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Putnam Firm In Comeback

Boston, Feb. 8 (AP)—The comeback of a Connecticut firm, more than a year and a half after it was wiped out in the August 1955 flood, was reported today.

The New England Canning, a private regional development organization, said that the Putnam Canning Co., which dyes, bleaches and finishes synthetic piece goods, has taken over an idle mill in Putnam.

The former plant, in the Mechanicville district of Thompson, was destroyed by the Goldenberg River flood, and an accompanying fire.

In the plant of the former Putnam Mills Corp., closed since 1954, Putnam finishing has installed new machinery, but for the present will go into production with fewer than the 200 persons it employed at the peak of its operations.

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The only item showing a drop was food—down two-tenths of one per cent.

Here are some of the things which went up: Medical care—12.8 per cent; clothing—2.3; housing, which includes the purchase price of new homes, repairs and maintenance—1.1; rent—10.8; transportation, which includes the price of new and used cars, repairs on them, and fares on buses, trolleys, and trains—2.6.

Others which went up: Reading and recreation, which includes motion picture theater prices, the price on TV and radio sets, and newspapers—1.4 per cent; personal care, which includes toilet articles, and prices in beauty and barber shops—4.1; and other goods and services, which includes tobacco, alcohol, legal services, and so on—6.4 per cent.

Man Dies at 70

Boston, Feb. 8 (AP)—Prof. Zachariah Chafee Jr., 70, associated for years with Harvard's law faculty and an ardent champion of civil liberties, died today in Philadelphia. He was a patient since suffering a heart attack at his American home Sunday.

Prof. Chafee gained national renown as an author and lecturer, especially on human rights and civil liberties.

He was accused in July, 1952 by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) of signing a petition to release Communist leader Earl Browder who was serving a 30-year sentence.

Chafee said he hadn't signed, although asked to do so, and added he thought Browder had served long enough.

In 1947 he was appointed to the United Nations sub-committee on Freedom of Information and the press and represented the U.S. in 1948 at Geneva at an International Conference on Freedom of Information.

He leaves, among others, his widow, the former Bea Frank Seal. They had four children.
