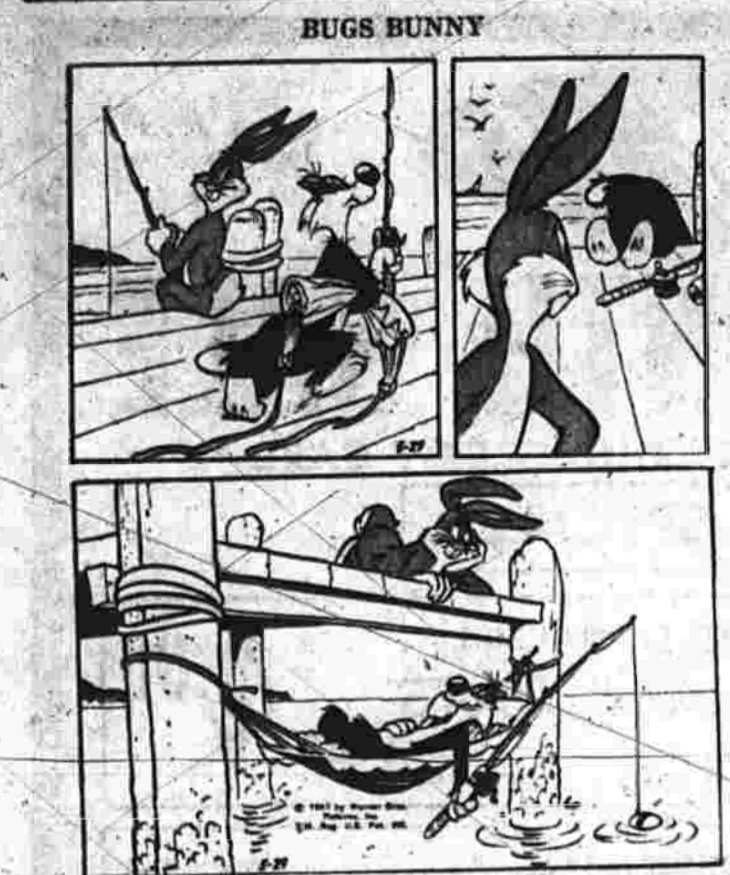

Warren's comment today were contained in an amendment on which he has reasons for voting in favor of the bill.

Waited 19 Days in Snow Rescuers Find Woman Survived Plane Crash

Rawlins, Wyo., May 31 (AP)—A 46-year-old Minnesota housewife who survived a mountaintop plane crash that fatally injured her husband was rescued yesterday after 19 days of patient waiting.

Mrs. Dalton LeMaunier was found without shoes and in flimsy clothing near the body of her husband. She never had a fire in the frigid climate.

Mrs. LeMaunier said she had shared both the car and a supply of vitamin pills with her husband before he died.

Her ordeal on the snow-laden mountain lasted more than a day longer than rescuers had thought the wreckage of their plane.

Mrs. LeMaunier's first words were "It's certainly a blessing to be alive."

Candy and Pills Her only nourishment was three small pieces of chocolate candy and a bottle of vitamin pills.

With only the remnants of the hurriedly wrecked and shrouded for protection Mrs. LeMaunier lived through almost constant storms. "You can't imagine how awful the weather must have been," she said one rescuer.

She shivered with joy when she spotted the site-man party. She was rushed to the Rawlins Hospital suffering from shock, frostbite, sunburn, exposure and malnutrition.

Said Dr. Robert D. Paul, Carbon County coroner: "I thought it was an echo from one of the fables. Then we saw this woman—she was wearing a husband's pants and a long woolen dress—and calling for help. "We were stunned, but once they began to think, even for a moment,

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Lebanon Army Subdues Riot By Pro-Reds

Beirut, Lebanon, May 31 (AP)—Two white men—once a teenager and once a young man—were charged with leading a riot of 200 pro-Reds in Lebanon today.

Business activity returned slowly to normal today after a day of violence. Eight rioters were killed, 200 put under arrest as the army squelched a demonstration by government opponents.

The government announced it was going ahead with parliamentary elections to begin June 5 and said the army will help suppress them.

The opposition leaders had demanded the continuation of protest "until the government falls and until the criminals who are government ministers get out of office."

The defense minister said the opposition was centering much of its ammunition on pro-western Press.
