Japanese Clash With Air Police

Tachikawa, Japan, June 27 (AP) — U.S. Air Force police clashed with about 50 Japanese demonstrators shouting "Yankes go home" at Tachikawa Air Base today, forcing them off a runway where an extension project is planned.

Four or five demonstrators were injured. The Air Force said none of its men was hurt. The angry crowd was made up of 50 demonstrators from nearby Sunkawa Village, bolstered by labor union members and local students. They tore down 100 feet of fence and swarmed into the base in an effort to halt a 17-man Japanese survey team plotting the runway extension project.

The Air Force said about 15 air police, wearing helmets and night sticks, waded into the demonstrators after the Japanese blocked traffic on a cross-runway road. They used tear gas and fired tear gas canisters to clear the area. The Japanese survey team and police and tore up survey pegs.




Catholic Church Plans Get Bishop's Approval

Rockville, June 27 (Special)—Construction of a new church for St. Joseph's parish is expected to start in September, according to an announcement by the Rev. H. A. Lepak, pastor of St. Joseph's Church.

Architect's plans for the building have been approved by the Most Rev. Bernard J. Flanagan, bishop of the Norwich diocese.

Construction of a new church for his parish has been the aim of Father Lepak for several years. Conferences between the pastor, the bishop, and the architect have led to final approval of the plans, with completion of the building expected some time next year.

The new edifice will be located on Union St. adjacent to the present church, which is on the corner of Union and West Sts.

Since the church is 125 feet long and 28 feet in height from the floor to the apex and will have a seating capacity of 500 in the nave, with additional seating room in the choir loft.

This will nearly double the seating capacity of the present church, which seats only 260, although its congregation numbers about 400 families, according to the Rev. John S. Koon, assistant pastor.

The building has been designed by N. George Vanovich, architectural architect of Englewood Cliff, N.J. formerly associated with Edward B. Busick, Hartford architect.

According to the chancellor of the office of the Norwich diocese, bids will be sought on the project, with a private bid opening planned.

The architect's plans indicate the exterior will be of pink iron spot brick, with limestone trim. The roof will be of slate shingles. The main entrance will have decorative work of limestone and field stone. A large rose window on the exterior will dominate the interior.






