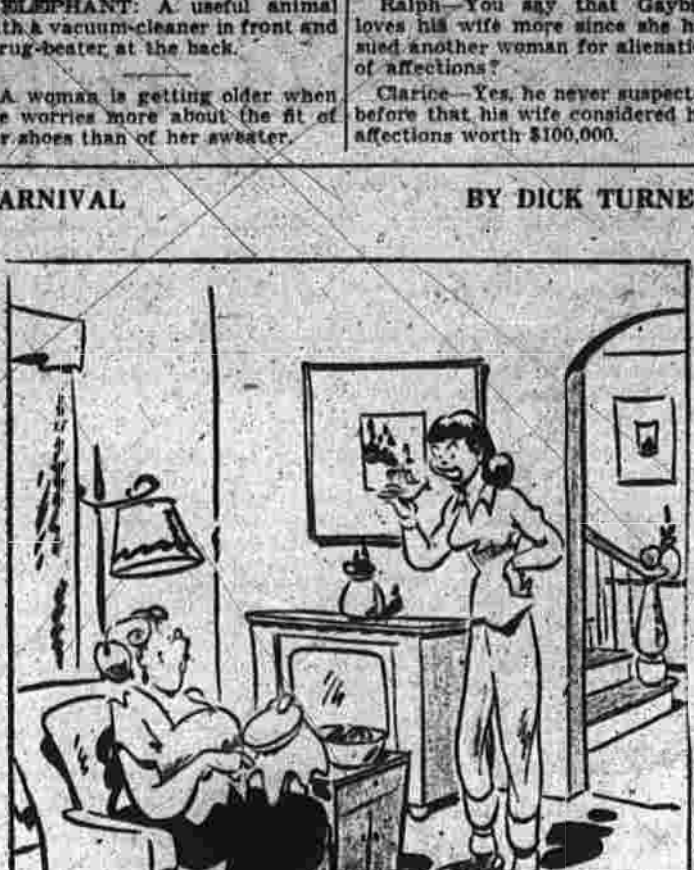

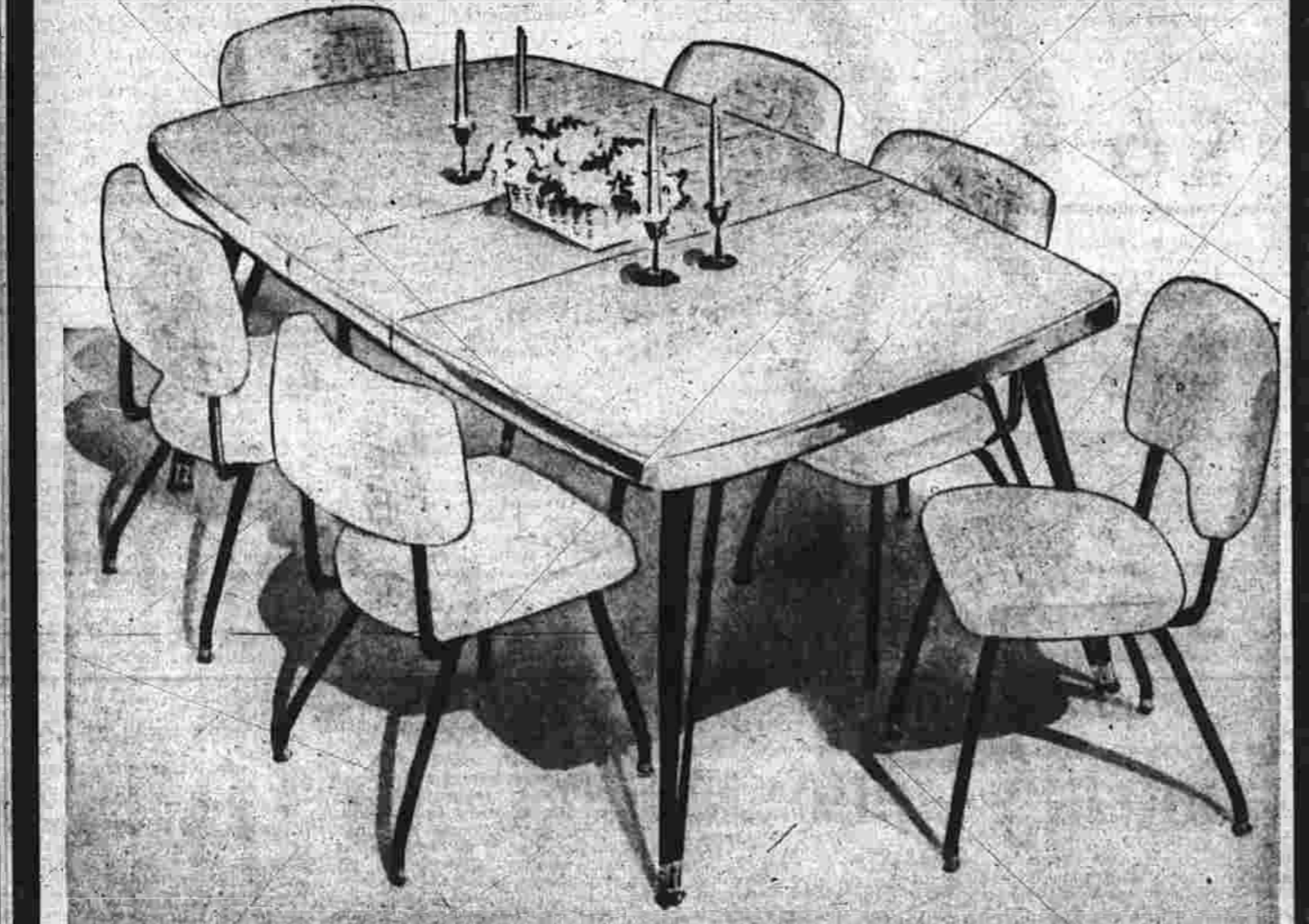

Some Answers On 21 Mill Tax
