Ke for Excise Tax Extension

Washington, Jan. 8 (AP)—President Eisenhower and Republican Congressional leaders formally decided today to seek a continuance of about \$5 billion in excise and corporation taxes beyond the April 1 expiration date.

The decision was announced at the White House by Senate GOP leader Knowland of California. It underscored what administration leaders previously have said are dim prospects for any major tax reduction this year.

Knowland announced the decision after he and other GOP congressional leaders had conferred with the President for about 90 minutes. It was the first of the regular Tuesday morning White House sessions with the President and other GOP leaders.

At a news conference, Knowland and House Republican Leader Martin of Massachusetts reported that Eisenhower had agreed to draw up a proposed priority list of legislation. Knowland emphasized, however, that the President's sequence of legislation will be up to the Democrats in both the Senate and the House, because his party is in control of Congress.

Topping the GOP priority list was a call for speedy action on the administration's anti-Communist program for the Middle East. Eisenhower outlined his program for thwarting Red aggression in that area to the lawmakers in a special message last Saturday.

Knowland noted that the House Foreign Affairs Committee already has started hearings on the Middle East program. He estimated it may be two or three weeks before joint hearings planned by the Senate Foreign Relations and Arms Services committees are completed.

The President feels there is a need for early action, Knowland said. Eisenhower called on Congress to authorize an economic aid program coupled with standby authority to use U.S. military forces in the Middle East to head off any Communist aggression.

Next on the GOP priority list is legislation to extend \$3 billion in excise and corporation taxes now scheduled to expire April 1. The excise levies are on such items as liquor and cigarettes among others.

Knowland also announced that the administration plans to ask for about \$3 billion to finance a study of juvenile delinquency. The Senator added that details have not been worked out but the study probably will be a joint undertaking of federal, state and local governments.

The President believes this is a field which does need close attention by both the state and local governments and the federal government, Knowland said.

Another item on the priority list is Civil Rights legislation, and Knowland reiterated that Eisenhower intends to press for Congressional action on the administration program submitted to Congress at the last session.

The House approved the program last year, but it was stymied in the Senate under the threat of a filibuster by southern Democrats. One effort to revise Senate rules to make it easier to cut off a filibuster already has failed in the Senate this year.

South Windsor Seeks Changes In Bridge Plan

Hartford, Jan. 8 (AP)—Gov. Ribicoff today received a petition from 275 residents of South Windsor requesting a drastic revision in the plan for the Windsor-South Windsor bridge over the Connecticut River.

The petition, sponsored by Clarence T. Nicholson of Pleasant Valley Rd., South Windsor, a former chairman of that town's Planning and Zoning Commission specifically recommends:

1. That the bridge approaches run parallel with and near the river on the east side. The approach to the north of this bridge would intersect with Route 6 near the East Windsor town line, where the greatest population growth is to be made.

2. That a dike be extended from East Hartford north to East Windsor, and a dike be extended from East Windsor south to East Hartford, thereby eliminating flooding in South Windsor.

But in supporting the petition, Nicholson said that when the bridge is constructed, metropolitan water, sanitary sewer, natural gas, and electric lines will be short distance from the present meadow area which is necessary to attract large industrial concerns.

This area would become the most desirable site for a Connecticut thereby increasing prosperity in Hartford County, Nicholson said.

The tax rate in South Windsor would be sharply reduced when the industry is attracted to the area. The land would be worth \$5,000 to \$10,000 per acre based on the present cost of land in the Hartford North Meadow area, he continued.

Nicholson said he feels that many residents of South Windsor would be glad to see the bridge built.

East Reich Gets More Soviet Aid

Moscow, Jan. 8 (AP)—The Soviet Union has promised Communist East Germany more economic help and more control over Russian troops "temporarily" assigned to East Germany.

A communique signed last night at the Kremlin apparently did not go as far, however, as recent statements on the Soviet Government would have given any say-so on the number of Russian troops in East Germany and their movement about the country. This has been promised the Poles.

No Specific Pledge The East Berlin Radio said Russia had pledged that its troops would not interfere in East Germany's internal affairs, but it made no specific pledge in the official text of the communique. Poland was given such a guarantee in an agreement signed in Moscow in December.

Signing of the communique came after a meeting between Soviet leaders and East German delegates headed by Premier Otto Grotewohl. The talks took place in an atmosphere of "great friendship," the statement said.

On the economic side, the Soviet Union said it would grant East Germany during 1957 a credit of 20 million rubles (\$45 million at Russia's official rate of exchange) in gold and free currencies for the purchase of machinery and equipment by the national economy of East Germany.

The two countries also agreed to "increase substantially" the volume of trade between them during 1957, with East Germany pledging to increase its deliveries to East Germany by 30 per cent over 1956. The communique did not say what a 30 per cent boost would mean in hard goods. Last June Russia promised the East German trade and aid worth 7.1 billion marks (\$3,400,000,000 at the official rate).

The Soviet Union said it would increase its exports of coke, oil, and other raw materials.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation is almost half a century old, although until 1935 it was known simply as the Bureau of Investigation.

Few realize that in the protection of the country the FBI also maintains a rigid, round-the-clock system of checks and controls over its own agents and their activities.

Director J. Edgar Hoover can and does pick up his telephone and within a matter of minutes learns the name of the man who has been in contact with the FBI in the time, the case on which he is working and the progress being made.

The control system works in this fashion: The special agent in charge of the FBI's 52 field divisions are considered to be Hoover's "eyes and ears" in their respective areas. They are responsible directly to him for the work within the geographic area of their assignments. Each agent has a field supervisor who directs the work of agents and are responsible to him.

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Legislator Protesting Secret Dulles Parley

Washington, Jan. 8 (AP)—Rep. Wayne Hays (D-Ohio) stamped out of a House committee hearing today on President Eisenhower's emergency Middle East plan with a protest that the public wasn't admitted.

Hays denounced the "secrecy" he said was accorded to Secretary of State Dulles, "especially when Mrs. Dulles' policy seems to be getting in hot water."

"I've protested, and so have many others; that there are too many executive (closed) sessions around here, and I'm going to dramatize it," Hays told newsmen.

Hays said "there may be some merit" in the Eisenhower resolution proposing special authority to help keep peace in the Middle East. "But I don't think it will be debated behind closed doors," he added.

Young Steadard has been on crutches since last May when cancer forced the removal of his left leg above the knee. A medical bill of \$2,200 forced the lad's father, a private detective, to forego buying an artificial leg for his son. Blaine is one of five children. The boys hope to have the \$400 by fall.

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Egypt, Allies Weigh Ike's Mideast Plan

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Egypt and her three closest Arab neighbors today were reported working out a common stand toward the new Eisenhower doctrine.

Favorable comments on the Eisenhower plan were voiced by Arab leaders from pro-Western Lebanon to some normally anti-Western Syrian politicians. King Hussein of Jordan told the U.S. ambassador in his capital the number of points which could be acceptable to the Eisenhower doctrine.

In Cairo, the Egyptian government-backed French language newspaper Bourse Egyptienne ran an editorial generally approving the doctrine. Earlier Egyptian reaction had been almost universally cool.

Bourse attacked Communist bloc leaders for calling the Eisenhower doctrine a "new attempt to enslave the Arab world."

"We can differ with Eisenhower as to method and procedure," the paper said, "but to conclude that the United States is colonialist is unfair."

The Egyptian Middle East news agency in a dispatch from Damascus summed up the official attitude in Syria thus: "Official circles here have received the Eisenhower statement with caution, remarking it contained a number of points which could be acceptable to the free countries of the Mideast, while other points do not conform to the liberty and independence of those countries."

Knowland's Move

The announcement by Senator William F. Knowland that he will not seek reelection at the end of his present term in 1958 is immediately taken out as an announcement of retirement from public life, but as an announcement of an impending plunge into it from a different angle and base of operations.

Senator Knowland has, for the past four years, had an unblemished track record as Senate leader for an administration which has never really had the support of his own heart. As an individual, he has frequently clashed with its aims and criticized its policies. As formal leader of his party in the Senate, he has just as frequently endorsed his way through for a policy by himself would never have originated. The result was inevitable. He was never happy with himself, and the administration was never completely happy with him. He was always being wooed by the White House, and yet he always knew that the ultimate purpose of this White House wooing was to soften him down and change him into something he himself did not wish to be.

What was more important, this position of divided loyalty and responsibility kept him from striking out freely on his own for that role he really wanted—the role of leadership of the conservative wing of the Republican party.

He himself has viewed this potential role of his not as one of an ally to crusades such as Senator McCarthy, but as one of successor to the late Robert A. Taft.

Washington sees his retirement from the Senate as a decision to strike for that role openly and boldly.

It thinks his political course of action has already been charted. If it thinks he will run for Governor of California in 1958. This will not only be his own choice, but will offer him, as governor of a great key state, a stronger basis of operations toward the ultimate nomination than is usually afforded by a seat in the Senate.

It is the Republican nomination for President in 1960 which is considered his firm main goal.

The first hurdle in this scheme of political operation will be considerable, since Governor Knight of California is not likely to want to step modestly aside, and since Vice President Nixon, the third power in California, can recognize that if Knowland is the Presidential nominee in 1960 he himself will not be Knowland's quest for the California governorship will undoubtedly revive a Knight-Nixon coalition in California, dedicated to the stopping of Knowland at all costs.

If one were to guess now, one would say that a Knowland victory against this coalition would be unlikely.

Were Knowland to achieve victory in this round, he would still face, by all present indications, almost unmountable obstacles in the next round, in which he would be seeking the Presidential nomination itself.

There he would be up against not merely whatever organized party and backing Nixon himself might have built up by 1960, but something more important than the individual strength of Nixon or any other candidate.

This would be the instinct of a retiring President, who has openly proclaimed his reasons for a return and rejuvenation of his political party along middle of the road lines, to hand his own leadership on to some candidate who could be expected to continue and consolidate this coalition.

it was in 1956. But it will still be the most powerful single influence that can be exerted, and it will be backed by the awareness of every body that even a retiring President will still retain a grip on the loyalty of the nation's voters. So the odds are against Knowland. We do not suppose, however, that that prospect is unknown to him. From what we can read of his character, the odds do not make too much difference. Whatever our agreement or disagreement with Knowland's principles and policies, and it has usually been disagreement, his sincere dedication to these principles and policies has never been open to question, and to him it is obviously more important that these principles and policies have a champion than that any individual be guaranteed personal political success.

The Doctrine And Israel

A survey of reaction abroad to the doctrine of Israel is without its misgivings. Near East asked by President Eisenhower would indicate that there is, in all the world, only one Arab nation which is clearly enthusiastic about it.

No Arab state in the region, even those otherwise friendly to Israel, without its misgivings. A friendly nation in Europe has been, in date, more than polite about the new policy. It is perhaps at Georgetown that Nehru of India is relatively mild in his criticism of the policy which President Eisenhower has requested. The main thing Britain and France see in the policy is that it is reaching for authority to do the same kind of thing they say they tried to do in the Near East, only to encounter opposition.

The one nation which does seem to approve, wholeheartedly, is the nation of Israel. And its situation, and its motives, are understandable.

Its resort to force against Egypt intensified, rather than lessened, Arab enmity to the very existence of Israel. Its resort to force brought on in the condemnation of the United Nations, in which condemnation the United States took leadership. And there was one more result. Soviet Russia turned positively savage in its attitude toward Israel, and began talking like the Arabs, of Israel as a nation which had merited its own destruction.

The situation left Israel with one potential friend in the world—the United States. This was so even if the United States had let the United Nations condemnation of the attack on Egypt. It was so even if Israel itself had chosen to rely on its own military might rather than upon frequent United States pledges that we would defend Israel against Arab attack.

For Israel, the new American policy means that one potential friend, the United States, would be moving into the Near East situation with a big stick designed to assure order and stability to the region, and specifically to protect Israel against any new Arab attack backed or encouraged directly or indirectly by Russia.

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"Under the present conditions, we can understand that feeling, and we believe that 'humanity must guarantee life to Israel. But we would point out that another part of the proposed new American policy is the expanded program of American arms to Arab states, and that we are, therefore, intensifying the role of the sword in the area not only in our own hands, but in other hands than ours. Any true security in the area, for anybody, must await the creation of stronger, wiser, more basic weapons."
