### Soviets Name Pervukhin as Trade Official

Moscow, July 25 (AP)—Mikhail G. Pervukhin, denoted in the Kremlin's shakedown last month, has been named the Soviet Union's Communist trade official.

The Soviet government has announced the establishment of a new state committee to supervise economic relations with Pervukhin, 52, and a former first deputy premier, at its head.

The announcement said Pervukhin would be succeeded as minister of medium machine building by E. P. Shteyn. The medium machine building is a key industry of the Soviet Union's atomic industry, and Shteyn has been in charge of the section on peaceful use of atomic energy.

Because of the increasing importance being given to Soviet economic relations with other countries, Western diplomats view Pervukhin's new appointment as evidence that he still is one of the favorites in the Kremlin. Until the recent shakedown, he had been considered one of the top Soviet economic planners.

Pervukhin has been switched from job to job in Nikita Khrushchev's reorganization of the Soviet government. But unlike Khrushchev, Malenkov, V. M. Molotov, Lazar Kaganovich and Dmitri Shepilov, he has not been denounced as a traitor against Khrushchev's government.

When the Malenkov-Molotov group lost their top party and government posts in disgrace at the end of June, Pervukhin was demoted from full to alternate membership on the Communist Party Presidium and subsequently lost his first deputy membership in the first deputy membership, First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan.

A second call from the same voice said: "Tell the mayor we'll get him before he's clocked tonight."

Mayor Willis left the funeral home for his residence about two miles away in the Roland Park section of East Huntington, about 10:30 p.m.

When he noticed a car following him closely, he did not think anything about it," he said, "thinking they only wanted to pass."
