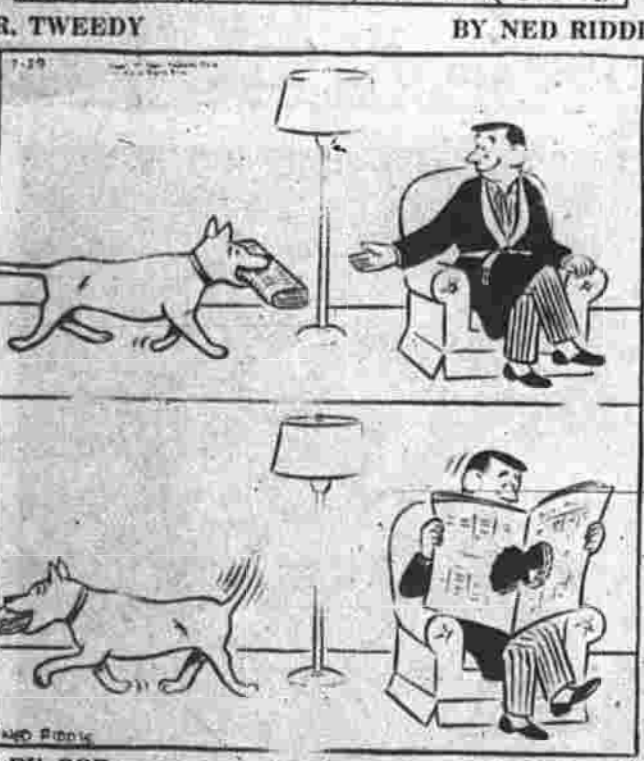

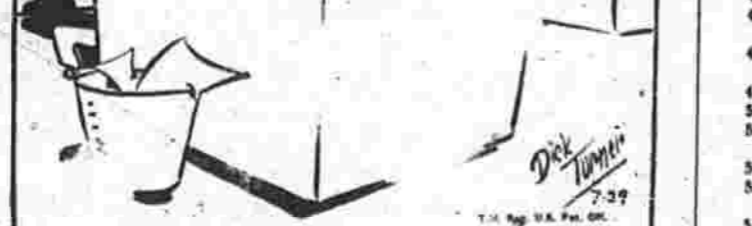

The \$2,500 first prize was his first since 1951 when he won the 1951 tournament. Last year he won \$18,000.

Leopold Waits Word On Plea for Freedom

Chicago, July 30 (AP)—The Chicago American said today it has learned that Gov. William C. Stratton will deny a thriller Nathan Leopold a "no strings tied" prison release but will grant a parole under tight supervision.

The newspaper in a dispatch from Springfield said that Stratton will concur in recommendations that the man pardon and parole board, which so far have not been formed, hold a new hearing.

The American said the Governor will consent to Leopold's parole under supervision for at least one year and that the release could come 30 days after the board holds a new hearing.
