Washington, March 1 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles got a "wait and see" response today when he sought to sell the Arab bloc on Israel's troop withdrawal plan.

United Nations, N. Y. March 1 (AP)—Israel prepared to announce today its decision to withdraw from the Gaza Strip and the Gulf of Aqaba area.

The Israeli delegation disclosed that Foreign Minister Golda Meir would appeal out the withdrawal plans before the General Assembly at an afternoon session.

However, India's envoy, V. K. Krishna Menon, took sharp issue this morning with the position taken by the United States in the negotiations which led to the Israeli agreement to pull back behind the 1949 armistice lines.

Ike Places Stassen Under Dulles' Rule

Washington, March 1 (AP)—President Eisenhower today directed Harold E. Stassen, his disarmament aide, to operate from now on under the policy guidance of Secretary of State Dulles.

Dulles and Stassen announced the new policy to newsmen at the White House after they had conferred with Eisenhower.

Dulles said the shift means "no change" in Stassen's title as a special assistant to the president on disarmament matters.

The secretary added, however, that effective at once Stassen will report to him instead of to the president, and will be under State Department policy supervision.

There have been reports that Dulles has been dissatisfied with operation of Stassen's office as what in effect has been a foreign policy function independent of the State Department.

Dulles announced that the change will not affect Stassen's status as chairman of the U.S. delegation at a meeting of the United Nations Disarmament subcommittee in London starting March 15.

There also have been reports that Stassen plans to resign after the London conference. He denied those reports today but refused to say whether he intends to leave government service later to bid for

the governorship of Pennsylvania, his adopted state. "I am not going to make any political statement whatsoever," Stassen said.

A number of Republicans have been sharply critical of Stassen since his unsuccessful effort last summer to dump Vice President Nixon from the No. 2 spot on the GOP ticket.

Dulles said that when Stassen stated his disarmament mission, with instructions to report directly to Eisenhower, it was "not appropriate" that Stassen be identified with any single government department.

Thomas to Quit As Navy Boss

Undersecretary Thomas S. Gates is due to succeed Thomas. Pentagon sources had disclosed the plan before Thomas made his own remarks.

Taborsky Plotted to Shoot Way to Freedom: Culombe

Hartford, March 1 (AP)—A plan to shoot his way to freedom was worked out by Joseph L. Taborsky as he sat with Arthur Culombe in the detention pen of New Britain Police Court Tuesday morning.

This was a previously undisclosed revelation made by Culombe after he started to confess on Wednesday, State Police Lt. Samuel S. Rome said today.

Culombe, in eight signed confessions, yesterday named Taborsky as the "Mad Killer" sought for months in connection with recent fatal holdups throughout the state.

"Culombe said that when they were confined in New Britain in the court room, Taborsky said that he was going to make an attempt to grab an officer's gun," continued Rome, who is in field supervision of the holdup-slayings investigation.

Taborsky said that he was going to shoot as many as he could if he got the chance.

Plans Frustrated "He told Culombe if it happened, to make for the crowd and that maybe both of them could get away."

"We feel that the plans were frustrated because all officers handcuffed to Taborsky had been temporarily relieved of their guns. This had been done as a precautionary measure."

The reason for the presence of Taborsky and Culombe in New Britain Police Court Tuesday was their arraignment, on holding charges of breach of the peace at that time.

Another development that came to light today was a report that an attempt had been made at the Hartford County Jail to pass a contraband article to Taborsky in his cell.

Maj. George H. Remer, administrator of the State Police headquarters, received a telephone call last night purporting to tell him about the episode.

The undisclosed caller said that a jail inmate had seen another inmate pass what appeared to be a red bill, wrapped in a dollar bill to Taborsky.

This happened allegedly when various prisoners were being taken from their cells Thursday morning for transportation to court.

Rome and five investigators rushed to the jail as a result of the call and had Taborsky removed from his cell temporarily. The officers, assisted by jail guards, made a thorough inspection of the cell and all adjacent premises.

Meanwhile, Dr. John J. Karoly, jail physician, was summoned and was told to give Taborsky a thorough examination.

Nothing turned up as a result of the shake-down and Taborsky was returned to his cell.

Rome said this morning that Taborsky admitted that a jail inmate had tried to pass him what looked like a dollar bill but had failed because a jail guard was standing nearby. Taborsky said that such an occurrence was not uncommon when men were being held in deadlock, according to the lieutenant.

The jail-inmate who was supposed to have made this attempt was located and denied doing anything. Taborsky said that this was not the one who had made the attempt.

Ike Complains Of Cough, May Visit Arizona

Washington, March 1 (AP)—President Eisenhower complained about his cough again today and suggested he would like to get away to a warm, dry climate for awhile.

The President has been bothered by a cough for several weeks. It has been hanging on since January when he caught a cold while watching the inaugural parade which marked the start of his second term.

At the White House this morning, Eisenhower conferred with John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, and other members of a Citizens Advisory Committee set up to study the United States foreign aid program.

Wants Dry Climate Photographers in the President's office heard him tell Lewis that he hasn't been able to get rid of his cough and that it might be a good idea for him to get away for awhile to a warm, dry climate. He mentioned Tucson, Ariz., as a possibility.

Newsmen later asked Murray Snyder, assistant White House press secretary, whether Eisenhower was actually planning such a trip.

Snyder replied he had no knowledge of any such plan. Reporters also asked Snyder for an opportunity to interview Eisenhower's physician, Maj. Howard M. Snyder, regarding the cough.

If that leads back a club or a diamond, you can finesse the ten of club. If East has the queen, it rides up to dummy's ace-queen. If East has the king, it rides up to dummy's ace-king.

Partner choice. This is one diamond. The next play passes you. You hold spades-7-8. Hearts-A-K-Q. Clubs-10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2. Diamonds-A-4. Clubs-10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2.

What do you do? Answer: Bid one heart. The immediate jump to four hearts should indicate a solid suit without side suits.
