Misses, who say he is taking because he was "double crossed," arranged for secret recordings of conversations.

Misses appeared before the committee on March 26 on the federal, which law in connection with some of the recordings.

McClellan, McClellan, replied to a Senate speech made by Sen. Morse (D-Ill.) calling for "basic reforms" in Senate investigating committee proceedings such as those now being presided over by McClellan.

Morse said Senate rules should require that a person "accused of wrongdoing" be supplied in full with the right of cross-examination.

McClellan asked if the committee had produced in response to the committee's subpoena for full financial records of the union.

"That is correct," the witness said.

McClellan said the council had switched its banks, changed its accounting system, and otherwise altered office practices so that after he became council secretary-treasurer in 1954, he ordered records deleted from the files destroyed after each annual audit.

"When these records were destroyed," McClellan asked, "there was no particular time," Misses replied he was only after a certified public accountant had examined the books.

He said copies of the books had been furnished the committee.

"We were terribly crowded for space," Misses said.

McClellan asked why he didn't destroy the older records from before 1954 rather than the newer ones.

"Probably I was wrong in my judgment," Misses replied.

Robert F. Kennedy, the committee counsel, pointed toward the single ledger book, told Misses:

"Any records that would show this book is accurate have been destroyed."

Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) said he wanted to know if the records destroyed might have some effect on the hearings.

Misses said that was not his motive.

Goldwater said the destruction of the records meant destruction of matter that would show "all this money that was paid out to Tom Maloney."

Goldwater said he thought this might be something like \$50,000 if the records were available for scrutiny.

McClellan said he was sure "that was not the figure." He added the accounts' audit would show how much Maloney received.

"That is the figure," Kennedy said, "that the certified public accountant's report was broken down into categories instead of individuals."

Misses said all canceled checks, check books, expense reports and bank statements of Portland, Joint Council were among the records "destroyed."

He said they were done away with to make more office space.

Under McClellan's questioning, Misses agreed that destruction of such records and newspapers would not be "good business practice" for union locals to follow. But he agreed his organization was in "a good deal different position."

He never did make exactly clear why he was to the council, but the records would not be true.

He said Miss O'Brien destroyed the records by depositing them in a waste basket.

Asked again why he ordered the stuff destroyed, he said "it was in the way."

"In my opinion there was an need of retaining that irrelevant material," he said. "Maybe I gave the wrong order, but that was the other I gave."

Kennedy said this still didn't explain why the "most recent" ones were thrown out, instead of the older ones.

PTA Hears Talk By Miss Hoffman

School social work is a co-operating, participating relationship with principals, teachers, parents and children, stated Miss Beth Hoffman, Manchester elementary school social worker, last evening she spoke to a large audience of Verplanck School PTA members.

The elementary school social worker, she said, "is a part of a team to help boys and girls get the most from their school experience and to look toward a future happy and successful school life as their education progresses."

"Symptoms of unhappy children," she said, "are lack of interest, over-anxiety, feigning of illness, and playing hooky, are often carried over into adult life with unpleasant results not corrected early."

"Many times the cause of the behavior can be quickly located by a trained worker studying health and school records and through private, confidential conferences with the teacher, both parents and the child involved, the problem can be solved with very satisfying results for all."

"With young children," Miss Hoffman said, "playing games with them often brings to light their deep-rooted feelings and through this companionship, relationship the child is drawn to express himself and is made receptive to helpful advice."

"With older children, a longer time may be required to overcome the difficulty, but the work is extremely rewarding and a well-adjusted, happy child is the best insurance for future successful adult life."

Preceding Miss Hoffman's talk, pupils from Mrs. Andrew Peterson's sixth grade gave a lantern slide lecture on the history of Manchester. The drawings shown and the oral presentations were the original work of the children, done as a class project.

Rockville Federal Unit Excludes City From Sewerage Filtration Aid

Rockville, March 13 (Special)—The federal aid unit will not become involved in the city's sewerage filtration project because it has no funds and the project is not considered a public plant, it was announced today by George Cannon, federal representative.

Four other cities request have been approved for use of state funds allocated for towns with sewerage problems and this will benefit the funds.

Mayor Olson said today the city will take no further action on the plan. He noted the federal government is trying to collect \$18,000 for plans it provided the city but which were not used.

The agreement was that if the plans were used the city would pay for them. The government contends that the plan for the proposed filtration plant are not enough different from the government's to warrant the use of the new plan, and therefore may not collect the city proceeds with construction. The mayor also noted the high cost of the plant, estimated at about \$780,000.

Poet-Novelist Graves Finds 'Elbow-Room' on Majorca

By W. G. ROGERS Associated Press Staff Writer New York (AP)—The English writer most interested in keeping the English language pure and clean is the most interested in living abroad, said Robert Graves.

"You go abroad yourself," the poet and novelist said while he was on a flying lecture tour. "You leave your home but you take your language with you. You take a lot of English in Majorca? 'Too much, now,' he complained. "But that was the trouble, even more the trouble, with England. It was too crowded."

"It must have been a lovely island in Elizabethan times when it had its eight million inhabitants and there was room for them. Now there are no more than three there. Or there are rather more than three."

Graves is a tall, broad-shouldered, friendly gray-haired man with a white beard and hair. He is 60. One of the cameramen who stopped him on his visit said he looked like Gertrude Stein, and he does.

It was Miss Stein who advised him, in 1929, to try Majorca—she was always like Alice B. Toklas, the English-speaking American, and she had been in Majorca since his new book, "The Sign of the Cross," was published.

"I write all the time," he said. "I allow interruptions, but in fact I give all my time to writing. That has meant a long list of books in all languages."

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Radioactive Dust Traced in Wake of Soviet A-Blast

Tokyo, March 13 (AP)—Radioactive dust, rain and snow have been reported in northern and central Japan following the Soviet nuclear test explosion March 8.

The Soviet Union began a series of nuclear tests last August since then the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission has reported four nuclear blasts, the most recent last Friday.

Dr. Hiroshi Watanabe of Niigata University said jet stream winds apparently carried radioactive particles from last week's test over Japan.

The highest count, 28,500, was reported by Shimane University in southern Honshu Monday. It also reported 1,700 counts and Tokyo 2,000 counts from March 9 to 11. Prior to the last Soviet explosion the Tokyo measurement was between 100 and 200 counts.

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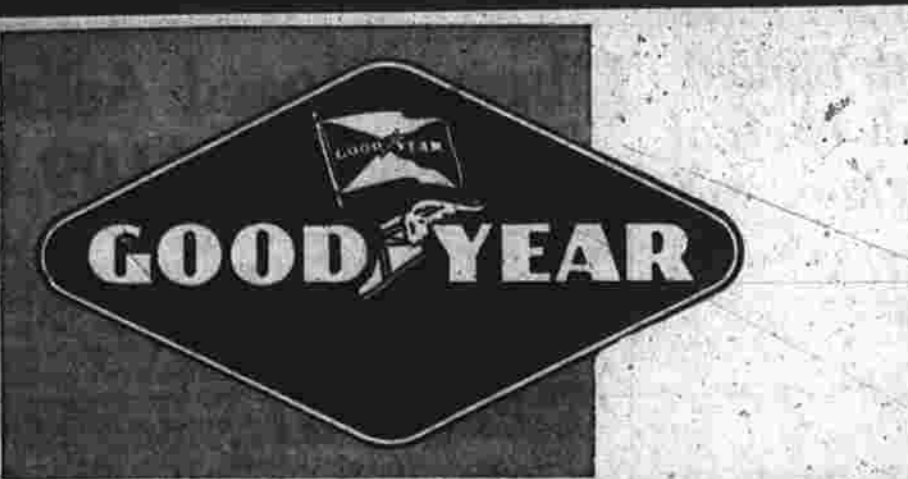

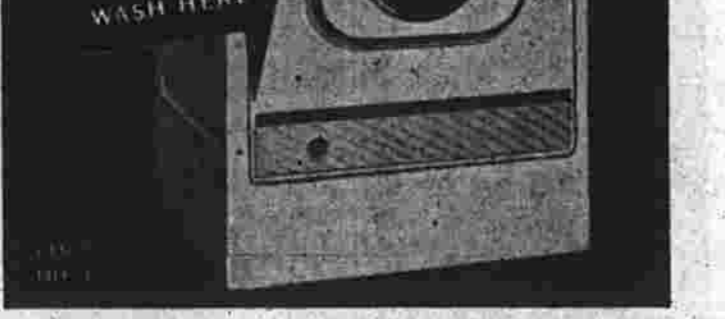

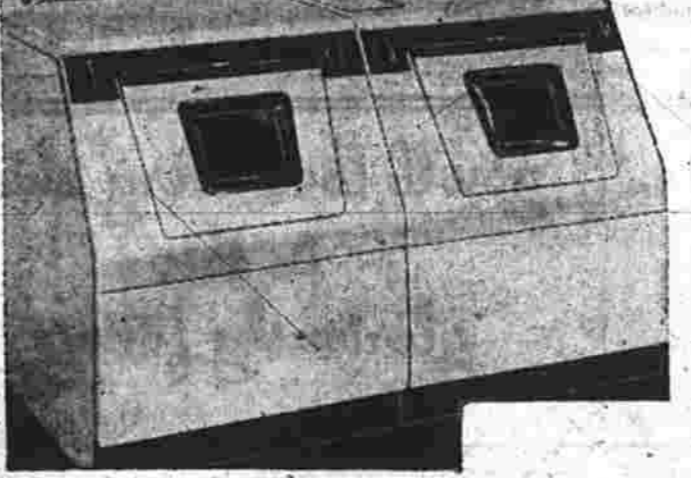

A source close to Hammarstad said it was not certain whether the Secretary General would go to Gaza and Israel.

Statement by U.S.

The U.S. State Department got out a statement which officials said was meant primarily for Egyptian cooperation with the U.N. "to maintain peace and tranquility in the Middle East," it said.

The U.S. government strongly supported the role of the U.N. and "specifically" the functioning of the U.N. Emergency Force.

In Jerusalem, Israeli Foreign Minister Golda Meir called in U.S. Ambassador Edward R. Lawson to express "most serious concern" at the Gaza developments. She also instructed Abba Eban, Israel's ambassador to Washington, to cut short a Florida vacation and return to his post for urgent talks with the State Department.

Minister Reuben Shiloah, in charge of the Israeli embassy in Washington in Eban's absence, met 40 minutes last night with acting Secretary of State Christian Hatter to present Israel's views. He was understood to have indicated Israel might feel free to exercise the right of self-defense should Egypt again take control of Gaza.

Bunches continued his conference with Egyptian officials in Cairo and left in close telephone contact with U.N. headquarters in New York. Bunches told reporters he was awaiting new instructions from his chief.

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Turbaned Indian Scientist Studies Bovine Disease with UConn Professor

Stora—A turbaned Indian scientist from the Himalayas has come halfway around the world to study the bovine mastitis control program in Connecticut. He is now observing feeding techniques being used in the program at the Storrs Agricultural Experiment Station at the University of Connecticut.

Dr. Manmohan S. Sethi, who conducts research and control on mastitis in India, is working with Dr. Wayne M. Piatridge, professor of animal diseases and head of the mastitis section at the Department Station.

Dr. Sethi is hunting for a simple and practical mastitis test for India's huge population of cows and buffaloes. The Indian government wants to bring the infection under control as quickly as possible. Mastitis testing can become rather complex, Dr. Sethi explains, since mastitis may be caused by a number of different organisms. Isolation and typing of all these organisms is both difficult and time consuming, he says.

The Indian scientist, thinking he might obtain some ideas at the Storrs station which could be applied or modified for use under conditions existing in his own country through the complex problems involved in going to be difficult, Dr. Sethi agrees.

Dr. Sethi is a Sikh. Dr. Sethi's turban marks him as a Sikh, a member of an Indian religion derived from Hinduism. India's predominant religion there are about 10 million Sikhs in the States. Sikhs do not cut their hair, the men wear turbans to hold it in place, Dr. Sethi explains.

Another Indian religious custom or belief has a direct bearing on that nation's plans for mastitis control. Cows are held in sacred animals and, as a result, must not be killed. In the western world, disease animals that cannot be cured are slaughtered to protect the other animals in the herd. In India, religious practice requires that mastitis-infected cows be kept in the herd and milked, but not killed. This creates some additional problems, the Indian explains.

Dr. Sethi is only one of several Indian scientists who have come abroad who have visited the Storrs Experiment Station during the past several years to study the mastitis control program. Accompanying Dr. Piatridge's mastitis research at Storrs is Dr. Sethi to study under him at the University.

Research by Dr. Piatridge led to the isolation in Connecticut in 1941 of the first mastitis control

Bad Farming Seen Ruining Indus Valley

Karachi, Pakistan, March 13 (AP)—The head of the U.S. aid mission to Pakistan says improper agricultural methods could turn the Indus Valley into a desert waste within 50 years.

If that happens, both Pakistan and American officials agree, the young nation of Pakistan might be destroyed. The valley is Pakistan's most fertile farming area.

John O. Bell, director of the U.S. International Cooperation Administration (ICA) mission in Karachi, gave the warning along with a list that American aid funds for Pakistani agriculture could be more effectively used.

U.S. Gives \$35 Million—The United States, up to last year, had spent some \$35 million on various agricultural projects in Pakistan. It also has given Pakistan millions of dollars worth of foodstuffs.

Bell, speaking at Sind Agricultural College at Hyderabad, just north of Karachi, said it was undeniably if Pakistan had to get urgent foreign assistance to buy food during floods, droughts and other emergencies.

However, he said, it was wrong to allow the country's agricultural economy to deteriorate to the point where foreign aid might have to rely on Pakistan aid as a normal

Russia Nearing Golden Age In Revolt 40 Years Ago

Devot on the streets of Petrograd 40 years ago set in motion the historic chain of events which brought communism into world history. The March revolt threw off ancient chains of oppression. It installed tyranny worse than the czar's.

Editor's Note: William L. Ryan, Associated Press, is in Moscow, Russia, tracing in detail the main currents of Russian history since the great revolution of 1917 and taking a close look at the "new Soviet man" in a report series which begins today in the Manchester Evening Herald.

Forty years ago tomorrow a spark of freedom burst into brilliant flame in the dark of a Petrograd morning. It brought freedom to the edge of what might have been a golden age.

A century ago an idea with the sound of a trumpet came from Germany. Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels produced a manifesto proclaiming that "a specter of communism haunted Europe. Russian thinkers leaped at the notion. The idea suited them. It promised an absolute Utopia and Russians seek absolute answers. Alexander Herzen, the liberal Russian thinker, wrote 100 years ago: "I believe there is some justification for the fear of communism which the Russian government is bent on reeling."

But to her writers, Russia's down was to be avoided. Russia never could see the clutter of misery in her own backyard. Russia wanted on the Turks to save religious freedom in Russia. She wanted with Poland to save peasants from the Polish nobility. But Russia's own farmers were in slavery. She expanded endlessly, bent on spreading enlightenment and in Russia there was darkness.

Enter Communism. Trotsky and Lenin produced a manifesto promising that "a specter of communism haunted Europe. Russian thinkers leaped at the notion. The idea suited them. It promised an absolute Utopia and Russians seek absolute answers. Alexander Herzen, the liberal Russian thinker, wrote 100 years ago: "I believe there is some justification for the fear of communism which the Russian government is bent on reeling."

Today his government is more state capitalist, in a harsh sense of the term than in Communism or Marxian Socialism. Its top aid economy bent on industrial and military might above all else faces new crises. The "new Soviet man" is stirring, no more the cause of vague mistyings. His leaders, no long infatuated as Czar and Stalin, today are lesser men commanding neither awe nor respect.

Russians never revolted against a system they rose in anger when burdens became too great. From Ivan the Terrible to Khrushchev the Communists have done well. They relaxed oppression. From relaxation came uprisings from uprisings, new oppression.

What makes Russians what they are? Probably it is their history—a chronicle of unending tragedy—and their deep sense of identification with their past.

Their first great tragedy occurred seven centuries ago, when hordes from Asia swept across Russia all the way to Kiev, then the fountain of Russian life. Then, the center of Russian life shifted toward Moscow. Its grand prince intrigued servilely with the Asian conquerors, who left the Russians with a habit of total subservience and a suspicion of outside ideas. The Russians never shook off the influence.

Through the ages Russia wrapped herself in mystery. Even in the enlightened 18th and 19th centuries, occasional travelers returning from Russia were like adventurers from another world, full of wondrous tales of a cruel and barbaric land.

"We are poor with the accumulated poverty of 1,000 years," once wrote Leon Trotsky, later an architect of the Bolshevik betrayal. They were poor from 1,000 years of great and small wars, intrigues, hero saints and legendary devils, suspicion and fear, want and barbarism. Their history was podmarked by invading hordes from Asia and predatory enemies from the west, a history of vast superstition, deep mystical madness.

It was a history finally dominated by Moscow, whose prince reekedly pushed out their chaotic principality in ever-widening circles. The story is dotted with grandiose blackened by oppression, constantly repeating itself.

Through it all ran a mystic center, the Russians as the world's hope of salvation. Russian literature mirrored this quest of character. It hung in drapes of an and

Homesick Hungarians Return Through West German City

Passau, Germany, March 13 (AP)—This Danube River city on the German-Austrian border has become the main crossing point for Hungarian refugees who want to return home.

They come here from France, Belgium, West Germany and other West European countries. Theoretically, they are entitled to repatriation if they ask for it. In practice, it is almost impossible for them to go back legally. This is mainly because Austria, carrying the burden of the refugee burden, fears that second-chaining repatriates may wind up in Austrian camps again instead of going home.

The homesick Hungarian refugees may apply for an Austrian transit visa but the visa are long and they have to wait for months. After a few frustrating days in the care of the Caritas Caritas welfare organization here, many try to go it alone.

What is driving them back? Welfare officials agree that in most cases it is homesickness. These include those who have already returned to Germany from other Western countries on their way back home.

Two legal transports or repatriation from West Europe have left Germany.

Exact figures on those who have already returned are not available here. West German officials say about 1,000 Hungarian refugees in Germany have asked to be repatriated. These include those who have crossed into Germany from other Western countries on their way back home.

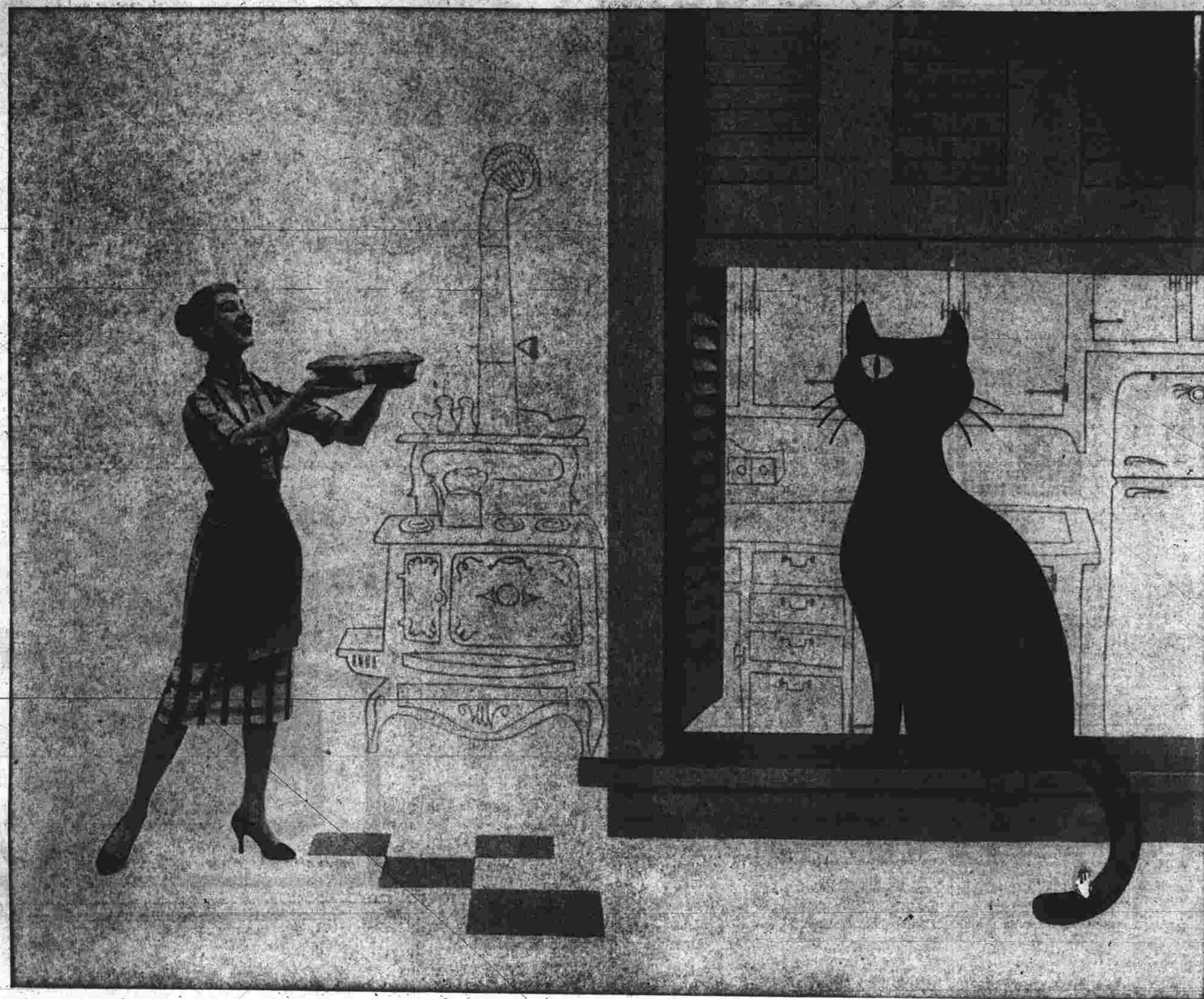

Yale and UConn Eliminated in NCAA Eastern Regionals

North Carolina Gets Surprise From Ivy Five

New York, March 13 (AP)—Coach Frank McGuire of North Carolina hopes his formula for success works as well in the NCAA Basketball Tournament as it did for him and his undefeated Tar Heels during the regular season. The smiling freshman John New York City player to play each game in the NCAA "one at a time" after his team turned back Yale 80-77 in an Eastern Regional first round game last night.

In other opening round games at Madison Square Garden, Syracuse eliminated Connecticut 82-76 and Cantinus ousted West Virginia 64-58. The three winners, along with Lafayette, which drew a first round bye, will play in the Eastern Regional playoffs in Philadelphia Friday and Saturday.

McGuire's victory formula worked to perfection during the regular campaign as the Tar Heels, voted the nation's No. 1 team in the final Associated Press poll, posted 27 consecutive triumphs. All-America Lennie Rosenbly and Co. capped the season by winning the Atlantic Coast Conference championship and the NCAA Tournament berth that goes with it.

Last night McGuire's "transplanted" New Yorkers extended their winning streak to 28, but the soft-spoken coach hopes that the Tar Heels' rare losses in Philadelphia against Cantinus Friday and West Virginia Saturday were hard before their friends and relatives. "Playing in New York is worse for us than playing in a strange city," said McGuire.

"The team was jittery and tight in the first 30 minutes, but part of it had to do with Yale's pressing tactics."

North Carolina was behind most of the first half, but gained a 40-35 lead at intermission. The game was tied six times in the second half before the Tar Heels pulled away for good with 11 minutes to go.

McGuire, watching Cantinus outclass West Virginia and All-America Hot Rod Hundley, was impressed by the Golden Griffins from Buffalo. "They're a smart ball club," he said. "They like to hold the ball until the other team makes a mistake."

Star Backer Ed Rosenbly, who was fouled up by NYU's box men during earlier games at the Garden, experienced a bit of trouble with the elite collaring zone. "Harris had two defenders most of the time, the 4-5 agile forward still managed to collect 20 points and seven 17 rebounds.

John Lee kept Yale in contention with 20 points and Eddie Robinson added 30. Four of the starting Bulldogs fouled out.

Hank Nowak and Joe Leone spearheaded Cantinus, which led at halftime 34-18 and then staged off a late West Virginia drive that closed the gap to 52-36. Towak hit for 18 points and Leone 18. Hundley was outstanding for the Mountaineers with 17, but had little assistance from his mates.

Syracuse, which will play Lafayette Friday, rallied in the last eight minutes to down Connecticut. Gary Clark, who led the late surge, was high for the Orange with 26 points.

Pro Hockey Having Best Year Thanks to Playing on Teevee

New York (NEA)—The boo-boo-step. During the time between clinics Ben Bruns was talking proudly of the 33 per cent increase in attendance for their National Hockey League games this season when word spread around the city's North End that grounds were so big the Bruins' side held \$100,000.
