Coventry 432-Pupil Junior High Pushed by School Unit

Coventry, March 8 (Special)—The Board of Education is taking concrete steps to speed action on getting town approval for a new 432-pupil junior high school.

The school under consideration would be 18 rooms, and cost a total of \$475,000. Of this total, \$30,000 would be for actual construction; \$445,000 for architect fees; \$20,000 for site development and \$20,000 for equipment; and \$100,000 for miscellaneous items.

The school would be approximately 24,750 square feet and would handle 432 pupils for an average allotment of 55 square feet per pupil.

Live Wires Trap Four in Vehicle

Four persons were trapped in their car by "hot primary wires" yesterday afternoon when a preceding car crashed into a utility pole.

The unidentified persons who were trapped remained in their car until the power in the wires was turned off by the Connecticut Power Co.

Youths Held Ideas Worth \$2,099 To Ellington Worker For Stealing School Safe

Vernon, March 8 (Special)—Two 16-year-old boys who were arrested early this morning near Vernon Center on Rt. 30 with a 256-pound school safe, containing about \$175, in their possession, Donald Stevens, REP-D, and Thomas Nelson, Hartford, were stopped in a car they were riding by State Police man William Tomlin about 3:30 a.m. for what was a "routine check."

In the rear of the black, 1950 sedan, Tomlin noticed the 30 by 20-inch safe and an acetylene torch.

Moving Staff for Night

It is standard procedure for State Police to stop suspicious-looking vehicles in the early morning hours. When Tomlin questioned the pair, they told him they were moving "stuff" to Ellington.

On closer examination Tomlin noticed the safe in the back seat and got the boys to get out. They took it from the Vernon Elementary School car last night.

Tomlin said they were unable to get the safe door open but already removed the handle from the door.

Eric Weeks, principal of the school told police there was from \$175 to \$200 in the safe. Attempts to contact Vernon for further information were unsuccessful.

The youths, who are still being questioned at Stafford Springs barracks, are being held under \$3,000 bond for arraignment in Rockville City Court Monday.

They are charged with breaking, entering, larceny and possession of burglary tools, police said.

Lt. Harry Taylor commended Tomlin for his "alert" police work, which resulted in the quick apprehension of the youths.

The project figures of the committee showed that for the school year 1960-61 the proposed building would be immediately filled to capacity, Potter, said.

Mr. Edmondson said that the committee recommended the construction of the proposed junior high school should start in September 1958, for grades 7 through 9.

For the school year 1960-61 the projected figure is 1,111 for grades 7 through 9 and 448 for grades 10 through 12.

On the basis of 27 pupils to a room, the present 38 rooms in the elementary school system could take care of such pupils through 1959-60.

At 30 pupils per room the committee reports we would be able to handle 1,144, providing a surplus of 33 rooms for the grades 7 through 9 for this year.

Estimated enrollment September 1958 is 380 for grades 7 through 9, requiring 14 rooms at 27 pupils per room. At 30 pupils per room, the requirement would be 13 rooms, immediately filled to capacity.

Based on this judgment, the committee and Board support the proposed junior high school be constructed to provide for at least 18 rooms, to care for a projected enrollment for the 1960-61 year.

Financing of Project

Concerning financing the project, the committee's report covers the availability of funds and the town's ability to pay on the following basis: "We must project the 1957-58 total Grand tax. From past performance, we can expect about a \$200,000 increase. This will increase the total Grand tax to \$13,875,000.

"For school purposes, we may borrow a maximum of 10 per cent of the Grand tax which would amount to \$1,387,500. The town is now indebted for \$457,000, therefore we would be allowed \$730,500.

"However, on this debt, we will pay off approximately \$150,000 of interest and principal payment. We

Moses said he would like to see the recommendation of the professional group come to a separate vote in Rockville and in the Vermont State House. Unless the majority of voters in both areas favor the action, there will always be question as to the result.

Support Consolidation The committee candidate said he and the group urge his appointment will heavily support consolidation if that is the result of the survey. Referring to a bill on consolidation of town and city governments which was brought before the legislature two years ago, Moses said he served on a committee opposing that bill.

However, he explained his opposition at that time was because rural Vermont had not had a vote on the bill and because no provision had been made for the taxation of town and city governments.

Moses believes a good solution could be worked out that will be satisfactory to both the town and the city. He believes that the present plan would be willing to pay higher taxes to secure water, sewerage, police protection, street lighting and improve the fire department.

Moses said that he is not a political office seeker, but is very interested in the area, having lived here since 1911. The recent sale of his dairy herd will allow him time to spend on legislative work, he said.

"Yes," he replied quietly. "My family moved from the United States to Ireland when he was only 2 1/2 years old."

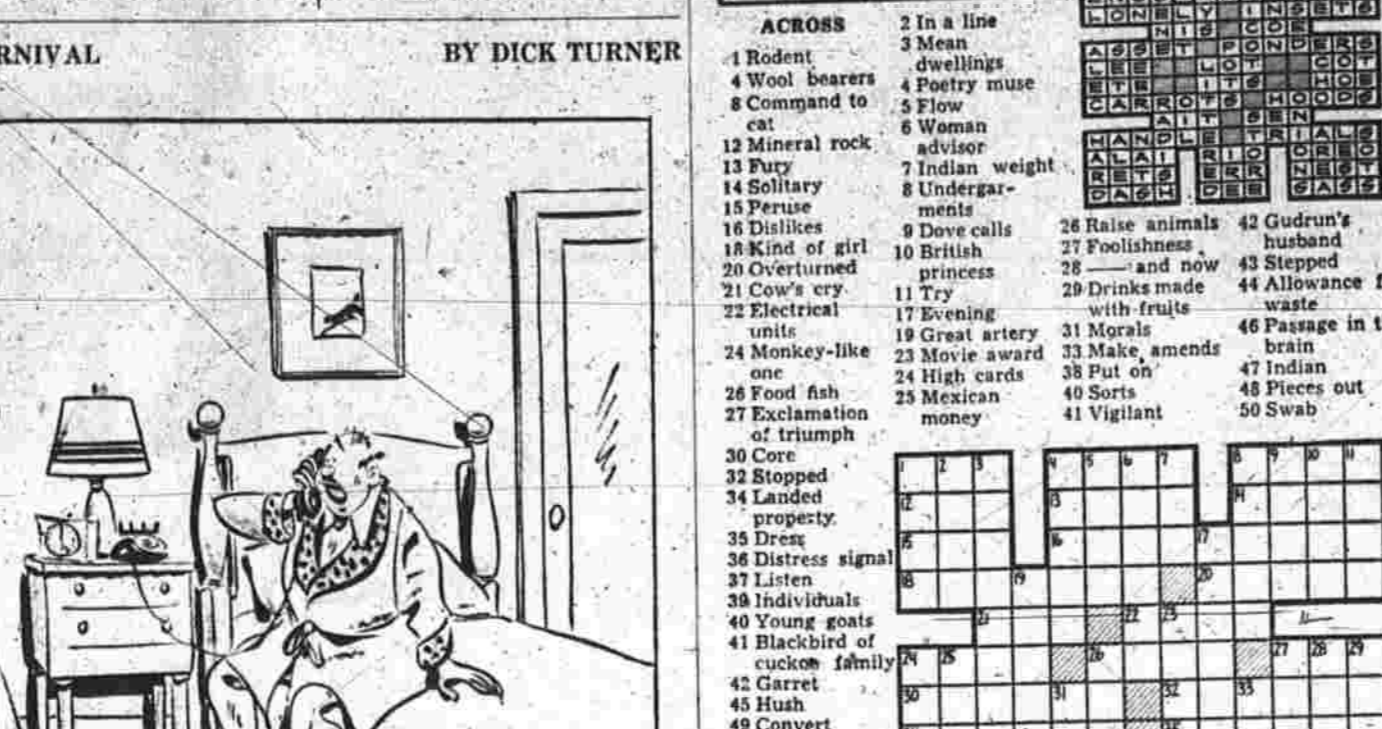

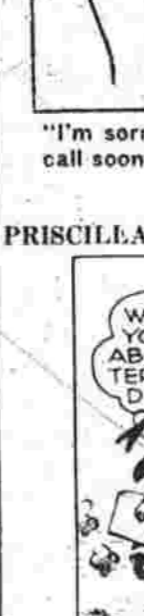
