CHURCH GROUP PROTESTS. Ottawa, April 5 (AP)—The United Church of Canada, the nation's largest Protestant denomination, last night joined parliamentarians in protesting the U.S. Senate Internal Security subcommittee for its communist allegations against Herbert Norman.

A statement signed by Dr. Ernest E. Long, secretary of the church's General Council, called on President Eisenhower and Congress to protest "intolerance and fanaticism from assassinating the character of free men and nations."

Dr. Long's statement accused the subcommittee of "shaking and audacious methods" and said the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States should hold an emergency meeting to prevent further incidents such as those leading to Norman's death.

"Fan hysteria and unbridled political ambition," said Dr. Long, have carried security measures "too far" in the United States.

The United Church is a merger of 21 Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational denominations.

Leaders of the Senate subcommittee in a statement following the Canadian diplomat's death said their group would not be living up to its obligations of presenting respect to the United States Senate.

The Toronto and District Labor Council last night urged the Canadian Labor Congress to take steps to impress upon the U.S. government that fundamental human rights and personal dignities of Canadian citizens and their diplomatic representatives must be respected.

Speakers at the meeting called the Senate subcommittee a "kangaroo court."

Donald Montgomery, council secretary, said "it would be unfair to blame the American people as a whole for everything indefensible resulting from this separate subcommittee."

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Like Labels Schools Stronger Than Atom

Washington, April 5 (AP)—Federal Education officials need more classrooms, says American School Association, as well as support and affection of institutions of higher learning.

"It is unwise to make education too cheap," it said, "because there is a tendency to put the value on anything."

In the compromise approved by the subcommittee, \$400 million a year would go to the states, each state to match its grant on a 50-50 basis.

Half of the total would be distributed on the basis of school age population, the other half on the basis of need. In addition, state allotments may be reduced and the money re-applied among the states on the basis of their needs.

The measure also calls for \$70 million in federal funds for purchase of a school construction bonds from school districts unable to find a market at reasonable interest rates.

The bill is true if for no other reason than that modern weapons must be manned by highly educated personnel if they are to be effective and the energy of the atom can only be understood and developed by the most highly trained minds.

The President's audience of about 1,200 educators at the Sherman Park Hotel here, testified in solemn silence during his 15 minute talk, but gave him a big ovation when he was introduced and at the conclusion of his address.

Eisenhower rounded his new appeal for action a few hours after the first in Congress toward passing the classroom shortage bill.

The bill, scheduled to go before the full committee next Thursday, is a compromise between the administration's plan for a 4-year, \$1,000,000,000 program and a suggestion by Democrats for a 6-year, \$1,600,000,000 program.

However, with many members of Congress in a budget-cutting, economy-minded mood, the fate of any school aid program at this season remained in doubt. The state also lay an expected battle over whether federal funds should be barred from racially segregated school systems an issue which helped kill a similar program last year.

Eisenhower blamed the classroom shortage on the depression of the 1930's, World War II and the Korean conflict. Those "retrogressive setbacks" he said, caused a "drying up" of normal schoolroom replacement and expansion.

So now, the President added, the federal government must help solve the problem through an emergency program. But he said, "Federal help in building schools will not mean federal control. After these new schools are built, after the bricks are laid and the mortar is dry, the federal mission will be completed. All control and use of the schools will be in the hands of the states and localities."

Eisenhower on no more emphasized his belief that the states and

local communities, must help in the construction of new schools.

Andover

Planners to Seek \$2,600 For Drafting of Town Plan

Andover, April 5—(Special)—The Planning and Zoning Commission stated last night it will ask the Board of Finance to appropriate \$2,600 for the services of a professional consultant to assist with the development of a town plan.

A similar item in last year's town budget recommendation was not approved at the Annual Budget Meeting. Questions concerning a town plan were answered last night by Horace H. Brown, planning engineer with the State Development Commission, at an open meeting at the Town Hall.

A basic reason why so many towns are hustling to acquire a town plan is to meet the impact of population increases. Brown indicated the present state population of 2,300,000 people is expected to reach 3,000,000 in 1975. Consequently, many towns are preparing to meet the influx of 700,000 more residents in the 20-million acre state.

Of the 169 towns in Connecticut, Brown said 100 have combined planning and zoning commissions. 15 have planning commissions and 15 have zoning groups. Among the communities engaged in town planning at this time are Bolton, Westford, Ellington, Colchester, East Windsor, Stafford, Killingly, Portland and Enfield.

Regional Awareness

A regional awareness which has developed in the community with the progress of the Special District No. 8 school was pointed up by a question on possible advantages of towns combining for a regional plan. Brown explained that the Development Commission holds regional planning in high favor but he indicated that the most successful method usually entails separate town contracts with the planners rather than a single contract for the region.

"Not even today is an isolated community," he said, adding that there are laws allowing the establishment of regional planning boards in some states as early as by the 1945 laws.

Minority Schism

In Britain, scientific opinion on the hazards of nuclear bomb tests is definitely more alarmed than it is in this country. Here, we keep proclaiming that all the tests to date have done no possible damage to the human race, and that the day when damage could begin to be calculated is still many, many months away.

This is our prevailing scientific opinion. It always has to be accompanied by two reservations—one, that nobody knows just how much poison has been released into the atmosphere—the second that nobody really knows just where the danger point for human beings is located.

In Britain, on the other hand, there is the same basic ignorance, but the scientists make different guesses. And one guess the British keep making is that every bomb test claims at least a few human lives, by releasing into the atmosphere strontium which will play the key role in bringing on cancer. They admit, these scientists, that we will never know which cancer case may have been caused by strontium, and which by something else. But the opinion is that no bomb can be exploded without having it credited with the taking of at least a few human lives. The more bombs exploded, the more lives each one would take.

This is the prevailing opinion in Britain—that any bomb test kills somebody innocent—which seems responsible for the special sharpness of British debates over its own forthcoming hydrogen bomb tests. This debate has now come to the point where the Labor party has taken an official position demanding postponement of the tests while new effort is made to obtain international agreement for the abolition of all nuclear bomb tests. Perhaps the most important thing illustrated in this is that a political party in an atomic power has judged it to be safe, politically, not to worship the bomb.

This atom atheism in Britain remains, however, a minority schism, and seems in an immediate danger of being the United States and Russia away from their joint worship of the one thing in which they both believe.

Hidden Splendor

Officials of the Atlas Corporation admitted in New York on the other day, that one of their uranium mine investments had proved nothing of a bust, so far as uranium is concerned.

Considering the particular uranium mine merely from the point of view of uranium, they had invested \$9,000,000 in the mine, and got back gross receipts of only a little more than \$2,000,000.

However, they said, uranium production is not necessarily the only way to measure the worth of a uranium mine. This part—this mine, called "Delta," was an asset to "Hidden Splendor," the Atlas Corporation affiliate which owned it.

"This was an, a company statement explained, because of some \$6,120,000 in federal tax savings which could be applied, from the non-producing "Delta," to other better and more productive mines in the "Hidden Splendor" portfolio.

This is the business-like way in which a company statement summed it up.

Delta property without any other, considering the richness of the other bodies owned by Hidden Splendor, is worth not a great deal less to the over-all work of Hidden Splendor than Delta with substantial ore."

That makes it sound almost a piece of rare good fortune that the company managed to buy a uranium mine which was woefully short on uranium.

Job Benefits Issue Aired In Assembly

Hartford, April 5—(Special)—The State Legislature's Labor Committee heard both sides of the argument yesterday on a proposal to add off-the-job sickness and injury benefits to the State's labor security program.

Union spokesmen joined State Representative Benato Riccio in presenting the committee to approve the bill.

Insurance Men Oppose Bill

Insurance men teamed up with industry and Chamber of Commerce spokesmen to oppose it. Riccio contended at the public hearing that the program is chiefly designed to protect the weak and unorganized—those who work in "small and unorganized establishments."

He added: "We say people who are unemployed due to lack of work (unemployment compensation law), and we say people who are injured on the job or become ill as a result of their occupation (workmen's compensation law) are just as deserving of help as those who are injured or become ill because of an illness not connected with their work."

The opponents of the bill said private enterprise of both labor and management could handle the off-the-job benefits.

John H. Thompson, Hartford insurance agent, said the bill means the cost of the benefits would be assessed against employers. He testified: "It is difficult to follow the reasoning why the employer should be forced to compensate by law an employee who contracts a disease not contracted in any way with his employment, or is injured as the result of an automobile accident while on a pleasure trip, or perhaps slips in the bathtub at home and suffers an injury."

"There is no more logical, moral or legal reason than if you were to require, by law, that the employer defray part of the worker's cost of his grocery bills."

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It Got Its Headlines

The Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, dredging away for headlines, with Senators Eastland and Jenner and Counsel Robert Morris carrying on in their best imitation and continuation of McCarthy methods, was no doubt delighted, a few weeks ago, to discover that there was headline value in revival of old charges against a high Canadian diplomat, E. Herbert Norman, his country's ambassador to Egypt.

The committee and its counsel could tell they were getting somewhere when, on March 15, Canada's Foreign Secretary, Lester Pearson, told the Canadian House of Commons that he had protested against the publication by the Senate subcommittee of new charges against Norman, and when, subsequently, the United States State Department issued a statement expressing its own confidence in Canada's representatives abroad. So the Senate subcommittee, happily repeating its charges against Norman, noting that it had a foreign country, Canada, and the State Department, an old target, plus, of course, the individual, Norman, under its standard gun. The fact that Canada had made its own extensive checks on Norman back in 1951, and given him a clean bill of health, and promoted him to a new and most important post in the foreign service might satisfy Canada, but not the watch dogs of American internal security in the Senate.
