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Youths Seized As Killers of Hartford Pair

Det. Capt. Joseph F. McDonald said robbery was the apparent motive in the slaying of Mrs. McChesney, who lived at the same address as the victim.

McDonald said it was known in the neighborhood that Mrs. McChesney, a Negro, carried large sums of money. When her body was examined by medical authorities yesterday, \$2,000 was found pinned to her underclothing.

Mrs. McChesney's body was found in the back seat of her car in a Pleasant St. parking lot.

McDonald said information

picked up during a routine check of the street of Hartford, also a Negro, last night at the New Haven home of his sister, Mrs. Lucille Giles, 17 Shepherd St.

According to McDonald, a pair of Mexican cowboy boots figured in the slaying of Mrs. McChesney.

McDonald said after the boots were found in Ruritan's second-hand store, furniture truckman Philip Sander of Hartford told, giving the boots to a hitchhiker he carried from Wyoming to Hartford.

The two murders were among seven in the Hartford area within a month.

Mrs. McChesney's battered body was found in the back seat of her car Wednesday morning after her empty purse was found in the parking area.

In the same parking lot, police found a fur coat with the initials "P. M." Police said the pockets of the coat contained policy slips for

The Anglin's told police they were left there by the killer.

\$12,000 Pledged MMH Drive In Memory of W. J. Thornton

A \$12,000 gift has been subscribed to the Manchester Memorial Hospital building fund in memory of William J. Thornton by his widow, Mrs. Alice F. Thornton, and his son William B. Thornton.

The gift, which is the first memorial subscription to be announced, was given "as tangible living evidence of the memory of William J. Thornton and his good will toward the community where he lived."

This contribution will assure the creation of an electrocardiography and basal metabolism room on the ground floor of the new wing of the expanded hospital which will be established in Thornton's memory.

Thornton died in 1955. Thornton played a prominent part in the life of his community. His many activities included: St. Mary's Church; directorship with The Manchester Trust Co. and Manchester Savings and Loan Assn.; member of the State House of Representatives; and, in 1921, founder of the Manchester Sand & Gravel Co. of which his son is now president.

Windows Smashed in Home Of Florida Bias Ban Leader

Tallahassee, Fla., Jan. 17 (AP)—A home of a Florida bias ban leader was smashed by gunfire last night during a meeting of the Negro Inter-City Council.

The disorder was the most recent in a long series of riotous integration difficulties here.

About 20 white persons attended the Council meeting. They were identified as members of the State University. They were scattered through the church where the meeting was held.

The Rev. C. K. Steele, president of the Council, told the meeting that "no group of Negroes could move freely in and out of white communities as long as young men are being moved in our community with rocks and shooting guns without being arrested."

Broken by Shotgun Pellets

After he went home Steele reported that two windows of his home had been broken by shotgun pellets. He also said the window of a car owned by Dr. M. C. Williams, Negro dentist who is the Council's secretary, was smashed with a brick. The car had been parked near the church.

Steele's home is next door to the church. Members of his family were not at home.

ty in the administration at all," he said.

Hours after the news confirms the question of his leaving was put "politically" and Humphrey scoffed at the idea.

"That's ridiculous," he said. "I'll leave some day, of course, but this budget won't have anything to do with it."

He named one thing that might make him leave—cutting tax and running deficits to cure a depression. That was another matter, because President Eisenhower has said that tax reduction and public works are in the government's arsenal of anti-depression weapons. And, said Eisenhower three years ago, "we shall not hesitate to use any or all of these weapons as the situation may require."

Humphrey said he wasn't criticizing the administration for the size of the budgets. But he said the "trend" of federal budgets "should promptly be stopped."

"The size of the budget, a record for a price year and the fifth highest in the nation's history, spurs congressional demands for sharp appropriations, on which spending is based."

Although contemplated spending for the coming fiscal year would be nearly \$3 billion more than the current year, the budget Eisenhower sent to Congress would be in balance for the third year in a row, assuming anticipated increases in government income are borne out.

The President forecast a year-end surplus of \$1,800,000,000 which he said would be applied toward reduction of the \$272 billion national debt, now costing more than \$7 billion annually in interest charges.

Members are known to feel that if Congress could cut the size of the budget, it would be a step toward providing tax relief in 1958, congressional action here. No sooner had Eisenhower's message been read than a partisan argument broke out on the House floor.

Chairman Cannon (D-Mo.) of the House Appropriations committee said he would be applying to the President for a "new-found attitude" about the effects of inflation on the American people. Hallock (D-Iowa) said that in past years Cannon was one of those "feeding the beast" and that he would be trying to put them out.

In an interview today, Rep. Taber of New York, senior Republican member of the Appropriations committee, said the budget "was and will" be cut by Congress.

"There is a tremendous lot of waste, especially in the defense department," Taber said.

While there has been some inflation, he added, three-fourths of it came from the Truman administration.

the heels of the British-French invasion of Egypt, was a mistake.

If the military aspect had been dropped or minimized, the program would have been hard to beat, one diplomat said.

Another diplomat told a reporter: "They know public attacks on the plan are not enough and they are seeking more effective means of combat."

The Kremlin desperately seeks something more effective than a mere propaganda fight, the diplomat said.

They agreed that despite boasts of prosperity, the Soviet Union is in no condition to match U.S. offers of economic help in the Middle East.

"Heavy demands at home and within the family of satellites is placing a severe strain on the Soviet Union's own liquid resources," one source observed.

"Today the satellites are leaning on the Soviet Union instead of contributing to its development."

"And the cost of keeping other east European Communist nations in a fairly healthy condition gets higher and higher each year."

Published agreements with other Communist nations in the last two months reflect the heavy strain on Soviet foreign exchange and food reserves in Poland, Rumania and East Germany, as well as smaller demands by other Communist countries.

"This economic picture shows the Soviet Union is in a position where it is unable to meet the demands of its satellites," one source said.

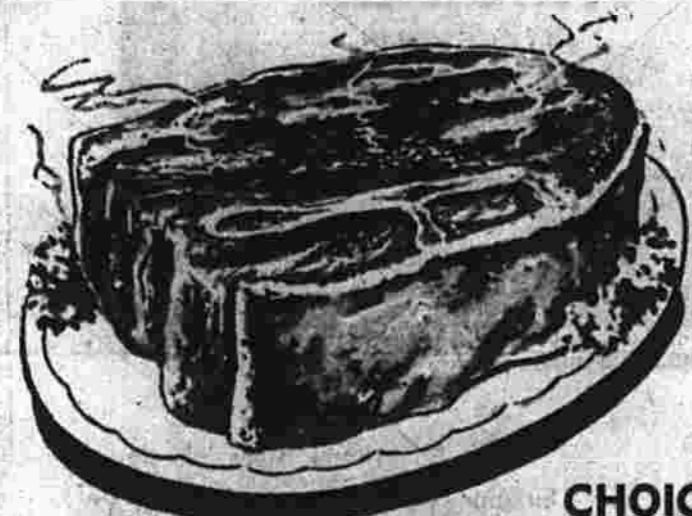

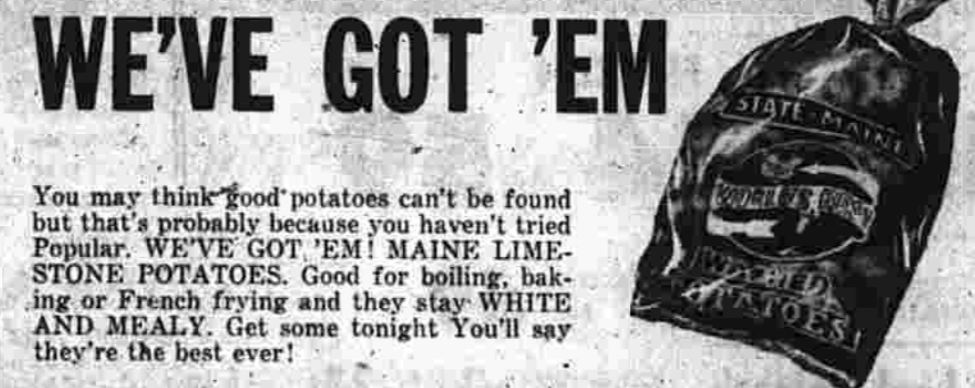

He was a standout basketball player with the local Polish-American's of the middle 1930's and 40's and was once town recreation director.

Jury Rejects Handler Suit

A Hartford County Common Pleas jury rejected a \$5,000 law suit brought by Morton Handler, 22, of 39 Gerard St., Tuesday after deliberating only four minutes.

The suit was brought against Anthony Bayles, 33, of 90 Woodbridge St., by Handler who claimed he was injured May 29, 1933, when his motor scooter and Bayles' car collided at Oak and Spruce Sts. Handler claimed Bayles was negligent because, among other things he went through a stop sign. The defense countered that Handler himself was negligent because he was operating the scooter at an unreasonable speed and failed to keep a proper lookout. The defense said that Handler crashed into the rear of the Bayles car which already was through the intersection when the crash occurred. The verdict was accepted and ordered recorded by Judge Vins R. Parmelee.
