Washington, May 10 (AP)-President Eisenhower said today there no longer is a "Solid South" controlled by the Democrats. He urged Dixie Republicans to launch political offensive in the party's drive to recapture control of Congress next year. Eisenhower said there have been 'impressive increases" in GOP strength in the South during the last 20 years. "The Republican party is, o

course, in the South to stay," he Eisenhower sounded his call for enewed Republican activity in Dixie in a telephoned message to party workers attending a re-gional GOP rally at Louisville, Ky, presentatives from 12 southern nd border states were on hand for the session, the fourth of a series of such rallies being held around the country.
