Furor Delays Wilson Move

Washington, Feb. 1 (AP)—Rising criticism of Secretary of Defense Wilson's remarks about the National Guard and his wife's reaction to that outcry raised this question today: How long before he resigns? For Wilson to quit now would make it appear he was getting out under fire.

Also, he has indicated to newsmen he planned to stay on at least until the end of the fiscal year on the military budget late this spring or in the summer.

But that was several weeks ago—before his statement to the House Armed Services committee Monday that "a sort of scandal... a draft dodging business"—developed during the Korean War when Wilson, then 18, the minimum draft age, could enlist in the National Guard "and not be drafted to fight."

This set off angry outcries from National Guard leaders—one of whom called it "a damn lie"—and from members of Congress, some of whom demanded his resignation.

Then came President Eisenhower's comment at his news conference Wednesday that Wilson's remark was "unwise."

And yesterday Mrs. Wilson spoke up indignantly, saying Eisenhower's news conference criticism of her husband was "appalling." She also said "we think he (her husband) has earned the right to take leave now."

The White House had no comment on Mrs. Wilson's blast. Wilson never has shown much deep concern over previous claims in Congress for his resignation. It is known that Mrs. Wilson had been urging him to retire for a year or more before this most recent incident.

Mrs. Wilson said in an interview it wasn't true that she had asked Wilson to resign for "his own health." However, Mrs. Wilson was hospitalized in 1954 for treatment of her lungs. She was in the midst of his latest uproar—she left Walter Reed Army Hospital after undergoing a heart operation.

Canada Cuts Support Of U.S. Plan on Sinai

United Nations, N. Y., Feb. 1 (AP)—Canada has decided not to sponsor a U.S.-backed resolution aimed at breaking the Sinai desert deadlock, informed sources said today.

The informant said Canada's Foreign Minister Lester B. Pearson decided to withdraw sponsorship on the ground the resolution is not strong enough to bring a real solution to the Egyptian-Israeli dispute.

The break came as the 40-nation General Assembly prepared to take up the crucial Middle East debate once again.

Informants said that in its present form—modified to insure the support of Egypt—the resolution should be watered down to a level from the Gaza Strip and the Gulf of Aqaba area to be followed by Israeli-Egyptian negotiations with the terms of the 1949 Armistice agreement.

Pearson reportedly felt the resolution ought to state that U.N. Emergency Force (UNEF) troops should be stationed in Gaza, the Sharm el Sheikh area and along the armistice line. Pearson was said to have stated in his remarks that Egypt would never give up such a strongly worded resolution.

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The spokesman said substantial progress had been in conference reached among nations with troops in the U.N. Emergency Force. He noted that the resolutions would command strong support in the Assembly. The United States will sponsor the resolution along with several Asian, Latin American and Scandinavian nations.

Airliner Hits Schoolyard; Seven Dead, 78 Boys Hurt

Van Nuys, Calif., Feb. 1 (AP)—Seven dead and 78 hurt in the toll of two colliding planes, one an airliner that smashed into a crowded schoolyard where its landing gear broke, where southern California House members united in a demand for an investigation.

The 4-engine transport, on its final test flight, collided at 20,000 feet yesterday with a jet fighter, also being tested over the San Fernando Valley. The transport came down in a screaming dive, disintegrating as it fell.
