Rockville-Vernon Probing Not Its Function, Town Meeting Informed

Rockville, May 22 (Special)—Action taken by Vernon Selectmen on five local questions and the functions of a town meeting came under discussion last night at the town meeting called for by petitioners.

Objections to the word "investigate" in the five items for which the meeting was called, were stated by Moderator James E. Vandervoort, who said it is not the function of a town meeting to investigate.

The petitioners wanted to know why: (1) the town has overpaid in Scott Acres and Overbrook Heights; (2) unimproved roads and allegedly open catch-basins on Plains Dr. and Jan Dr.; (3) use of State Aid Funds for town roads which, it is alleged, have been accepted before being com-

pleted; (4) why the fence at Northeast School, "paid for by Board of Education funds," has not been erected; and, (5) how much the building, known as the "Town Garage" on East St., cost, who approved construction and when it was approved.

Vandervoort told Earl Campbell, spokesman for the petitioners, answers to the questions should come directly from the Selectmen and not at a town meeting. Vandervoort then noted that the Selectmen need not answer questions but second Selectman Franklin G. Wells said "now is a good time to answer any and all questions."

Discussion began first on the item concerning the fence at Northeast School. Vandervoort asserted that the Selectmen need not be worked out at a town meeting. Since the information has been given to the Selectmen, the matter was dropped.

Campbell's complaint regarding roads appeared to be that the Selectmen had accepted the roads before they were properly surveyed. A discussion between Wells and Robert Thurman, builder of Overbrook Heights, revealed the roads early in the construction of the development, they are subsequently torn up by his heavy equipment. Thurman said he had a semi-finished state and a performance bond pending completion.

On two occasions when objections were made to the procedure of the meeting, and to "allowing parliamentarianism" on the part of the Selectmen, the meeting was adjourned. British Defense Boss Makes Historic Shift

London (NEA)—Red-headed Duncan Sandys, 49, is more likely to go down in history as the man who abolished Britain's "amateur army" than as Sir Winston Churchill's son-in-law.

For Sandys, as Britain's new defense boss, is the author of the biggest change in military policy ever made in normal times. In the words of the "Defense White Paper,"

"The Sandys five-year defense plans call for the scrapping of Britain's present 'amateur army'—the civilian soldiers, sailors and airmen who fought and won two great wars.

"They will be replaced by a small force of push-button technicians, recruited on a volunteer basis and equipped with the latest in nuclear weapons.

"Bombers will give way to guided missiles. Britain's big battle-wagons will be scrapped in favor of small main tank forces. Some 7,000 army, navy and air officers will go home, leaving only 10,000 in the service.

usually much more lenient than they would get if they were tried by their own military courts.

But if we refuse to allow American personnel to be subject to the laws and courts of the country in which they are stationed, then the super-patriots in those countries accuse us of lack of respect for their country, and of an ingenuitous insistence on extrajudicial rights which brand their nations as inferior nations in our eyes.

With most countries with whom we are on a friendly basis, then, we have negotiated status of forces treaties, by which we abandon the privilege of carrying American law into other countries, at least for offenses committed of duty and off post.

We are even now engaged in discussing such a treaty with the Formosa regime of General Chiang, to supplant the six-year-old arrangement under which our military personnel on Formosa enjoy immunity similar to that of diplomatic personnel. The Nationalist Chinese, like everybody else, consider such a concession an affront to their dignity.

And while we are negotiating with Chiang, about whether we shall give him a status of forces treaty, we are in trouble over the operation of such a treaty in Japan. There, as in Japan, a Japanese firing range used by our troops was hit by a cartridge case fired from a grenade launcher, and the Japanese have brought charges in their courts, against the soldier who did it.

Why are our scientists engaged in the satellite project? The answer is the same answer which applies to atomic research. Because their creed and their profession compel them to try to do everything that is possible.

After the atomic bomb had been perfected and tested and some scientists became concerned with moral issues. Should they have devoted their knowledge and skill to a project which was going to have such a terrible use? Or should they have refused to extend man's knowledge in a way which given the character of man, was most likely to prove dangerous to man?

So far, the publicity atmosphere around the project for a man-made moon has been delightfully scientific. It is, in fact, a project for our participation in the International Geophysical Year. The successful launching of a satellite will bring us more knowledge about our universe. The data we collect will be shared with all nations.

Why the Satellite?

Announcement that our plans for launching our first satellite in outer space have been delayed. The launching is being delayed so that we won't be scheduled off in September as anticipated, reveals that our scientists are finding their job a little tougher than expected.

But that they will solve their problems is almost a certainty. Meanwhile, this would seem a good time to raise, in advance, the very same issues many scientists have raised, as a post mortem, with regard to another twentieth century scientific miracle, the satellite of atomic fission.

Why are our scientists engaged in the satellite project? The answer is the same answer which applies to atomic research. Because their creed and their profession compel them to try to do everything that is possible.

After the atomic bomb had been perfected and tested and some scientists became concerned with moral issues. Should they have devoted their knowledge and skill to a project which was going to have such a terrible use? Or should they have refused to extend man's knowledge in a way which given the character of man, was most likely to prove dangerous to man?

So far, the publicity atmosphere around the project for a man-made moon has been delightfully scientific. It is, in fact, a project for our participation in the International Geophysical Year. The successful launching of a satellite will bring us more knowledge about our universe. The data we collect will be shared with all nations.

This seems, then, purely a scientific project, undertaken in the interests of pure science. One hardly notices that it is the Navy, which happens to be in charge of the project.

If this pure science project proves a success, however, it will soon begin to have attributes a little less pure. We will then, inevitably, seek to translate it into military terms and powers. If we alone have the satellite, we will think of it as a thing which gives us military domination of the world, as we once thought of the atom. If somebody else has the satellite too, we will be in a race of armed satellites, because we don't dare let anybody else get ahead of us.

Tolerance by Law

Down in New York, the City Council seems ready to attack, by direct legislation, a problem which is mainly whispered about in most American communities. Three members of the Council, two Democrats and the Republican minority leader, have joined in introducing a bill which would make it a misdemeanor, punishable by fine up to \$500, to refuse to rent or sell dwelling space for reasons of race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry.

There would be some exceptions. In the rental of one and two family homes, the sale of private homes built in developments of less than 10 units and the rental of accommodations in religious institutions.

The same councilmen, in 1954, introduced a bill which barred discrimination in private housing which had government mortgage insurance on it. That, after adoption in New York City, went on to become the Metcalf-Baker Law, adopted by the Legislature at Albany as a law for all the states of New York.

One way to appraise such legislation is to say that it imposes tolerance, and democracy, by the force of law, and that it is better and wouder to have tolerance and democracy grow by processes of evolution and education among Americans.

But another way to look at it is to say that in the America of today and in the world of today, there is no time to lose, and that if we don't hurry up with a progressive solution of the human problems which divide us, those problems will engulf us and our world.

The law ought not to have to spell out the specific details of what American democracy should mean. But perhaps the law has to begin to do just that, if the alternative is for American democracy to be betrayed to the hands of those who would use it to oppress and oppress.

"I hope you do not wish your government to take such a reckless gamble. I do not intend that your government take that gamble."

At another point Eisenhower called the aid program "a saving shield of freedom. And he added that ending or weakening the program would vastly increase the risk of future war."

There are those in Congress who are continuing to stand by the President in full support of the program. It is too early to tell whether Eisenhower's second appeal to the people will change the minds of any of those who want to trim freedom and other spending.

House GOP Backs Family Court Bill

Hartford, May 22 (P)—A House Republican caucus yesterday agreed that a proposal to establish a family court needs more study and apparently should be introduced in the 1958 General Assembly.

Most of the members of the Judiciary Committee and the co-chairmen of the General Law Committee, which has been working on a family court bill, reported to the caucus that it had been unable to iron out all the details.

The committee members said the issue should be studied further and taken up at the 1958 legislative session.

Majority leader Frederick Pope Jr. told newsmen after the caucus that resolutions creating interim committees to study the family court and other major issues between legislative sessions probably will be introduced.

An originally proposed, the family court would absorb the present juvenile court, take jurisdiction of divorce suits and other matters relating to family problems from the Superior Court and perhaps take over some of the functions of the probate court.

Asked whether he plans more check-out-the-people appeals, Eisenhower replied—with a smile but emphatically—that as long as he is in a fight he never stops.

Until he gets what he wants in the way of adequate funds to wage the peace and carry out the rest of his program, he will never stop fighting, he added.

South Korea—Eisenhower said that so far as he knows the new modern weapons which the United States has promised to South Korea have not yet been delivered. He declined to say whether the National Security Council has voted to start shipment.

Her glasses were blown from her face as the house cracked and splintered. But she and her two sons were unhurt, and later she found her glasses under a table.

The twisters bounded around both sides on the Mississippi River below St. Louis and continued to strike long after dark. One was sighted near Fredericktown, Mo.

In rural southern Illinois, the streets scattered about the town of the Alto Pass, Columbia, Clarkston and Herod were hit by heavy damage.

In Missouri, twisters were reported at Mendon in the north-eastern part of the state, at Neosho in the southern Ozark foothills; at Centerville, 46 miles south of Hannibal, and at Kennett, a town of 10,000, the one in Kennett struck after midnight, eight hours after the first one raged Van Buren. No deaths or injuries were reported.

At Des Moines, where 30 homes were leveled and 50 more damaged, damage was estimated at \$1 million. The twister district there was hard hit, too.
