Makarios Arrives
In Athens, Greece

(Special Staff News Service)
Athens, Greece, and members of the Cyprus ethnarchy which Makarios heads; Foreign Minister Evangelos Averoff and Interior Minister Constantinos Tsouros, senior officers of all three services; Parliament members of all parties; the prefect of Athens and mayors of neighboring cities.

All Athens police were put on the alert for the Archbishop's arrival and troops in full battle dress were stationed in force at strategic points, including the British and Turkish embassies and consulates. Cyprus Turkish minority is opposed to union with Greece and demand that the island be returned to Turkey if British rule is ended.

All Athens was decked out with posters showing Makarios with a Greek flag in the background and the declaration: "Worthy of the Fatherland."

Newspapers gave the story of the arrival extensive play and editorial comment. The pro-government Acropolis declared the "United Nations has now recognized that the Cyprus problem is an international one and the British have been compelled to alter their uncompromising 'never'." It is that change which is symbolized by Archbishop Makarios' triumphant return today.

Makarios flew here from Nairobi, Kenya, where Chief Secretary Richard Turnbull of Kenya declared yesterday he was not a welcome guest in that British colony. The prime had stopped in Kenya for a rest and talks en route from the Seychelles.

Makarios was banished to the Seychelles by the British on grounds he was a leader in the EOKA underground violence against British rule. He was freed from detention April 9 but still is barred from returning to Cyprus.

The British hoped his release would lead toward a settlement of the Cyprus dispute, but Makarios has said he will not negotiate on the island's future until he is allowed to return to Cyprus.

Britain has offered Cyprus increased self-government, but the island's Greek-Cypriot majority insists that Makarios is the only person who can negotiate for them.

Robert Strom
Gets \$192,000
On CBS Quiz

New York, April 17 (AP)—Robert Strom, an amazing 10-year-old from the Bronx, has won \$192,000 in a television quiz show history. He's won more money than anyone else—\$192,000.

Young Robert, a fifth grade pupil, reached that pinnacle last night on the CBS program, "The \$64,000 Question." He turned the trick by answering questions dealing with various fields of science. By winning, young Strom remained eligible to continue on the program in hopes of capturing the show's grand prize—\$250,000.

Compete for "Platinum"
Under the program rules, a contestant completes for so-called "platinum" of \$64,000 each. As he reaches each "platinum" he is entitled to keep each \$64,000 block.

In Robert's case it amounts to three, meaning he will keep the entire \$192,000, regardless if he is stumped in his quest for the grand prize.

In addition, his \$192,000 winnings will be paid in three yearly installments to enable him to less income taxes.

While young Robert stands atop the TV quiz show money pile, he's not too far ahead of his nearest challenger. 11-year-old Leonard Ross of California, Ross won \$164,000 some time ago on two different shows.

Strom didn't hesitate last night as he recited off answers to questions dealing with the sciences of mathematics, electronics, physics, chemistry and astronomy.

Here are the questions and answers:

Part one—Name the men associated with the development or discovery of frequency modulation, analytic geometry and radioactivity. Answer: Albert Einstein, Heinrich Hertz, Rene Descartes, Henri Becquerel.

Part two—What reaction would occur and what the by-products would be from combining hydrochloric acid and sodium hydroxide and combining metallic sodium and water. Answer: Heat is produced and water and salt (sodium chloride) are formed; an explosion occurs and hydrogen and sodium hydroxide are hydroxides.

Names Constellation
Part three—Name seven constellations in the summer sky which contain stars of the first magnitude; name the seven stars; circle these stars on a planisphere map of the heavens.

Answer: The constellations are Scorpius, Virgo, Leo, Bootes, Cygnus, Aquila and Lyra; the stars are Antares, Deneb, Vega, Arcturus, Regulus and Spica.

Part four—Name the brightest stars on the map that hung in his sunproof booth. His booth was darkened and little electric bulbs were lit on the map to show the positions of the seven stars. Each one was circled by the lines Strom drew, showing he had selected the correct ones.

Gas Now Stored Underground In Caverns Inside Salt Domes

Paletina, Tex. (AP)—Some of nature's little-known but marvelous creations helped keep people warm this winter.

The wonders are the great salt domes that bulge up like mushrooms from the earth. They are made of a soft, plastic material called rock salt. The solid domes, found over the years by oil drillers, were of only geological interest until recently.

Then someone hit on the idea of digging into the salt to create a cheaply built reservoir.

The best way to do this was to allow water to dig.

So shafts were sunk into the domes, water introduced to dissolve the salt, the water then pumped out.

This plan created great underground caverns with solid salt walls that will hold a variety of liquids.

Fifteen miles west of here, Precision Underground Storage Corp. had six million gallons of liquefied petroleum tucked away in man-made caverns in the top of Butler salt dome when the winter fuel rush began. Liquefied petroleum is also known as bottled gas. It is used for home heating systems in areas unserved by gas utilities.

The Butler dome is one of the largest and most accessible in the East Texas area, pushing up to within 250 feet of the surface. It is flat top covers an estimated 1,200 acres.

Freestone Underground Storage Corp. has drilled three wells into the Butler dome, the last completed last year.

"Sixty per cent of our clients are women," said Lou Modell, who is known as "the pawnbroker's pawnbroker" and operates the nation's top individually owned pawnshop.

"Why? Because women are not loath for being able to spend more money accidentally than men can on purpose."

"Many high women—even those with an income of \$50,000 or more a year—will buy a piece of jewelry for \$20,000, then take the \$20,000 and go out and buy another piece of jewelry with it."

"Divorcees borrow most often on their jewelry. Then wealthy wives. Widows come last."

"Career women aren't such regular clients because, to begin with, they usually are good businesswomen. Also, if they need money in a hurry, they usually have a boy friend they can borrow from."

The new agency said Yehshui-loy started the conversation by observing "If we remain divided we will always be defeated." Chou then said the Kuomintang and Communist parties had cooperated on two other occasions and Mao interrupted to say "And we are preparing to cooperate for a third time."

There was no amplification of Mao's remark.

The first period of Kuomintang-Communist cooperation was in the 1920's when they united to march successfully against the northern warlords. The bloody split that followed broke into open warfare in 1927.

The second honeymoon period occurred during World War II when they agreed to form a united front against Japanese invaders.

The postwar coalition plan failed, the Reds withdrew from the north and launched the campaign which was then control of all the mainland in 1949.

Estimate Mill Rate

The District this year is paying a 3-mill tax for these services. However, a new mill rate is expected to be set by District Directors in the next few weeks, also July 1.

Special Tax District Ordinance Approved

Town Directors last night unanimously approved a special tax ordinance for the Eighth District and the Town of Manchester.

Approval came at a public hearing in the ordinance which will enable the Eighth District to escape double taxation for five protection. The ordinance became effective in 10 days, but is subject to approval of the Legislature.

The Eighth District last week rejected consolidation with the town and will continue to support its own fire department and sewage plant through a District Tax.

Estimate Mill Rate

According to General Manager Richard Martin's latest estimate, a 33.6-mill rate will probably be levied for the District for the fiscal year beginning July 1. The mill rate he estimates for the District is 31.2 mills, but does not include fire protection and sewage for which the District must tax itself.

The District this year is paying a 3-mill tax for these services. However, a new mill rate is expected to be set by District Directors in the next few weeks, also July 1.

He urged that the District may slowly expand as it extends its territory to include the fire protection and sewage for which the town and thereby control tax for these services.

One specific area mentioned was Duval St. which is receiving water from the Eighth District through it but is not officially within that District.

He told the Directors that the town will tax property owners on that street if the Eighth District does not accept the street by Oct. 2.

Sheep Suffer From Sunburn

In Australia Melbourne—It has been found that sheep can suffer from sunburn even though they are well accustomed to the sun.

Michael Robinson of the Biological Division of the Imperial Chemical Industries of Australia says sunburn can kill lambs and young sheep. He says the trouble is not entirely due to the sun, but to the high content of chlorophyll in green grass.

Inside the sheep the chlorophyll forms fluorescent substances which are normally destroyed in the liver before reaching the blood stream.

When, however, the grass is very lush and green, the amount of chlorophyll may be too great to be filtered in that way. Then the surplus spills into the blood stream and the skin may become abnormally sensitive to sunlight, Robinson reports.

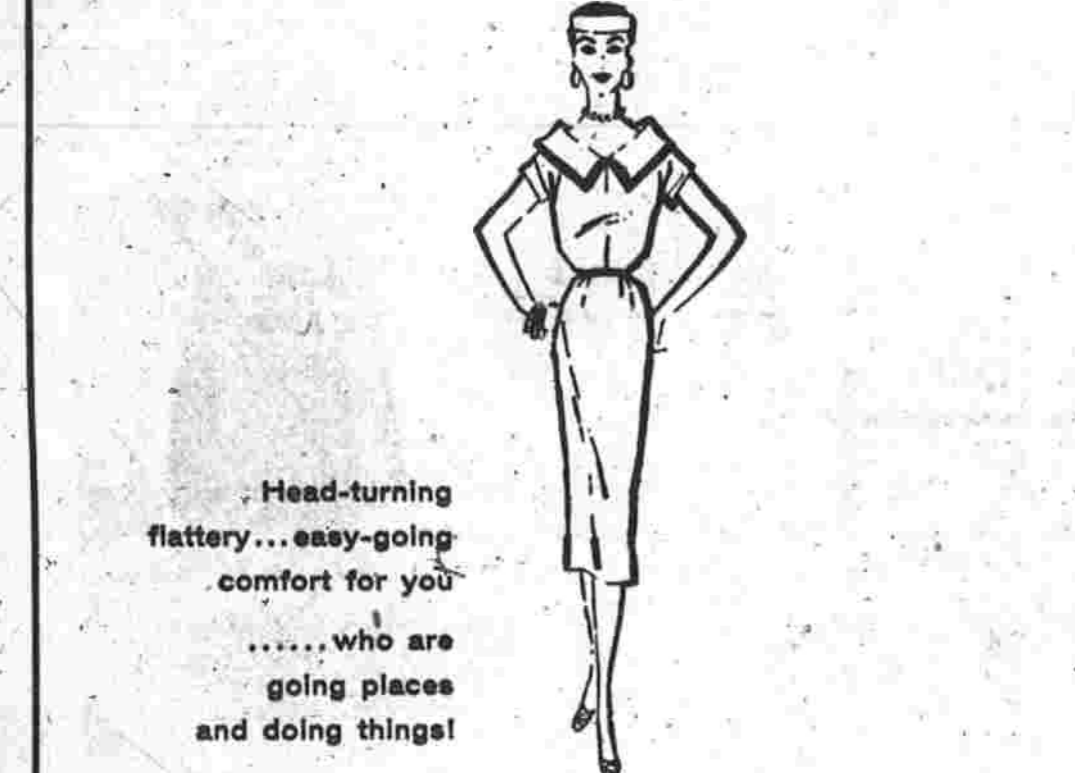

serious mistake if the United States opposed such an Arab union. "Nothing could be better for the Arab States," he said, "than to have a stable, prosperous Arab world, and the best way to achieve this is through a union of Arab states. You became strong when your separate states formed the United States of America. We likewise would like to have a United States of Arabia."

Khalidi, whose Toman moderate cabinet took office almost a week of political crisis, predicted however that there is little hope for Middle East stability so long as Israel exists in its present form. " Jews lived with Arabs peacefully for thousands of years," he said, "but when most like Premier David Ben-Gurion came on the scene with their poisoned ideas, they created trouble between us. There is no hope for peace and stability so long as their attitudes and Jews prevail among the Jews of Israel."

"Frankly, I don't know what a solution can be found. Naturally we do not want to throw the Jews into the sea or massacre them as Hitler did. But there can be no peace or stability so long as Israel exists in its present form."

Som Veto of Confidence
Khalidi said he is "absolutely certain" his cabinet — made up of three former parliament and four older statesmen — will win a vote of confidence from parliament. He added that he would not have formed the government if he had not been sure of a parliamentary majority.

"I know we will not get a unanimous vote, of course," he said, "but we will have a constitutional majority." He praised his cabinet members for showing a "great sense of responsibility during one of the most difficult periods our country has faced."

The premier said he is determined to uphold the constitution, including the requirement that the cabinet present its program to parliament within one month. "Our first objective is to insure public tranquility," he said, "and that we will proceed with our program. So far as we are concerned, the sooner we present our program to parliament the better."

"The main thing to remember is that we cannot turn back the clock in this country. We can only go forward and that is what we intend to do," he said. "We are not going to establish diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union."

"We can say proudly that since Gen. (Sir) John Bagot Glubb was removed we have maintained the efficiency of Jordan's Army, and we intend to improve its efficiency in the future," he added.

Khalidi said the government is doing everything in its power to insure order and tranquility during Holy Week and to provide for the security of tourists and pilgrims now arriving in Jerusalem for the Easter season.

"We feel certain pilgrims may observe their Easter devotions without the slightest interference," he added. "We are determined to maintain our position as the most neutral and impartial custodian of Holy places with the rank of minister."

In the Israeli sector of Jerusalem, an Israeli Foreign Ministry spokesman declared last night the new regime in Jordan is "only a temporary government" and the end is not in sight for a struggle.

The Washington dispatch to the Daily News said Edgar, Eisenhower's brother, while calling the budget "ridiculously high," added that he hasn't blamed Dwight for this situation because Congress appropriated the money. The Tacoma lawyer's "casual statements," the News story said, "dicked off such a furor that Edgar said he presumed he would be discussing the matter with the President at a dinner at the White House tonight."

Edgar, saying he had not discussed the budget with the President, added: "All I know is that costs are going up all the time. They are taking a big proportion of our total national income and that for me is something that everybody ought to be concerned about."

Edgar said he didn't know why the President supported the budget, but added that he believed his brother was "somewhat helpless about controlling it."

"Edgar," the story added, "took a strong stand against any kind of federal aid to education, although he has been fighting for it vigorously. He complained that half of my taxes in Tacoma are going for schools already and they claim that they need more schools."

Edgar said he recently asked Milton why he had in a speech taken a stand against federal aid for higher education rather than against aid of any kind.
