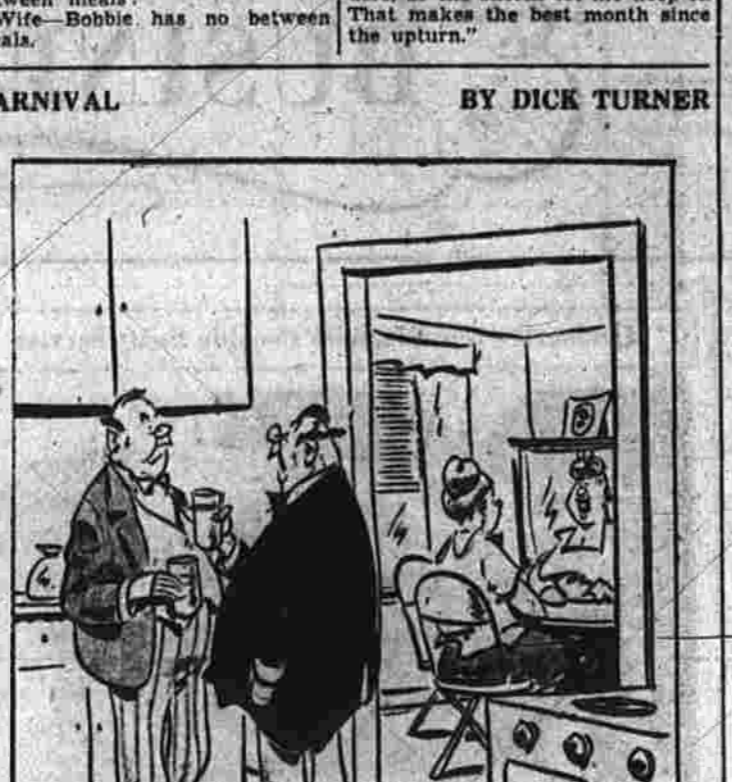

**We Don't Like The News**  
 We don't like the thought that  
 the news offers us.

What is a typical day in the  
 news?

One of the features we can al-  
 most depend upon is a headline  
 somewhere in Connecticut, for  
 an insignificant amount of cash.

From elsewhere, we can expect  
 a sex murder.

One or several planes are down  
 or crashed, with or without casu-  
 alties.

Usually, somebody has been  
 killed on the highways in Con-  
 necticut, and more injured.

Lately, one can count upon a  
 bombing or a shooting from the  
 segregation war in Alabama.

This season of the year, we can  
 count on at least one disaster  
 fire a day, usually with loss of  
 life.

Death and injury, crime and  
 violence, accident and disaster,  
 crash and flames—these leap at  
 us so consistently from the news-  
 paper's front pages that we begin  
 to wonder what some future reader  
 would think life in our time was  
 like.

Is all this the true reflection of  
 American civilization in the year  
 1957?

Is this really the way we live?  
 Do these things characterize us as  
 a people?

We know what we are supposed  
 to say, at this point. We are sup-  
 posed to say that this is merely  
 the sensational surface, front-page  
 summary, which accentuates the  
 violent and the unpleasant, and  
 never emphasizes the steady cur-  
 rent of decency and normal living  
 which runs along beneath the lurid  
 surface. We are supposed to say  
 these things are not really civiliza-  
 tion, 1957.

We'll say these things, some day  
 when there isn't a senseless hold-  
 up murder a few miles away, a  
 depraved sex murderer somewhere  
 else, a bomb in Montgomery, and  
 the morgue for a Sunday motorist.

**Above Reproach**

Against the opinion of all those  
 who persist in trying to classify  
 his career as partisan one way  
 or another, United Nations Sec-  
 retary General Hammarskjöld con-  
 tinues to how close to the line of  
 law and principle in his dealings  
 with the complications of the Near  
 East situation.

His report, the other day, on the  
 failure of Israel to complete its  
 withdrawal from the territory it  
 occupied in its October attack,  
 was a piece of work in point. He  
 had to take his stand on the  
 illegality of the situation, which  
 requires an Israeli withdrawal, and  
 a withdrawal which is so far as  
 formal commitments are concerned,  
 should be unconditional.

At the same time, he was not  
 blind to the fact that the United  
 Nations has a future obligation to  
 see that Israel's withdrawal does  
 not merely lead to a reestablish-  
 ment of those small acts of war in  
 which Egypt was indulging itself  
 before the October attack.

Somewhere between these two  
 necessities, the one for Israel's  
 compliance with United Nations  
 vote and law, and the other for  
 Egypt's future compliance with  
 the same law, there ought to be  
 some informal accommodation, by  
 which Israel is assured that, al-  
 though its compliance must come  
 first, the United Nations will then  
 be equally firm with Egypt.

 the Near East situation would  
 stop trying to judge that Ham-  
 marskjöld is pro-Arab when he  
 tries to apply law to Israel, and  
 pro-Israel when he tries to apply
