**Pieces Instead Of Peace**  
 Once again, it has to be re-  
 minded that we are not in a position  
 to expose and test Russian  
 propaganda diplomacy in a positive  
 manner than a negative way.  
 Last Feb. 12, Russia, with great  
 fan-fare, addressed a proposition  
 about the Near East to the United  
 States, Britain and France.

It so happened that the propo-  
 sition Russia made was an ex-  
 cept one, and if it could have been  
 taken seriously it somewhat sur-  
 prising one. For what Russia pro-  
 posed was that all the big powers  
 divide the hands of the Near East,  
 and their military forces and bases  
 on the Near East, and agree not  
 to employ any more arms to  
 anybody in the region.

It so happened, also, of course,  
 that the reason Russia was making  
 such a proposition was that Russia  
 could see us in the midst of adopt-  
 ing a new foreign policy doctrine,  
 which promised to take American  
 military force and influence into  
 the Near East more definitely  
 than ever before.

Maybe instead of peace, perhaps  
 an ideal solution only because Rus-  
 sia felt sure we were committed  
 to carry out a policy of our own  
 and would be, therefore, incapable  
 of accepting or even considering  
 Russia's proposition.

This conflict has now produced  
 an actual situation in which one of  
 the national units in the United  
 Nations Police Force is refusing  
 to carry out a United Nations as-  
 signment because its home govern-  
 ment disagrees with the United  
 Nations policy involved.

The unit involved is the Yugo-  
 slav unit, and it has refused to go  
 on police duty inside the Gaza  
 Strip. It is refused to do so for  
 inside the Gaza Strip is that the  
 home government takes the posi-  
 tion that the Gaza Strip should  
 again be administered by the  
 Egyptians, as it was before the  
 Israeli attack of last October.

In this position, the Yugoslav  
 government happens to be techni-  
 cally correct. It also happens, for  
 the moment, to be more Egyptian  
 than the Egyptians.

Technically, Egypt has a right  
 to demand to be administering the  
 Gaza Strip in this moment, in the  
 role to which the United Nations  
 assigned it at the time of the  
 Palestine armistice. To have a  
 otherwise would be to hand Israel  
 something of a reward for its ag-  
 gression.

However, even Egypt itself has  
 been reasonable about this, in a  
 way which made possible the final  
 diplomacy which procured the Is-  
 raeli withdrawal. That withdrawal,  
 by which Israel handed the Gaza  
 Strip over to the United Nations  
 along with Israeli proclamations  
 that the Egyptians must not be  
 permitted to return pending some  
 final determination of a perma-  
 nent status for the Gaza Strip,  
 was made possible because Egypt  
 gave informal assurances that she  
 would in no hurry to come back  
 into the Strip, even though she  
 kept on proclaiming her legal  
 right to do so.

Now, either because Yugoslavia  
 is playing a certain policy game of  
 its own in the Near East, de-  
 signed to please Russia, or per-  
 haps because Egypt is already  
 resigning on its internal promise  
 and asking Yugoslavia to help  
 against Egypt's immediate re-  
 turn to the Gaza Strip, the Yugoslav  
 unit of the United Nations  
 Police Force has refused an as-  
 signment, putting its loyalty to  
 Yugoslav policy above its loyalty  
 to United Nations policy.

What is pointed up by this de-  
 sultory act is that a United Na-  
 tions Police Force made up of  
 such national units volunteered by  
 individual nations could, under  
 any such system, end up having  
 as many policies and as many  
 sources of orders as there were  
 national units in it. This has his-  
 torically represented the weakest  
 and most disastrous kind of con-  
 dition army, reminiscent, in fact,  
 of some of the Crusades which  
 foundered in this same region for  
 the same reason. It is also, in  
 modern terms, an impossible way  
 to try to run a United Nations  
 Police Force.

The goal for such a Police Force  
 is thus made plain. It should not  
 only be made permanent but, when  
 it is made permanent, it should be  
 organized on the basis of assign-  
 ment by individuals rather than  
 on the basis of provision of units  
 by national governments. Those
