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# State Drought Damage May Reach \$11 Million

by starting the country's food supply where it is produced, rather than in the areas where it is consumed, has concerned many for some time.

"It would seem only logical, in view of this established policy," Commissioner Gill said, "the National Drought Committee could at least show some concern for an agricultural economy in an area such as southern New England, where food is produced near heavy populated centers."

The designation of Connecticut as a major drought-damaged area, according to the Commissioner is the only way Connecticut's damage can be eligible for state funds at approximately a 25 per cent discount from the large supplies owned by the government. The state feels that this assistance, he feels, would keep many farmers from being forced to liquidate their herds.

Gill worked over the weekend in preparing the report, with Paul S. Dean, assistant director of the U. S. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, and Henry M. Hansen, state-society agricultural leader of Sturms, and Benjamin Brown and Paul Pomeroy of the University of Connecticut.

He has been acting postmaster since April 1956, filling the vacancy created by the death of H. Olin Brown Jr. before he left his position as state attorney general. He was appointed to the post by the Civil Service Commission as eligible for the post.

single person from voting," he said. "Judges, by civil contempt cases, can guarantee every person the right to vote."

"There is no need for criminal contempt without jury trial unless you are addicted and want to punish somebody and get your own private judge to do it."

Johnson said that as soon as the "hotbed" cool down "the sober people will come to the conclusion that we have made a forward advance in the field of civil rights."

He pointed to other sections of the bill which would clothe a professional Civil Rights Investigation Commission with subpoena power from being forced to liquidate their herds.

He said the right to vote section had been improved by adding the right to sue for damages to serve on Federal court judges.

"This talk about the Senate's refusal to wait for a jury trial, having 'filled' the bill is just political propaganda," Johnson said. "The only analysis of the situation does not justify the contention that it weakens the bill."

A high administration official said yesterday Eisenhower administration officials are not sure the bill will pass in the next day or two.

Democrats were quiet about the bill, but some of their leaders made it clear privately they are in the mood to support the bill.

On the other hand, House Republican Leader Martin Dies said he expects the measure to go to a conference committee where he said it will be "dead for this session."

"That will put the whole civil rights fight over until next January, when Congress reconvenes," he added.

"President Eisenhower's Bill," said Humphrey (D-Minn.) president of the National Association of Manufacturers, "is a premature bill of public law."

Both he and Sen. O'Mahoney said that with sincere efforts on the part of those administering it, the bill in its present form would represent an important advance in civil rights.

Sen. A. B. Chandler (R-N.J.) told a television audience (CBS) that the Nation's voters doubt that Eisenhower would veto the bill if the House accepts it.

"I think the President will sign the bill in the first civil rights legislation passed since the Civil War," he commented.

While Eisenhower has protested that the measure is "very effective" in its objective of protecting the rights of the Negro, nevertheless he is not the publisher of something of a step forward in the controversial civil rights field.

Democrats think an Eisenhower veto would wipe out all of the political credit Republicans owe him for pushing the bill.

When the Senate passes the bill, Eisenhower's veto will send it to a Senate-House conference committee. They hope there to knock out a Senate amendment requiring jury trials in criminal contempt cases.

Batista ordered a crackdown on strike agitators and saboteurs as well as police searched the capital for nine men charged with manufacturing molotov cocktails.

Authorities warned that anyone caught carrying arms or trying to impede order in the streets would get the same treatment as rebel fighters with Fidel Castro in the Sierra Mountains of Oriente Province.

blain of love, by political weapons, by passion and oppression" were methods of the more "nations."

"That is a sin against not just the church but against the family of God," he said. "Such sins are not yet abolished from Christendom."

Dr. Fisher, primate of England and spiritual guide of the world, Anglicans around the world, preached at a worship service yesterday held in conjunction with a World Council of Churches meeting.

But he said the council, because of different views about the ordination of women, the ministry, cannot play the role of a "super-church" to act and think.

"So carefully it must walk," he said, "that it does not become a super-church."

He said that theological differences have prevailed ever since the church began in Jerusalem, and that churches today should do just as the apostles did, to talk over their varying views together.

The true principle at a talk was found by faithful discussion of the differences, he said.

George retired from the Senate last Jan. 3 after Herman E. Tamm, U. S. Supreme Court Justice, had said he would not run for a second term. George was known as a conservative in domestic affairs but regarded as an internationalist in foreign matters. In addition to his important work in the Foreign Relations Committee during the World War II and Korean War years, he served as chairman of the Senate Committee on Education and Labor. He was a member of the Senate Judiciary Committee and the Senate Finance Committee.
