### New Device Uncovers Common Heart Defects

Washington, May 17 (AP)—Development of a new technique for accurately locating the most common kind of congenital heart defect was announced today by the public health service.

The new method is designed to pinpoint the location of holes that let blood leak from the left to the right chambers of the heart. It involves injecting a dye chemical into the left side of the heart and the time it takes to pass through tiny arteries of the aorta.

**FOXY PLAY FULFILLS UNMILKABLE CONTRACT**

Mr. Fox had no chance to make his game contract. The opponents had two good clubs and two aces. It was North's fault, of course, but his double rise was a clear overbid.

As if happened, however, Mr. Fox found a way to steal his contract.

West opened the deuce of hearts, leading the lowest of three small cards, as many experts recommend. Dumny played low, and East roused the ten. East could have played the ace of hearts, but his top club, but he could not have done so because he had a trump trick. West might be leading from Q-6-3, which would give East two heart tricks.

### Ribicoff Asks Assembly Decide Now on '59 Tax

State Capitol, Hartford, May 17.—Gov. Ribicoff contended yesterday that the present General Assembly has it in its power to decide whether increased taxes will be needed in 1959.

If bigger taxes are to be avoided in the future, he said at his news conference, "the time to do it is now."

The Democratic Governor's comments were prompted by a statement made by State Republican Chairman Clarence E. "Chapp" Baldwin that "there is no chance in the world to escape tax increases two years from now unless something drastic is done."

Baldwin proposed that the General Assembly study the problem of increasing state costs so that it can have definite recommendations for the 1959 Legislature.

Ribicoff said he has "high respect for Chapp Baldwin" and he has no objections to the proposal for an interim study.

However, said the Governor, "that is not the key to the problem, not the basic answer."

The key to no new taxes in 1959, he said, is "the '59 budget now before the Legislature."

Ribicoff announced that fiscal officials had just reported to him the state's estimated income for the 1957-58 biennium will be \$207,000,000 higher than originally estimated. That will mean total revenues of \$467,000,000, including a \$25 million surplus.

"I don't like to bring this up, sir, but the faces are now in the state," he said.

"If the General Assembly avoids spending that money and if it approves a budget as substantially reduced as that, we can avoid any tax increase in 1959."

Ribicoff said it is important that the General Assembly avoid putting into the budget "built-in" obligations which will be costly to the state in 1959.

### Assembly Votes Bill on Return Of Run-aways

Hartford, May 17 (AP)—The state Legislature has given the Governor the right to seek the return from other states children who run away from their Connecticut homes.

Under terms of the bill passed yesterday by the Senate the Governor could deal with other states by entering contracts for the return of runaways.

The bill, which now goes to the Governor for his signature, holds that juveniles who are not under proper supervision and control, or who have absconded, escaped or run away are likely to endanger their own health, morals and welfare, and the health, morals and welfare of others.

It authorizes the Governor to enter into contracts with other states for cooperative supervision of delinquent juveniles on probation or parole.

The return from one state to another of delinquent juveniles who have absconded or escaped from home.

The return from one state to another of non-delinquent juveniles who have run away from home.

Additional measures for the protection of juveniles and of the juveniles who have absconded or run away from home.

### Restrict Political Parties

Hartford, May 17 (AP)—A bill stating that a political party must poll at least 1 per cent of the vote in an election to assure itself a place on the next ballot was passed unanimously by the House yesterday and sent to the Senate.

The current law requires a party to get only one-half of 1 per cent.

Chairman of the Elections Commission, Trumbull of the Elections Commission said the bill was intended to avoid the situation where a capricious handful of people can meet and determine if it is more profitable to enter a candidate in an election or endorse a major party candidate.

### Outer Mongolia Seen Splitting Red Giants

By WILLIAM L. RYAN  
(AP Foreign News Analysis)

Moscow's announcement of important military and economic aid for Outer Mongolia may signify one of the most important political developments in the Communist world in years.

An undercurrent of argument apparently has been going on for months between Moscow and Peking. The Red Chinese want to break away from the tight Soviet grip on their economy and insure themselves against total Soviet domination.

Historically Part of China  
Mongolia is a new topic. The Chinese historically consider Outer Mongolia — fashioned by the Russians into a puppet "people's republic" — part of China. A contest for the area raged between China and Russia long before the two Communist revolutions. The contest for influence there still goes on.

The Russians made a strong but unsuccessful bid to get Outer Mongolia into the United Nations. Why? It would have finalized the separation of the province from China. Peking, as a Communist capital, could not have quarreled with it publicly.

A growing irritation between the two principal Communist giants became more plain after the revolution in Poland and Hungary last fall.

The first friction from Peking indicated the Chinese aimed with the nation of "inner Mongolia" and to turn the satellites. During this hour the Red Chinese expressed support for the Soviet actions in Hungary.

There is reason to suspect that in exchange for this shift, China exacted a price. Perhaps the price was not too high. Perhaps the Chinese will get the short end of the bargain.

Red China then, as now was wrestling with serious economic problems. Possibly there was a promise of additional economic help from the U.S.S.R.

However, the conflict appeared to sharpen thereafter. In February, something impeded Mao Tse-tung to announce there were "contradictions" between the Chinese Communist party and the masses, and that furthermore the development of China as a socialist state did not require belief that a severe class struggle had to continue.

### Court Bars Injunction In Nike Housing Case

The order directs the Anthony Miller Construction Co. to stop building the 27 dwelling units for the Army, to show cause why an injunction should not be issued.

Conway said that if he were to issue an injunction he would "in effect" be vacating the order of the Superior Court which granted the injunction in the Nike housing case.

Full Trial Possible He also said that his decision does not preclude the Lakewood Circle residents from requesting a show cause order, which would set the stage for a full trial with both parties presenting evidence.

The injunction which Conway refused to issue today was requested yesterday at an informal hearing in which the counsel for the construction firm was not present.

The hearing was held Monday afternoon at a hearing which was held by Judge Conway at the Superior Court.

The case involves the construction of Nike housing on the Lakewood Circle area, which is the subject of a long-running legal dispute.

Attorneys for the Lakewood Circle residents appeared in the judge's chambers during the hearing to request an injunction.

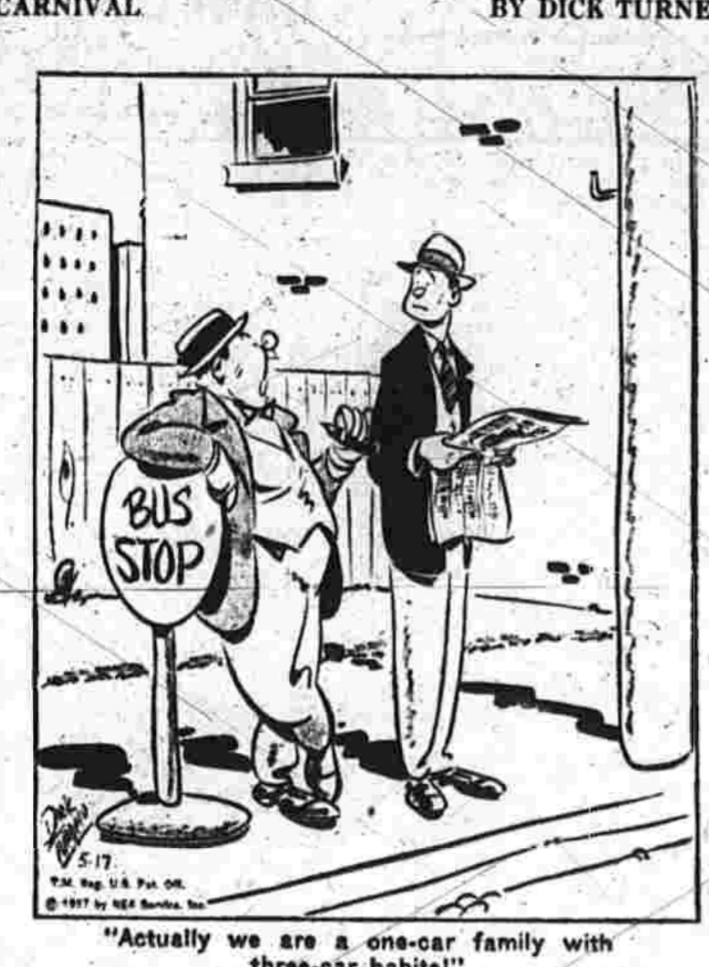
