

Czech Living Standard Hops Among Soviet Satellites

Prague, July 24 (AP)—The Communist Party of Czechoslovakia is living up to its promise to raise the living standard of the Western colony here in the next few years, it was announced today.

Comparatively well stocked shops offer a wide range of goods from delicacies to cosmetics. Some of the shops carry Western decorating styles.

Spending on food, alcohol and other luxuries is expected to be about the same as in the West, it was announced.

With the exception perhaps of Slovakia, where the red regime has been forcing industrialization, the living standard in the West is the same as in the East, it was announced.

According to latest available statistics, the average income of a Czech industrial worker is 1,200 crowns per month. This is almost 50 per cent more than the average in the West, it was announced.

Eisenhower Seen Lax In Fight for Program

By JAMES MARLOW (AP News Analyst)

Washington, July 24 (AP)—President Eisenhower's lack of political leadership in a fight for a program to build new schools was seen today by many political observers.

It was his second term in January, 1953, that he had no more to say about his political future. This left him free to fight for the program. He has been less than a zealous fighter in one case after another. The latest example is on federal aid for building new schools.

He has been plunging for federal aid to education since his first State of the Union message on Feb. 2, 1953. In 1956 he sent Congress a special message calling for a program to be approved this year.

Shortly before the political convention last summer, the House passed a federal aid bill. Eisenhower's own Republicans had a major share in its death. But a few weeks later, the Republican majority called for an aid program in his State of the Union message to Congress Jan. 10, 1957. Eisenhower renewed his plea for aid for school construction. He followed this up with a special message to Congress Jan. 28, detailing what he wanted.

Now comes the time to demonstrate the House, where the Democrats outnumber the Republicans. The school aid bill again is in jeopardy. It is not clear what Eisenhower requested. It was a compromise of \$1,300,000,000 (\$1) spent over four years in grants to the states. The House bill calls for spending \$1.5 billion over five years. And he wanted more money for poorer states than the House bill provides. There were some other differences.

But this was a school aid bill and the only one that had a chance of passing. How good were his chances before it reached the House floor? Not bright. House Republican Leader Martin (Miss) expressed doubts it would pass. This comes up at a time when the Eisenhower administration is trying to economize, although 21 national organizations asked Eisenhower to give "unqualified and publicly stated support" for the measure.

Arguments by those opposing the bill include: Government interference in a new spending bill; danger of Federal control, and segregation.

Police in New Mexico Seek Killer of Three

Hobbs, N. M., July 24 (AP)—A Sheriff McAdoo said all three men were shot with 22-caliber long. Two El Segundo, Calif., officers, Richard Phillips, 28, and Milton Curtis, 26, were killed Monday with a .27-caliber weapon using shorts.

Third Rocket Fired in IGY Canada Test

FL Churchill, Man., July 24 (AP)—The third successful satellite rocket to be fired from this northern Manitoba launching site soared to a height of more than 50 miles last night.

The rocket was launched just before midnight as part of the United States' participation in the International Geophysical Year.

The latter part of the flight was marked by regular flashes at 10-second intervals as signal grenades exploded from the rocket's nose cone.

A clear sky enabled many residents in nearby Churchill town and Ft. Churchill, 410 miles north of Winnipeg in Hudson Bay, to see the rocket's path.

Officials said it reached a speed of about 3,500 feet a second. It was about 2,000 feet a second when the giant Aerobee II that soared to an altitude of 160 miles July 4.

Another Aerobee was fired Monday night. It climbed about 55 miles above Hudson Bay and was visible at the end of its flight in the light of the midnight sun.

Sacha Guitry Dies in Paris at 73 Years

Paris, July 24 (AP)—Sacha Guitry, one of the great names of the French theater who wrote, produced and acted in more than 100 plays and movies, died today. He was 73.

Partially paralyzed with neuritis, Guitry was a prodigy who performed before Russia's Czar Alexander II when he was 3 and went on to become a French national idol. But he became the target of bitter criticism in World War II when he staged in France and performed before invading members of the German Wehrmacht. After France's liberation, he was accused of collaboration charges and released.

Guitry was born in Russia of French parents, christened Alexander Pierre Georges, and was brought to France in his boyhood. His first play, a one-act farce in verse, was presented in Paris when he was 17. He later adapted most of his stage productions to movies, some of which were shown in the United States. Guitry himself played twice on Broadway, in "Mosses" and "L'illusionniste."

He was also one of the first major French actors to appear on French radio and television. For two years he had directed from his wheelchair and even played minor parts in several films. His last picture, "Royal Affairs in Versailles," opened in New York recently with Guitry playing Louis XIV.

Sense and Nonsense
