### Coroner Describes Events Leading to Horan's Slaying

Hartford, May 13 (AP)—Special Agent Richard P. Horan of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was the police officer who suggested searching the Suffolk house where he lost his life after being shot by Francis Kokalowski of Hartford, it was disclosed yesterday by Coroner Louis W. Schneider.

Kokalowski, a fugitive since he had shot and killed his wife the night of March 22, showed up the morning of April 18 at the home of his sister, Mrs. Wanda Slater on East St. Suffolk.

Mrs. Slater after observing him in a wooded area west of her home, drove to the Suffolk police headquarters and reported what she had seen.

The information was relayed to the police headquarters in Windsor, where state and local police and the FBI had been making a search for Kokalowski, also a suspect in a \$20,000 Windsor holdup.

Chief Philip Schwartz of the state police, Chief Arthur G. Wall of Windsor, Lt. James D. Murray of Hartford, and other investigators immediately drove to the Slater home where they were joined by Chief Frank Suttis of Suffolk.

**Tear Gas Used**

"While the cellar search was being made, other officers had arrested Horan and other men in the Slater home where they were taken by Chief Frank Suttis of Suffolk.

**STARTLING DEFENSIVE PLAY NEEDED TO DEFEAT SLAM**

By Alfred Sheinwold

Imagine you have the East cards in today's hand. You have passed quietly during the auction, and you hope that your queen and your ace will defeat the slam.

West opens the ten of spades, dummy plays the jack, and you have a sigh. There went one of your two kings!

South leads the ten of diamonds to dummy's king and returns a low heart from dummy. You follow suit with a low heart, hoping that South plans to take some sort of finesse. Actually, South puts up with the king of hearts, winning the trick.

South now cashes the queen of clubs, leads the jack of diamonds to dummy's ace, and continues with the ace of clubs. You follow with a disc, and South discards a spade.

**Discard Important**

Dummy continues with the king of clubs, and it is up to you to make a discard. What would you throw away?

Only one spade you throw away some small diamond or small spade. South discards a second low spade and leads another low heart from the dummy. You play low again, and South shows the queen of hearts. South leads a third heart, and you follow with the ace. South then has the rest of the tricks, making his slam.

What can you do about it?

When dummy leads the king of hearts, you should throw away the ace of hearts!

Now South cannot develop the hearts without giving a trick to West's jack of hearts. This puts West in position to take the setting trick with his jack of clubs.

### Extension and Farm Bureau Seek to Split

Rockville, May 14 (Special)—A special meeting to act on separation of the Tolland County Farm Bureau and Extension Service will be held at the county office tomorrow at 8 p.m. Wesley R. Bradway, president, has announced.

Plans for reorganizing the farm bureau and establishing the Tolland County Agricultural Extension Council will be submitted for vote. The proposed separation has been considered for years and has become necessary because of the contrast in the work of the two units, according to John Elliott, county agent.

The Farm Bureau was established in this state in 1916, and was originally set up to sponsor the extension service. However, the bureau is getting to be the voice for agriculture in New England and in that work is representing private business.

The Extension Service is the educational arm of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, Elliott said. The service strives to bring information on research to the people.

It is a public agency sponsoring programs on agriculture, home-making and 4-H work.

The Farm Bureau and Extension Service of Hartford County separated last July, Elliott said. If the Tolland County agencies separate they will be the second in the state to do so.

Purposes of the Farm Bureau under the proposed separation are as follows: To strengthen and promote the development of the most profitable and permanent system of agriculture, to engage in the active production, marketing, production, marketing, manufacturing, buying, selling or supplying of livestock, dairy and poultry products, grain, tobacco, fruit and vegetables and any other related activities on a co-operative basis.

For its members, to provide with and to unite with other County Farm Bureau, Inc. and the American Farm Bureau Federation to further the study and enactment of constructive legislative programs.

The separation is expected to strengthen both organizations.

### House Redefines Statutory Insanity

Hartford, May 15 (AP)—The State House of Representatives passed and sent to the Senate yesterday a bill changing the legal meaning of "mentally ill person."

The meaning now in State law books is that a person is "mentally ill" if he is "insane, idiotic and imbecile."

The new proposed meaning draws up to conditions of modern psychiatric thinking. It is: "A person afflicted by mental disease to such an extent that he requires care and treatment for his own welfare or the welfare of others or of the community."

### Safety for Baby

Mothers sacrifice their children on the altar of carelessness every day.

Be sure collar doors that lead into the house are kept locked. 2. Avoid leaving heavy objects on tables within a child's reach.

3. Keep baby out of the kitchen when preparing meals or put him in a high chair. 4. Be sure he has a sturdy high chair and the tray is locked when he is in it.

5. Soft toys are the safest playmates. 6. Keep disinfectants, poisonous cleaning fluids used in kitchen and bathrooms on the highest shelf, as good place too to keep medicines.

7. Teach a child the dangers of hot water and matches. One out of five deaths due to burns is a child under 5.

8. Wrap broken china and old razor blades carefully and dispose of them where children cannot get at them.

9. Do not leave baby unattended for an instant when changing his diaper or clothes on a table or bed. Baby may flip off the surface in a moment. Keep your hand on him at all times even when you are groping for something.

10. Do not leave a young child alone in a bath.

Put yourself in a child's place for a minute. What does he see when he crawls or toddles around the floor? Studies that members of the family drop no doubt, to be picked up later—collar buttons, nail pins, matches, cigarettes, forks. These are items that are dangerous in the hands of a crawler who is at the tasting stage.

What does he see when he stands up to try his legs? What can he reach? Knives, scissors, safety pins left too near counters may cause serious injury. Many a child has been grabbed reaching up to a stove, curiously grasping the handle of a steaming pot. Stoves are dangerous enough even with nothing on them—many electric models take a long while to cool off, showing no evidence of heat long after burners are turned off.

When Junior begins to clutch at tables to propel himself around the room be sure his underfooting is safe. Area rugs and highly polished floors can cause serious injury to the baby who is going through the "testing" stage. All rugs should be safely anchored. Stairs that may be tubed are favorites these days especially to protect creepers from excess dust and grime. Area rugs of the new synthetic fabric, such as acrilan may be machine washed and dried. 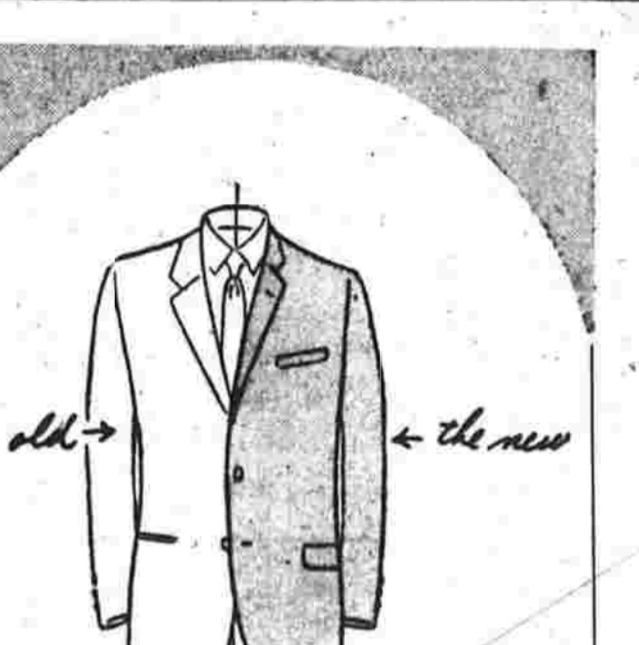

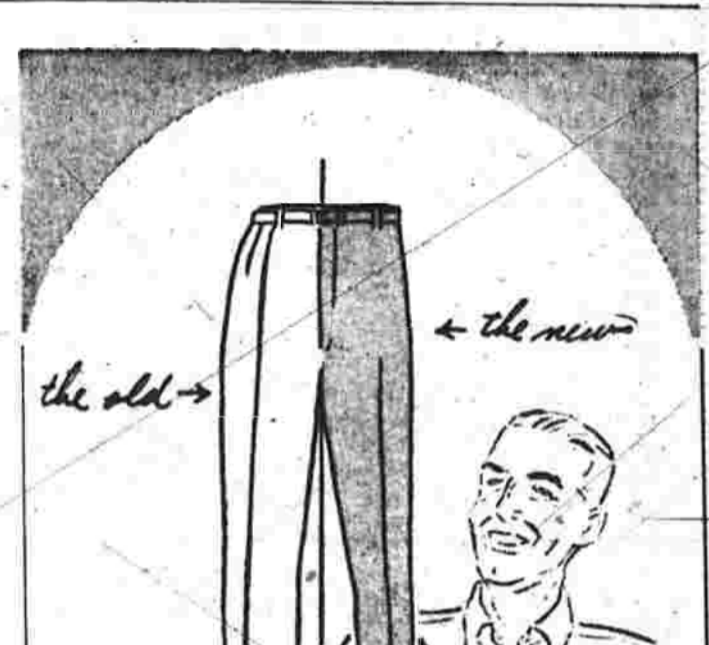

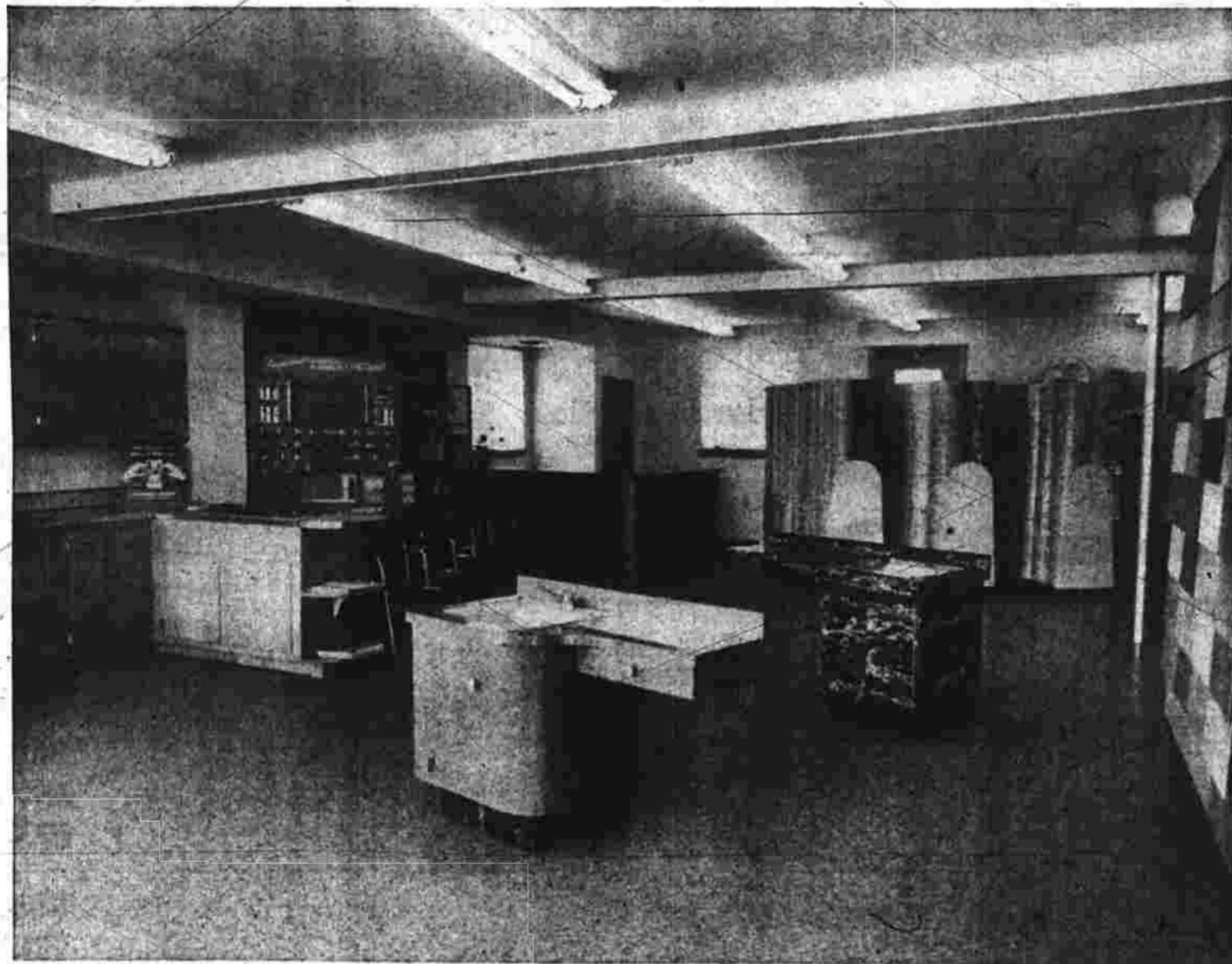

### '1-Man Army' Wermuth Wears Sheriff's Badge

Golden, Colo. (AP)—Uncle Sam's "1-Man Army" of Batasan, Art Wermuth, has stored down.

He's working only 14 hours a day as sheriff of Jefferson County, a booming suburban area in the Rocky Mountain foothills west of Denver.

"I love being sheriff," says the stocky 202-pounder with crew-cut hair. He's credited with single-handedly killing 116 enemy Japanese in the Philippines during World War II.

Wermuth, 41-year-old Republican, was appointed last January to the sheriff's job after a predecessor got into income tax trouble.

If things develop like he hopes, Wermuth will seek reelection.

Wermuth's postwar career has been just as exciting as his time in Army service. During the war he won the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star, Bronze Star, five Purple Hearts and put in three years and four months in a Japanese war prisoner camp.

Since August 1945, he's been an impresario of a flying circus, a drug salesman, service station operator, city marshal of Wichita, Kan., and an oil engineer in Venezuela.

After the South American venture—ended by his wife's illness—Wermuth settled at her home town of Lakewood, Colo., a Denver suburb. He prospered as an insurance salesman, built a home at Evergreen and acquired a 108-acre ranch at Conifer, Colo.

As sheriff of Jefferson County, Wermuth has a staff of 38 and jurisdiction over 12,000 square miles and 86,000 persons.

The physical dangers of law enforcement pose no problem for Wermuth, who candidly—not boastfully—says "I'm not afraid of anything."

His big goal, he says, is to straighten out juveniles who get into trouble.

Wermuth and his wife, Patricia, a former parachute jumper in his flying circus, adopted an 8-year-old boy last year and have applied for the adoption of a girl about the same age.

"Kids are great. I love 'em," he says.

### 'Coffee Breaks' Plus 'Religious Breaks'

Hal Boyle  
New York (AP)—Businessman Peter Vold has found a new way to boost office morale—with "religious breaks."

For six months now 100 employees in his Chicago headquarters have interrupted their usual chores for a half-hour each Monday to hold interfaith religious discussions.

"This hasn't made any sense of us, I'm sure," said Vold, president of the King Korn Premium Stamp Co., one of the nation's largest trading stamp firms.

"But I can tell the difference in morale already. We're doing better work, the atmosphere is more cheerful, and the caste system you find in many offices has been broken down."

"I think any business office would benefit by trying our brotherhood hour plan."

The plan is very simple. At 9:30 each Monday work halts, the employees gather in a conference room. They spend their usual 15-minute "coffee break" plus 15 minutes of company time discussing religion.

The discussions are led by a Protestant clergyman, a Roman Catholic priest, or a rabbi—they rotate from week to week, explain their faith, answer questions.

"Businessmen are usually very busy, and we have to break them up," said Vold, generally. "Participation is entirely voluntary, but now everyone in the office attends."

"As a matter of fact, neighbors are walking from a nearby restaurant have started dropping in, as well as visiting salesmen, and our conference room is getting crowded."

"The clergy's responses have been very enthusiastic. A number of clergymen from other faiths, in-

doubt it," said Vold. "But that's not our purpose. We haven't gone in for any banner waving, crusading, or religious ballyhoo."

"Our purpose wasn't to make money either. It was simply to make our employees know each other better, to feel better toward each other."

"They do now. The office work isn't done as if they were supposed to be doing it. It's done better, more as if they were all members of the same family."

"Productivity has increased, but the main benefit is that the work flows more freely because the employees feel more comfortable together than they did before."

"After all, one's particular religion is often an accident of birth. The employees realize now that while all creeds have their differences, yet underlying them all is the same basic doctrine of mutual help expressed by the Golden Rule."

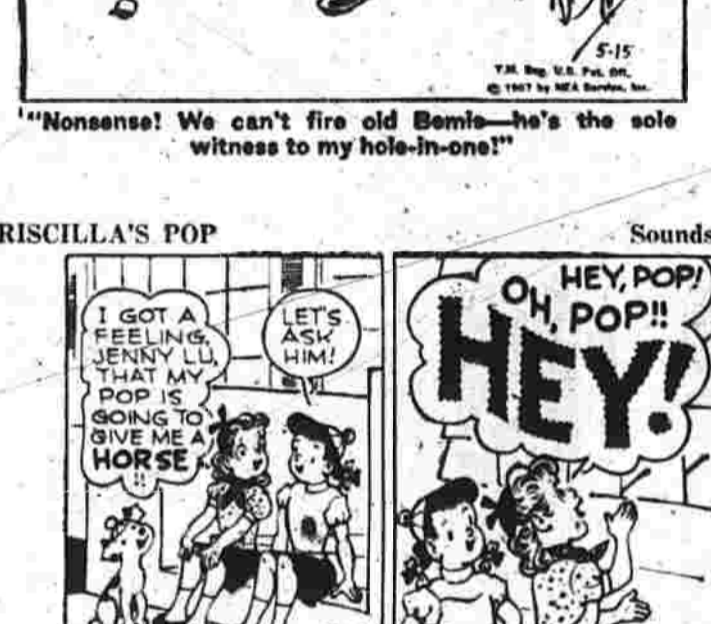

Third Sub In A-Fleet Launched

Groton, May 16 (AP)—The Skate, third of the nuclear powered atomic submarines, was launched today by the Navy. Moments earlier, Under-Secretary of the Navy William B. Franke said the launching marks the end of the era of research and prototype development.

The Skate, said Franke, will soon be considered the convention at atomic submarine. "The Skate is the first of a new class of atomic submarines," Franke said. "It is a power plant proven by experience with the Nautilus and while smaller than the Nautilus, it will be capable of similar performance achievements."

Future Building Program He noted that the atomic submarine construction program includes three sister ships of the Skate: seven more attack subs and four fast attack subs, plus a picket sub and one newly designed submarine.

In the fiscal 1958 budget, the Navy has requested funds for one more attack submarine and three guided-missile firing submarines all atomic powered.

The Skate, Franke said, is much smaller than the Triton, but will have "sensational" performance characteristics.

The day is coming, Franke said, when many of the atomic submarines will be nuclear powered.

In discussing the program for building nuclear powered submarines as well as submarines, Franke said it will be obvious "to friend and foe alike that the Navy is embarked on a course that will result in the most powerful fleet ever assembled; a fleet ready to respond to any emergency, whether it be deterrence by showing the flag or to retaliate swiftly in case of attack."

The Skate, which is 265 feet long, is the largest submarine ever built.

The flood water from a cloud-burst ripped through Spokane, forcing the evacuation of hundreds of persons and causing heavy damage.

Roads and bridges were washed out and cars were trapped by the fast-rising water which could not be carried quickly enough at the height of the violent storm.

Major damage occurred when a bank washed away and broke a dam near a town in Idaho, carrying much of the runoff from the South Hill residential section off the main business district.

Water from the broken sewer unit flooded the town, forcing the evacuation of an apartment house and the rear wall crumpled. The building hung precariously on a steep bank as soft dirt on either side was carried away.

Water and silt cascaded into the Peaceful Valley residential area. Cars were trapped, fender-deep in water and mud.

20 Storms Rake State, Many Hurt

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS More than 20 tornadoes lashed Texas last night and today, and state police counted at least 20 deaths. Scores were injured and property damage was heavy.

The worst tornado struck Silverton, 45 miles southeast of Amarillo, where police counted the 20 dead. The twister roared through the small town of 857 population at 10:30 p. m. (CST).

The twister destroyed or damaged 20 more homes and business places.

Deaths were being searched for possible other victims. State Police said residents had difficulty identifying all the bodies. At least one victim died on route to a hospital.

At least 68 persons were injured, many of them critically. One death at State Police reported occurred at the nearby community of Lone Star.

No warning at all "we got no warning at all," said one victim, "it came down on Silverton out of the rainy night without warning. People died without knowing what happened. In one family, seven are dead."

The black funnel destroyed 25 homes, a cotton gin, four granaries and a school. It damaged at least 30 other homes, a small automobile, buses and utility lines.

The worst storm in the community is in the Texas Panhandle, 40 miles southwest of Amarillo.

"The people in a numb with shock and terror," said Swisher County Sheriff Dan Smith. "They can't seem to realize what has happened."

All communication lines and utility lines were knocked out. The Red Cross death toll of 12 was compiled from Department of Public Safety radio reports.

National Guard units, nurses, doctors, Red Cross helpers and other health services were ordered to converge here from almost every point in the Texas Panhandle.
