Canada Earmarks \$100 Million To Tone Up Nation's Culture

Ottawa, Canada (NEA) — Canada's top minister has announced a \$100 million program to tone up the nation's culture. The program is to be carried out over a period of five years. It includes the creation of a national library, the establishment of a national museum, and the improvement of the nation's educational system.

The general philosophy of the program, revealed by Parliament today, is that Canada is now rich enough to shed some of the material wealth which it has accumulated. Nothing like it has ever been done by a nation before.

Half of the money is to be spent during the next 10 years in construction grants to colleges, for scholarships. This is not controversial.

The other half is to be invested in the arts and sciences. It is estimated that the general fund of the arts and sciences is \$10 million per year. This is to be increased to \$20 million per year.

The program is to be carried out through the National Endowment for the Arts and Sciences. This is a new organization which will be established in Ottawa.

U.S. Buying on Credit Matches Repayments

New York, May 3 (AP)—Americans have welcomed spring by buying more things on time again after trimming their installment debts in the first two months of the year.

At the same time they have stepped up the total debt repayments so that new debt and payments on the old now just about balance.

It is merely an old, old truth about treaties and declarations which illustrate a basic principle: observe them when it pleases them, and scrap paper when it doesn't.

Of the moments of man, there are few which are equal in call and innocence. All of us, once, are the child, with a face of unclouded hope and promise, and all of us come to lie, at last, in the posture of death, with a face that is pale as a sheet and full of baffling, healing peace and assurance.

All that goes in between is like a dream, in which the man seeks out or finds himself thrust into various roles, wears the trappings of success or failure, makes or is pushed against, symbolizes strength or weakness, proportions himself to his own stature and, at the very same moment, in Bonn, Germany, another group of statesmen, none of them representing countries also interested in the atomic arms race, really mean?

Well, until some better thought is advanced, we have to judge what nations mean by what they do rather than by what they say. And the record of what nations have done as compared to what they have said during the atomic age is very simple. They have talked disarmament. They have kept on building more and bigger bombs. Originally, there were two nations which were atomic powers, and which talked about taking the atom out of war even while they raced each other in preparation for an atomic war. Now there are three nations to be classified as atomic powers, Britain having proudly joined the United States and Russia in that classification. This is the way the world acts, for all its talk, and its likely prediction is that, if it keeps on, there will be still more atomic powers, basing their own power and security on the weapon everybody agrees ought to be abolished.

Yet, in the end, this great and glaring inconsistency has its fundamental consistency, after all. Men and nations can never really mean what they say about the atom, until they are ready to act to give up not merely the atom, but war itself. The dilemma remains unanswered and unresolved until we answer both horns of it with one decision—to give to the United Nations law and police against war, and responsibility for the security of all. Until we come to that fundamental decision, we will keep on talking one way and acting another.

Another Scrap of Paper

A summary analysis, to the effect that our threatened instrument in Jordan was more properly under the so-called Tripartite Declaration of 1950 than under the Eisenhower Doctrine, reminds of that dear, dead scrap of paper, and of how, in the kind of test for which it was designed, it governed the policies of the three nations who had signed it.

The signers, back in 1950, were Britain, France, and the United States. By it, they pledged their word and their force to the maintenance of peace in the Near East, between Israel and the Arab states. They pledged themselves to help whichever side might be attacked by the other.

During the past two years, that 1950 declaration was reaffirmed and reprinted many times,

wonder, if Mr. Dulles applies to other nations the same standards he would apply to us. Last fall, for papers, and many British people refused to "channel" themselves into support of the British foreign policy of the moment, which was to attack Egypt, were these British newspapers and British people renies to their "loyalty" and patriotic duty? Or did they, by chance, perform that duty in its most possible form? They should have supported a foreign policy they believed to be wrong? Or should they have fought to change it?

There has, in the history of the world, been only one form of government which has either claimed or practiced the privilege Mr. Dulles now claims. That is, wherever its particular label, always been a totalitarian form of government.

Doctor's Opinion May Be Divided But Tranquilizer Sales Soaring

By TOM DYGAARD
 Detroit (AP)—You've got to make a guess, your history, and so you take a tranquilizer pill to ease the tension.
 The pressure of business weighs heavily on your nerves. So you take a tranquilizer pill to ease the tension.
 The tranquilizing aspect of a conference or a personal effort are ousted off with a pill.
 Doctors who have studied this relatively new antidote for the universal human ailment of nervousness differ in their opinions of its effects.
 Dr. Keith F. Kilham of Los Angeles, an authority on the effect of tranquilizers on the brain said flatly:
 "These things are too potent to be meeting around with over-the-counter sales."
 Dr. Philip B. Bradley of Birmingham, England, who has done extensive work with tranquilizers, cautions that they work in a "rather subtle" way. They appear to act in a way which seems to interfere with our perception of the external world.
 But Dr. James G. Miller, a University of Michigan psychiatrist who has conducted extensive tests on the effects of tranquilizers, says:
 "There is no reason why people should not take tranquilizers for their whole life if it helps better their lives."
 Dr. Kilham and Dr. Bradley discussed tranquilizing drugs at an international symposium on the medicinal formation of the brain which was held at the University of Michigan here.
 Dr. Kilham said that tranquilizers are second only to anesthesia in the number of prescriptions written in the United States.
 He believed that this network of fibers and nerves, which plays a major role in conducting impulses and relaying information and controlling attention, is affected by the tranquilizer.
 The result, says Dr. Bradley, "is not a distortion of the environment, but the interpretation is altered."
 In other words, with the help of a tranquilizer drug, things that used to bother you are brushed off with a minimum of worry, anxiety and tension.
 "Tranquilizers are billed as a way to beat the tensions of the fast modern pace without the dangerous effects of habit-forming drugs such as narcotics."
 "But," said Dr. Kilham, counting on tranquilizers is like driving a car without a clutch pedal—pretty soon you don't want to go back to a car with a clutch pedal."
 He believes there is danger in the prolonged use of tranquilizers. "The dangers of self-medication are great," he said, "and probably worse than meeting the original problem."
 He refused to venture an opinion on whether they affect nerves.
 Statement Tempered
 Dr. Miller tempered his flat statements about the safety of tranquilizers with the advice that "it's always better to try and arrange our lives so we do not need artificial help to calm our nerves."
 He said a series of tests showed there is no effect on a person's reaction while under double the normal dose of a tranquilizer.
 The study, conducted by the Mental Health Research Institute of the University of Michigan Department of Psychiatry, showed that tranquilizers caused no effect on mental attention, ability to drive a car, or judgment, mental alertness or vision, he said.

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Home Rule Law Urged Over New Amendment

State Capitol, Hartford, May 3 (Special)—The Legislative Committee today urged the adoption of a home rule law which would give the State's municipalities the right to do as they please within their own boundaries.
 At a hearing on a home rule bill, which would make it easier for towns to manage their own affairs than the present law does, the committee gave a statement from Home Chairman George Angwin (R-Warner) of the Constitution Amendments Committee saying that the bill would give the municipalities the right to do as they please within their own boundaries.
 "Such action can be taken later," he said, after legislation is put on the books and the people have a chance to see how it operates."
 Carter Atkins, executive director of the Connecticut Public Health Department, said that the bill would give the municipalities the right to do as they please within their own boundaries.
 "The bill before the committee would, among other things, allow a town to make changes in its charter if approved by a bare majority of the voters on a referendum," he said.
 "There are no legal means by which a town can change its charter, but because it is difficult for many towns to pass a charter change bill, the Legislature has passed a bill which would give the municipalities the right to do as they please within their own boundaries."
 Only 3 Cases Listed
 Dr. James C. Hart, director of the Bureau of Preventive Diseases, said only three polio cases were reported in the State so far this year. The cases, involving two girls and a 10-year-old young girl, were all mild and non-paralytic, he added.
 During all of 1936, the State recorded 83 cases of polio, compared with 654 in 1935, when the vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas Salk became available.

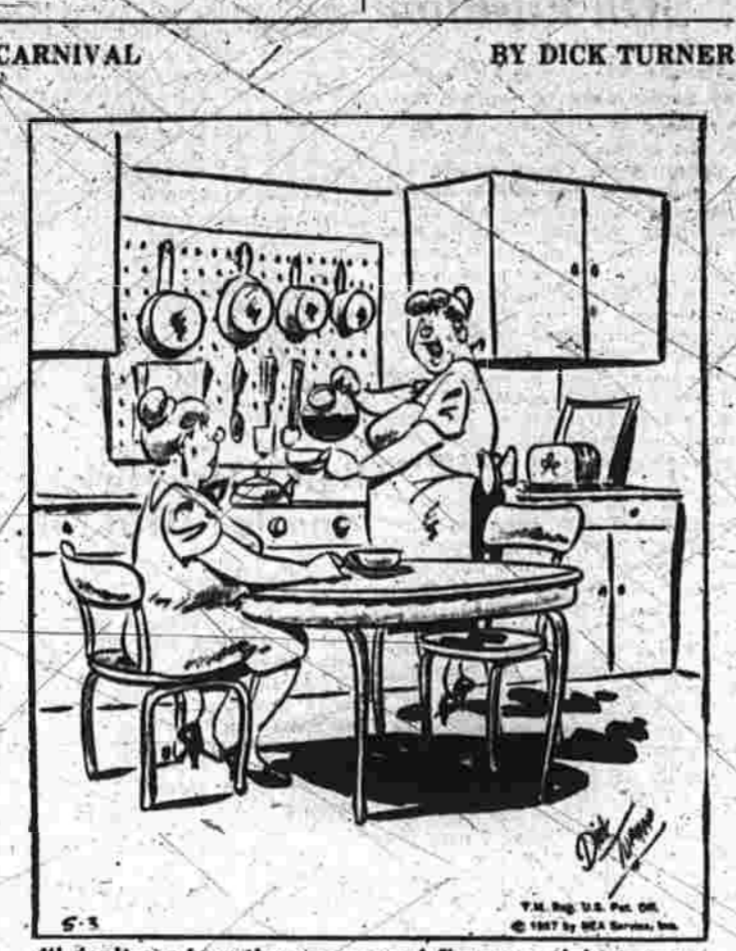

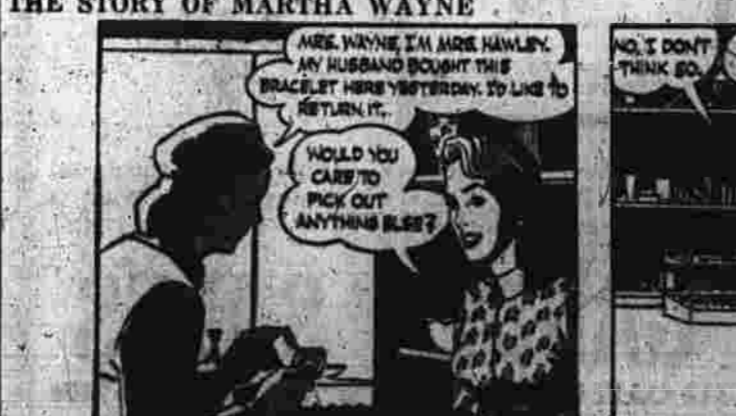
