

Eisenhower Set to Sign Resolution

By LEWIS GALNICK Washington, March 7 (AP)-The House today passed and sent to President Eisenhower a resolution declaring the United States is willing to fight if necessary to resist communist aggression in the Middle East. The roll call vote was 350-60.

Voting for the resolution were 186 Democrats and 164 Republi-cans. Against were 33 Democrats and 27 Republicans. The House acted by quickly adopting the Senate version o the resolution which Eisenhower sought on an urgent basis two months ago. The Senate finally passed the bill Tuesday night, 72-19.

The measure also gives Eisenhower greater leeway in spending \$200 million in military-economic aid to the troubled area between now and July 1.

The House, which originally passed it in administration-re quested form Jan. 30 by a 355-61 count, stamped final approval on the resolution as modified by the enate only after a last-minute flurry of pros and cons. 



Real's and personal property within the limits of the South Manchester Fire District (SMFD) will be taxed at 1.6 mills for the period beginning Nov. 1, 1956 t June 30. District taxpayers levied the tax proposal recommended by Dis-trict Commissioners at the special meeting last night in Nathan Hale School. Some 30 persons, most of them either regular or volunteer firemen, attended the "final"
