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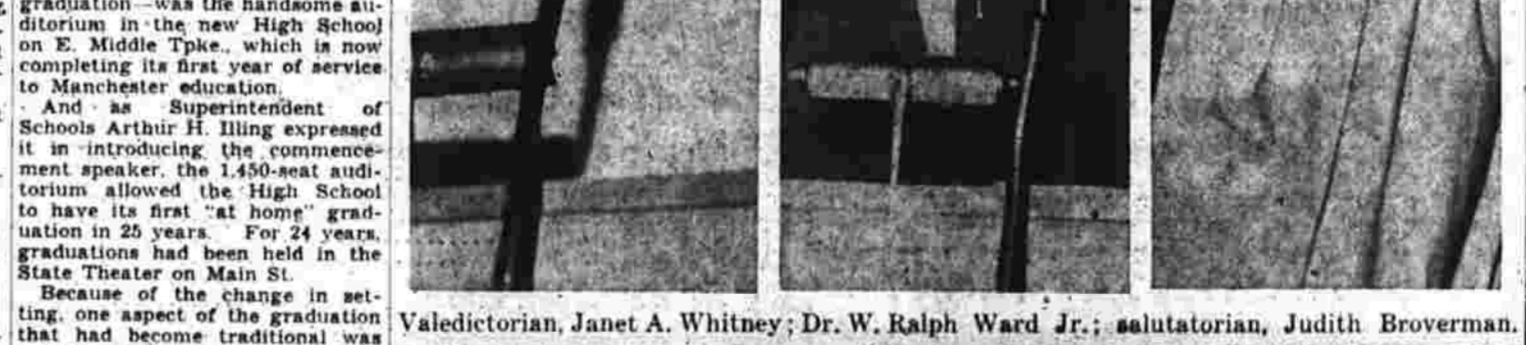

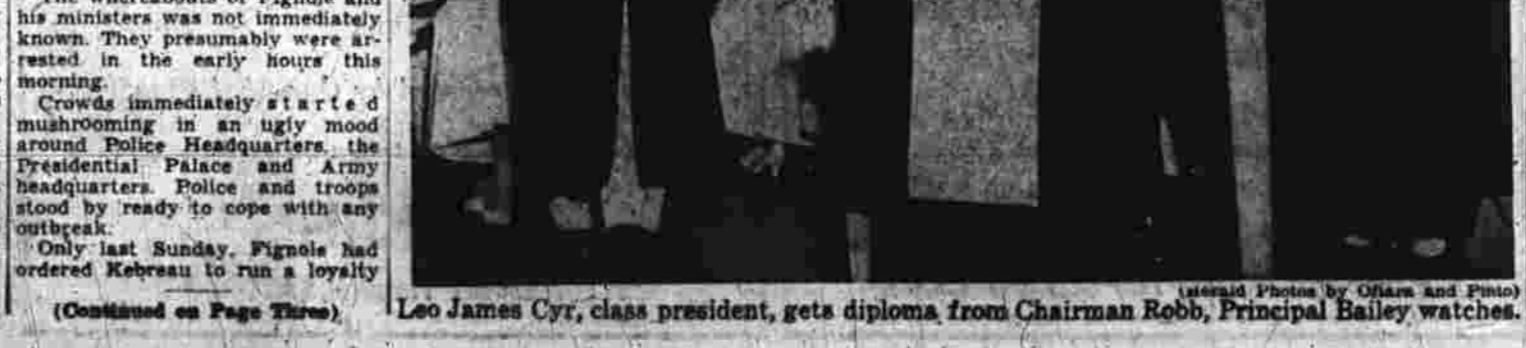

Martin Appoints Five To Parking Authority

A step in the direction of solving Manchester's parking and traffic problems was taken today with the appointment of the town's first parking authority.

Names of the five members were announced by General Manager Richard Martin, who made the appointments.

They include two mechanics, an attorney, a housewife, and a factory production manager. Two former directors and representatives of the North and West sides of the town as well as the downtown section are among the board members. Three are Republicans and two are Democrats.

Members of the authority are: Philip Harrison, proprietor of Harrison's Car & Gifts, 840 Main St.; a Democrat and a former Town Director; Harrison was also the man who campaigned for establishment of a parking authority. He lives at 96 Green Manor Rd.

Herbert A. Phelan Jr., an attorney with offices at 66 E. Center St.; a Republican. Phelan lives at 182 Cooper St.

John J. Cervoni, proprietor of the North End Package Store in Depot Square. Appointment of Phelan a Republican was recommended by the Manchester Improvement Assn., an organization of North End residents.

Mrs. Katherine Boun, a housewife with offices at 66 E. Center St.; a Democrat. Mrs. Boun lives at 129 Parker St.

John J. Cervoni, manager of manufacturing for Cheney Bros. a Republican. Cervoni is the former President Teachers Organization. He lives at 218 Oak St.

The parking authority was authorized by the Board of Directors of the town on Tuesday.

Members of the Board will investigate the town's parking problems and make recommendations for their solution. In the next few weeks, they will meet to discuss the problem. They will also discuss the problem of parking and traffic study and \$1,500 to pay for the study.

Not Four But One?

We have made a clear display of our views in the editorial note re- sponding to Russia's suggestion that the four big powers make a de- claration condemning the use of force in Near East disputes.

The way to settle Near East problems says our note, is "by im- plementation of the principles of the United Nations Charter."

It is not by making problems more acute by the four big powers.

One would never guess, from such a verbose note that so many are concerned, policy for the Near East has not been determined by the United Nations.

It is not by making problems more acute by the four big powers.

Our reason, then, for showing the United Nations out of the way and asserting our own way in, was simply that we were afraid if we did not do this, we would get ahead of us. It is no more a matter of speculation.

It is a matter of speculation, that is, except for this: that if we ever did the chips really did fall in the Near East, we will lead straight for the United Nations.

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A Good Alarm At London

It is a rather funny thing which has happened at the London confer- ence on disarmament, and it provides a sidelight on how seri- ously disarmament proposals have been taken in the Near East.

So long as the other nations of the world could see the United States and Russia waging a mere propaganda battle on disarmament, with each trying to win ac- ceptance for proposals something it knew the other would be sure not to accept, these other nations were content and serene.

They even indulged when things were that way, in the luxury of criticizing the two world giants.

During this period, one could have had the impression that there was nothing these peaceful minded countries wanted more than for the United States and Russia to get together and call off their arms race.

Now, however, there is an at- mosphere of politeness about the London conference. The politeness is that both the United States and Russia, for the first time in 10 long years of negoti- ating really mean little business, primarily because both have come to the realization that they can't just go on as they are.

Add now, suddenly, the smaller nations are as much afraid of real negotiation between the United States and Russia as they used to be desirous of it. Not that they don't want disarmament, it is merely that they don't want the two big powers doing it off in a corner by themselves, and negoti- ating something for lesser powers to accept.

Where they used to consider it a good sign if American and Russian diplomats went off in a cov- er for a private chat without in- sults, they now consider it a mis- ter for suspicion. And now that they sense some kind of disarma- ment or inspection agreement is within reach, these lesser na- tions are full of concern over de- tails which might affect them.

Perhaps their reaction is the best indication of all that there is a real chance of some kind of agreement at London. Never be- fore have these other nations had the slightest fear that anything would be negotiated, while they weren't looking, or negotiated at all.

The Possible Impossible

Those who like to believe that the impossible can be made the possible will salute the final outcomes of the meetings of the Connecticut Federation of Labor and the State CIO at Hartford in the last few days.

The question of whether or not these two powerful, rival labor orga- nizations in Connecticut should be able to settle their rivalries and come together in one state organ- ization, thus implementing the na- tional merger of the AFL and CIO, represented the severest test of that national merger.

For the many long months fol- lowing the national merger action, the state union had been an im- possibility. That disputation merely heightened when the two organizations opened their separate meetings at Hartford and im- mediately began flinging charges of disunity rather than reasons for unity. It became a hot probability that the two organizations would have come to that final meeting of the same ball under the same officers.

Yet the final outcome was the final meeting in the same ball, under new elected officers for one organization.

If this could happen, as it did, what almost anything in the field of human and organizational rela- tions can happen. Our congratulations to the statement of both sides, who saw that it did happen.
