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Bolton PTA to Hear Congress to Study Ike Anti-Red Plan

(Special)—A school on the teaching of the local elementary school will be the subject of the regular meeting of the Parents Teachers Assn. on Tuesday at 8 p. m. at the school.

The Republicans didn't like his resolution. They wanted it more strongly worded. The Democrats didn't like it. Eisenhower's proposal was dropped in the Senate already.

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State Police Rate Takes Sharp Dip

Hartford, Jan. 4 (AP)—Connecticut's police rate spiraled downward in 1956, the State Health Department reported yesterday. At the same time it urged increased use of the Salk Polio vaccine to bring about what it called statewide immunity.

A Policy Sharpens A Fact

No one can say the White House isn't getting last minute warnings about the impending announcement of a proposed new policy for the Near East is creating...

The White House itself, yesterday, reacted with nervous consternation to what, if it had not been for the impending announcement of new policy, would have been a routine statement of military fact.

It has been said before, without creating any particular commotion or uneasiness, in the White House that the subject of the Mediterranean is equipped with live atomic ammunition.

But when it was said again yesterday, in the report of an interview with General Randolph Pate, Marine Corps Commandant, it suddenly became a sensation, the subject of emergency State House conversation, and then the subject of White House statements designed to "play it down."

Why was something that has been said before, without creating comment or alarm, suddenly a sensation yesterday? The answer is a sensation yesterday because this nation and the world are expecting formal announcement of a new American policy in the affairs of the Near East.

In the old context of Eisenhower foreign policy, the presence of live atomic ammunition in the Mediterranean was a routine fact. In the context of the new policy, it is expected to be announced and presented, the same routine fact suddenly takes on a new significance, putting a dramatic atomic tip on the power, political diplomacy with which, or at least trying to fill that Near East vacuum.

If that is so, and they do not live rapidly, then they will have to be ignored, so that life can go on. 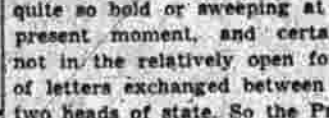
