Greater Draft Call Seen by Dulles in Foreign Aid Slash

Washington, July 17 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles today said that a sharp cut in foreign aid would bring "greater draft calls" and threaten the prospects for a disarmament agreement. Dulles went to the House Appropriations Committee today to urge a \$3.242,333,000 authorization measure setting ceilings on spending abroad that would cut about \$600 million from the amount Eisenhower asked. Congress may cut further in the money bill.

He referred to a racial disorder at Clinton last Aug. 11 after 12 Negroes were admitted to the high school.

Hal Boyle How to Give Life Endless Feeling

New York (AP)—One of the great goals of science today is to make man live longer.

Some people even entertain the notion that a way will be found to permit them to clutter up the world forever.

Rare indeed does a scientist such as Enrico Fermi arise to give a note of caution to these would-be seekers after eternal life.

Addressing an international convention in Rome on the problems of gerontology, Fermi said:

"Old age is a fate we must accept. We gerontologists specialists on old age—must not be asked to bring about a theory on how to achieve new youth. It would be undignified and morally wrong."

There is great common sense in this observation. And to tell the truth, science, for all its victories in enabling man to live out his normal span, has done little really to extend that span.

There may come a time when some magic pill will enable us to run a minute mile at the age of 100, suffer the pangs of a newborn puppy love at 150, and retain some kind of healthy brain in us until we are 400.

But inevitably, be it at 70 or at 570, the pep pills will wear out and so will we. Then we shall die, as all before us have done, foolishly hoping for an impossible fountain of youth.

English Jet Cracks Record

Warton, England, July 17 (AP)—Britain's new fighter, the English Electric P1, has exceeded the existing world air speed record of 1,122 miles an hour, the manufacturer announced today.

The company is unable for security reasons to state the precise speed reached, the announcement said.

The P1 is a day and night all-weather interceptor which is now in production for the Royal Air Force.

Because the flight was not clocked officially for record purposes, the speed still belongs to another British aircraft, the Fairy Delta 2.

Weather Bureau Sees Hurricanes

Miami, Fla., July 17 (AP)—The Miami Weather Bureau said yesterday there is a good chance of one or two tropical storms developing during the 30-day period beginning in mid-July.

In its third experimental 30-day hurricane forecast, the bureau said one of the storms "may develop in the southern Gulf of Mexico. Conditions are expected to be favorable for another to form in the Atlantic during August."

The bureau said as many as five tropical storms have been known to form in the North Atlantic in the period from mid-July to mid-August.

On the average, about one tropical cyclone originates each year during this period and two-thirds of these develop into hurricanes, the bureau said. "They have formed more frequently in the vicinity of the Lesser Antilles than any other area."

The 30-day forecast issued July 17 said there is a likelihood of a tropical storm in the Gulf of Mexico this month but it is not expected to strike the coast of the United States.

So far this month, the only abnormal weather condition has been a short-lived low pressure area which developed over the Panama Canal Zone but dissipated without incident.

Navy Guns Sink Atom Waste Can

New York, July 17 (AP)—Machinists gun fire from Navy planes sank a drifting container of radioactive waste yesterday. The big steel cylinder had menaced shipping in the Atlantic 185 miles southeast of here.

The planes flew out from Norfolk, Va., and strafed the 21-by-8-foot container. It blew up when water poured through the bullet holes and reacted explosively with the 20 tons of sodium inside.

The container was dumped with others Sunday but charges intended to sink it failed to go off. The containers came from the General Electric Co. atomic plant at Schenectady, N. Y.

The waste had a low radioactive level but the container was large enough to cause collision damage and held enough sodium to set off a violent explosion.

Salt Lake City, July 17 (AP) — Radioactive fallout from Monday's atomic explosion in Nevada soared to a new high of 7,000 micro-microcuries of beta radiation yesterday.

The generally-considered safety level over a 24-hour period is 1,000 micro-microcuries.

The Utah Health Department, which obtained the readings from air samples taken on the roof of the state capitol building here, said the fallout could be considered safe because of the short period of time.

The department said the reading Monday was 225 per cubic meter of air filtered. Yesterday at 8:30 a.m., 28 hours after explosion of the Diablo weapon at Yucca Flats, Nev., the reading climbed to 1,825, and a second reading at 10:55 a.m. gave the top reading of 7,000, by 1:30 p.m. the reading dropped to 3,000 and continued downward.

It will be back from the street, on a 15-acre tract, with ample parking space and large playground.

It is expected that federal aid construction funds will be available to defray the cost by some \$240,000.

'Speed Something on Dials'

New York, July 17.—A freedom-loving man who has a "let of fun flying" is the nation's new experimental speed king.

Major John Glenn Jr., Washington, D. C., shot across the country in a Navy jet plane yesterday in a record-breaking 3 hours, 23 minutes and 44 seconds.

"Everything was smooth as silk," the happy pilot said.

Glenn, 38, a rebarbered combat aviator with a bomber's build, hit a top speed of over 4,000 m.p.h. in the old F-100, which he had built.

"Flying at 1,000 miles an hour you don't feel speed as much as you do driving 70 miles an hour on the highway," he said. "Speed is just something you read on the dials."

Glenn achieved his record in an F-100 Chance-Vought Crusader "an average unofficial speed of 726 m.p.h. He covered 2,400 miles on the flight from Los Alamitos, Calif., Naval Air Station to Brooklyne's Floyd Bennett Field.

He sailed through the jet upper atmosphere six miles and 100 feet above the Earth. He beat the speed record at that altitude—470 m.p.h. He shattered the old trans-country record of 3 hours, 44 minutes and 53.8 seconds set by an Air Force pilot last March.

Glenn flashed a wide grin as he pulled off his golden helmet and climbed down from the cockpit of the silver plane. His wife, Ann, and their children, David, 11, and Lynn, 10, were the first to greet him.

Glenn reached into his tan flight coveralls and pulled out souvenirs for the children: a little gold Stinson cat charm, "Here's your superonic knife," and here's your superonic cat, Lynn."

David had given his father his Boy Scout knife and Lynn had given him a little gold Stinson cat charm. "The kids wanted something permanent to remember the flight," Glenn, former New Concord, Ohio, resident, is a veteran of World War II and the Korean War. He has three distinguished flying crosses and 17 air medals.

He said he would like to try the transcontinental flight "all over again tomorrow."

"It's a real kick," he said. "Anything would like to try something like this."

He added modestly: "I had a lot of fun flying the thing, but the real work was done in the planning."

The crucial point in the planning was to provide tanker planes at three points along Glenn's route to refuel his ship. He met them
