Sees Move Boosting Tension with Soviet

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said today the United States would not invade any Middle East country to overthrow an already-installed government—no matter how that government got there.
A U.S. guarantee against overt red aggression plus economic aid, Dulles told Congress, is how President Eisenhower's Middle East manifesto counts on meeting the threat of Communist subversion.

Ike Plan Given Cool Reception By Most Arabs

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles testified today President Eisenhower's Middle East manifesto would increase tensions with Russia but would "stop World War III before it starts."
Dulles appeared before a jam-packed hearing of the House Foreign Affairs committee. He spoke from a prepared statement and then submitted to questions from committee members.
The Secretary appealed for congressional approval of "a rounded program of economic and military assistance" including advance authority for the President to use U.S. military forces against any "overt armed aggression" spawned by communism in the Middle East.
He was the first of a parade of administration witnesses called to detail the proposal which President Eisenhower presented at a special joint session of Congress Saturday.
"Area of Turbulence"
In an exchange with Chairman Gordon (D-Ill.) Dulles said the Soviet Union is seeking to make "an area of turbulence" out of the Middle East, and he added:
"I think, Mr. Chairman, we must recognize that this action may temporarily at least increase tensions with the Soviet Union."
But he said the purpose of the President's proposal is "to stop World War III before it starts."
Referring to the proposal's fight-it-we-must provision, Dulles said he has no doubt what Congress would do "international communism set out on a piecemeal conquest of the world by war."
"But until the Congress has actually spoken," he said, "there is doubt in the Middle East and there may be doubt in the Soviet Union."
In the Senate, Republican leader Knowland of California said that despite sharp criticism of the President's proposal he is confident Congress will approve "a statement of policy making it clear the country will not permit Soviet aggression in the Middle East."
"The details of this proposal are going to be subjected to scrutiny and possible revision," Knowland told reporters. "But I do not think

Moscow, Jan. 7 (AP)—Chou En-lai flew into Moscow today for a 3-day stopover en route to visits to two of the most crucial areas of the communist world—Poland and Hungary.

Soviet President Klementi Voroshilov, Premier Nikolai Bulganin and party boss Nikita Khrushchev were waiting to grasp Chou's outstretched hand as he emerged from the plane.
Also on hand were Deputy Premiers V. M. Molotov, Anastas Mikoyan, Lazar Kaganovich and Foreign Minister Dmitri Shepilov.
In a speech at the southern Siberian city of Irkutsk en route, Chou described the unity of Communist China and Russia as "the main guarantee of universal peace."

Kadar's 'New Look' Get-tough Stalinism

Marie Says Kidnapers Sought \$80,000 Ransom

Encino, Calif., Jan. 7 (AP)—Marie McDonald, "The Body" of filmland fame, says two swarthy men kidnaped her and set \$80,000 as the price they would ask for her return.
The glamorous blonde actress, wearing a white nightgown, burst into tears twice as she told a news conference in her bedroom yesterday that the men said they hoped to ransom her for \$20,000 each from these four persons:
Actor Michael Wilding, estranged husband of Miss McDonald, ranked by two attorneys, told newsmen in the same bedroom from which she said she was abducted.
The two men called Karl and her mother, she said, and dialed the telephone so she could talk to Wilding and Plant. Ransom wasn't mentioned in any of the calls.
"They wanted to build up worry with each call so that they would pay the ransom," Miss McDonald, flanked by two attorneys, told newsmen in the same bedroom from which she said she was abducted.
After she disappeared Thursday night male callers phoned Karl and Mrs. Tuboni and Miss McDonald phoned Wilding, Plant and movie columnist Harrison Carroll.
She said the men forced her to leave with them by threatening her sleeping children with a gun. She said she was taken to a house in the Los Angeles area where she was held most of Friday. The men gave her whiskey and pills, she said.
"I hid them in the hollow of my cheek and later got rid of them," she said. "They apparently thought the pills had knocked me out." It was then, she said, that she phoned Carroll.
She burst into tears as she told newsmen how her abductors had hit her "more than once." She

As the first showings pointed out the trend, it became apparent that the new clothes are designed to conform to the natural line of the body, to fit loosely and easily and to require no contortions of waist, bust or hips.
Slender Silhouette
You won't have to wear a straining waist cincher to fit into your new spring suit or dress. You won't have to pad your bustline or struggle to eliminate your hips. The new fashions allow the body to move inside its clothing.
The general silhouette is slender, but not in the sausage-casting sheath manner. Designers employ many ingenious methods to ease the fit of the new suits and dresses while maintaining the slim line. One of these peg-top skirts, still narrow at the hemline, but with slight fullness at the top, making it possible for a woman to eat a square meal and still fit into her skirt. Front or back panels also give the illusion of longer lines to the new suit in skirts, while concealing bulges and adding freedom of movement. The tunic skirt is seen in both suits and dresses, slender and proportioned to the height of the wearer.
