Within 15 minutes after landing Macmillan climbed into the government car and set out over Bermuda's winding hilly roads for the Mid-Ocean Club where he and Eisenhower will do their talking for the next four days.

One of their chief purposes is to try to lay some practical basis for rebuilding the British-American partnership which has been a cornerstone of the free world alliance since the end of World War II. The partnership was virtually wrecked by the Middle East Crisis.

Diplomats said top priority in the talks had to go to the most urgent aspects of the Middle East crisis involving Israel and Egypt. Macmillan was expected to ask the President to exert more vigorous leadership in the present stage of the contest with Egypt.

The British are reported to feel that the U.S. government, having prevailed on Israel to withdraw its troops, is being bound to support Israel actively in the present stage of the contest with Egypt.

Edwards Shows Films About CD To Keeney PTA

"Civil Defense is not an organization waiting for a war to happen," Fred Edwards, Civil Defense director, told the Keeney Street School PTA last night.

"It is a vital source of assistance and public information in case of natural disaster," Edwards illustrated his lecture with three films, "Cause of Disaster" demonstrated the importance of a well trained Civil Defense organization, and "Warning Red" was a commentary on the horrors of an atom-bomb attack. The method of radio broadcasting on special frequencies from several stations in an intermittent, alternating pattern to prevent the use of regular radio frequencies for guidance by enemy planes was explained in another movie entitled "Coneland."

He said the local CD needs more workers, particularly wardens, of which Manchester has only 100 of the 2,000 needed, and in the sky watch, which has 30 working members in the 300 who have signed up. Other divisions of Civil Defense, including the Police and Fire Departments and their auxiliaries, are Health and Special Weapons, Engineering, Transportation and Plant Protection.

Board Moves to Build New Globe Bathhouse

Despite continued strong protest-muttee which investigated the Board of Directors last night went forward with plans to build a new bathhouse at the Globe-Hollow Swimming Pool.

The Directors authorized General Manager Richard Martin to have final plans and specifications for the project drawn so that bids can be invited.

But Board members made it clear the \$26,000 estimate for the project seemed too high. They voted to ask Scudder and Manley, architects for the building, to plan a bathhouse which might bring in the cost down.

The action came after long public discussion. The meeting, convened in the hearing room of the Municipal Building, was moved to Woodruff hall in the basement of Center Congregational Church because of the crowd.

About 120 persons, most of them taxpayers' League members, attended.

Not all those at the meeting, however, came to oppose the Globe-Hollow project. R. L. Schmidt, representing the Civitan Club, read a letter from that organization supporting the plan to build new bathhouse facilities.

And Gilbert Barnes, secretary of the Board, read a letter from the Kiwanis Club asking the Directors to give "serious consideration to the expenditure" and citing what it says is the "great need for swimming facilities for children."

Action Postponed
The Directors failed to take action on another matter which has brought protest from the Taxpayers' group, led by former director Walter Mathews.

Action was postponed on approving a bill for submission to the General Assembly which, if passed, would give the city the right to change the method of sidewalk assessment.

Copies of the proposed legislation were given to the Director during the meeting and they voted to take time to study the law before taking action.

The proposal is to change the proportion which the abutting property owner will pay for sidewalk installation from two thirds to one half, to change the interest rate on the bills from 9 percent to 6 percent, and to permit installment paying.

Van Hone Statement

Manfred said that Egypt was to be commended for its expressed determination to abide by the "letter and spirit" of the 1955 agreement. He said Nasser could show good faith in that respect in abiding by the U.N. resolutions concerning the Suez, including the passage of Israeli ships through that waterway.

"If the letter and spirit is reinforced by a determination to work toward an equitable settlement of the Suez, Gaza Strip and Gulf of Aqaba disputes, then I believe the possibility of a stabilized period and eventual peace in the area will be increased," Manfred said.

San Francisco, March 20. (Special) A city planning expert predicted today that highway construction over the next 20 years will radically alter the character and structure of metropolitan areas more than all the work of metropolitan planners since 1945.

John T. Howard, Massachusetts Institute of Technology associate professor, offered with his prognosis on the impact of the expanded federal highway construction program this forecast.

"We are ill prepared, now that the new highways are upon us, to say where they should be built in the best interests of the metropolitan areas."

Howard, addressing the American Society of Planning Officials, argued that the purpose of highways was not "the carrying of traffic but to serve the community."

He said a highway so designed and built that it produces land development patterns "worsening the livability and efficiency of a metropolitan area is a disaster to the community."

He declared the U.S. highway act of 1956 proposing the building of billions of dollars worth of modern highways "does not recognize these all-important aspects of highway design."

"In the absence of metropolitan planning and development policies, each decision on highway location will be based on highway engineering, traffic engineering and cost," Howard contended.

He noted that the federal act, which gives state highway planning authority to state highway departments.

"The highway engineers into whose hands this program has been delivered have assumed a terrible responsibility for the way in which they realize," Howard said.

"It does not baffle them to say that, just as war is too important to leave to the generals, so are highways too important to leave to the highway engineers."

"Here lies the hope in the present situation."
