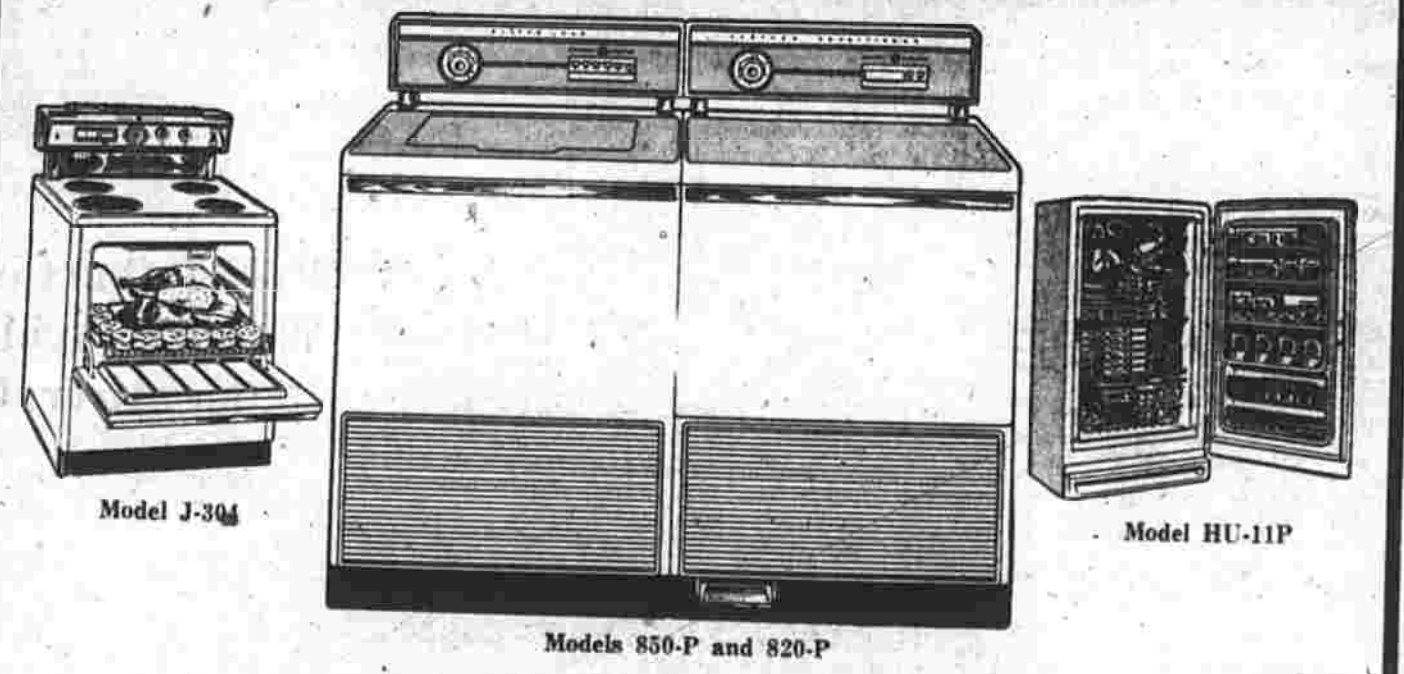

### Rockville-Vernon Builder Ready to Start School

Vernon, Aug. 1 (Special)—Ground-breaking ceremonies for the new high school in Lovell Hill will be held Tuesday at 2 p.m. It was announced today in the office of the architect, the date of the signing yesterday of the contract for construction of the school building, which will be the largest building in the town.

Because of reported ambiguities in its wording, the high school contract was very close yesterday to being signed.

Principal at the signing yesterday, William H. Wood, hesitated to sign the \$1,470,000 pact because it did not contain a provision for the date of completion of the school.

Although both he and Town of Vernon have agreed on 720 days (two years) from Aug. 1 as the time for completion of the school, the contract contains no provision for the date of completion of the school.

North dealer Neither side vulnerable. The national bridge tournament now under way in Pittsburgh is being watched by the experts a few years ago in one of the national bridge events.

All of the best players who held the North-South cards found themselves trying to make four hearts. It wasn't easy.

West led the jack of spades, and the defender took two spade tricks. Then West took the ace of diamonds and led another diamond. South won with the jack of diamonds and had to take the rest of the tricks. This meant that he couldn't afford to lose a trump trick.

Many of the experts fell from grace by leaving the queen of hearts from the South hand West naturally covered with the king, and dummy's ace won. With no clue to the distribution of the trumps, these players led a low trump from dummy and put up the jack.

All too late, they discovered that they still had to lose a trump trick to East. They had not realized that West's king of hearts was a singleton.

A few experts made the game because they have themselves the chance to discover the distribution of the trumps. They began the trump by leading the ten of hearts instead of the queen.

West had to play his king, of hearts, and dummy won with the ace. The only difference was that South king would cover the singleton heart with his king of hearts. South could lead a low trump from dummy and finesse the seven of hearts to make sure of the rest of the tricks.

### Household Airlift Sets Plane Cargo Pattern

BY DOUGLAS LARSEN  
Washington (I.P.A.)—Several years ago Keith Merrill, a retired State Department official, related to him the story of how he had set up a plane cargo pattern to move his household goods to the Virgin Islands. A costly world war, Merrill related his account on the various costs of moving and chartering Pan American planes to lift his possessions in one fell swoop to the islands.

Friends thought he'd gone daff. But today the Merrill airlift has become the pattern for moving key government employees around the world. Thousands of private citizens making cross-country or inter-continental moves have also discovered that in many cases it is cheaper to fly your possessions than send them by conventional means.

Seaboard & Western Airlines, which hauls cargo to and from Europe, showed the State Department that the cost of hauling 40,000 pounds of furniture from New York to Frankfurt, Germany, by air would be \$2,100. Compare that with the \$2,500,000 cost of boat would be \$2,500,000, which includes expenses resulting from the long time boat deliveries take.

But far more important to the air cargo business than family furniture moving is the fact that U. S. industry is applying Merrill's airplane airlift to its freight problems with startling results.

Machine tool makers have become the biggest users of air freight moving cargo. Customers are naturally in a hurry for the machines, and the small amount of water coming into the pond does not almost as much as the cost of shipping after delivery.

Perishables such as fruits and flowers are big cargo items. After that the list is endless and includes clothing, medicines, chemicals, photographic records, dental supplies, perfume, magazines, fertilizers, race horses, candy and fish.
