Army Seeking Custody of GI Held in France

Milling the Algerian in a dispute over payment for two cartons of American cigarettes that McOsker sold him.

The GI's mother, Mrs. Lester McOsker, at Manchester said her son had been in any trouble before. "I'm worried," she said, "I can't believe a thing like this ever happened."

A family friend said she had been given addressees and asked to help find the GI. She said she had written to the American attorney, One James Fletcher, and the fate of his client may not be determined until the U.S. Supreme Court rules in a similar case involving GI William Grady.

A U.S. District Court ruled recently that the government could not turn a GI over to Japanese authorities for trial on a manslaughter charge involving the death of a Japanese woman army scavenger. The government has appealed the decision to the high court.

Army authorities said McOsker had admitted the GI was in self-defense.

New Applications Received by TDC

The Town Development Commission (TDC) met in closed session last night at the Howland Road Estate Office to receive applications for the position of town developer.

TDC secretary, Mrs. Martha Stevenson, said that 15 additional applications had been received since last week's meeting, bringing the total number of applications to 22.

At last week's meeting, applications were screened and five were held for further consideration.

Mrs. Stevenson said that the applications will be given to General Manager Richard Martin for review, and then the TDC will be interviewing the applicants.

The town developer is to be a professional development expert whose job will be to attract new industries to Manchester. Money to build such an industry will be available July 1, when the town's new fiscal year went into effect.

The TDC's next regular meeting is scheduled for Aug. 6.

Accident Victims Spend Good Night

The condition of David R. McConnell, 20, of 82 Beach St., remains unchanged although "he had a good night" according to hospital authorities.

McConnell was admitted to Manchester Memorial Hospital early Sunday morning suffering from compound fractures of the left leg and undetermined head injuries at the residence.

George Miksis, 41, of South Windsor, who had been hospitalized as the result of an accident when Saturday was reported as being comfortable.

The boy was injured in a 2-car crash while riding with his mother and two young sisters. He received cuts and bruises and a bruised shoulder.

Cervini Collects \$602,234 in Taxes

Manchester residents paid about one-seventh of their total tax bill for the year last month, according to Collector of Revenue Paul Cervini.

Payments of \$602,234 were recorded in June after bills went out to 25,000 taxpayers at the beginning of the month. The total bill is \$4,289,250.50 on \$1 million town tax and 24 mills for fire protection outside of the Northville District.

Interest will be charged if a payment is not made by Aug. 1. Part of each taxpayer's bill was due by July 1 if it was over \$20, but a 30-day grace period is allowed. The second payment is due by Jan. 15 under \$20 must be paid by the end of the grace period.

parliament, a government committee then screened the candidates and threw out half of them on general security grounds.

The campaign generated some interest in Alexandria and outlying provinces on the eve of the election. But in Cairo, only newspaper editorials and a few posters paraded about the capital ahead of an election vote coming up.

Twenty persons were reported in one election clash in Alexandria, where loudspeaker trucks toured the city and banners stretched across the streets.

Some six million Egyptians were eligible to vote. All males over 18 were required to cast their ballots in person. Women were permitted to vote in an Egyptian parliamentary election but it wasn't compulsory.

HIGHLAND GAMES SET

Reservoirs Drop From Rain Lack

Lack of rainfall caused the water level in three of the town's four reservoirs to drop this year.

According to Water Department Superintendent Fred Thrall, there was 52 million gallons less in the reservoirs at the beginning of this month than there was on the same date last year.

A decrease in rainfall is the reason, Thrall reported. Rainfall recorded from Jan. 1 to July 1 of this year was 21.63 inches compared with a 21.81-inch average for the 6-month period, Thrall said.

As a result, water storage totaled 22 million gallons on July 1, 1957. On July 1, 1956, total storage was 47 million gallons.
