An Historic Vote

The Senate last night passed an historic piece of legislation in the civil rights bill and reflected credit on itself in the process. The bill which had the overwhelming support of 79 senators against 19 who opposed it, marks the first time in the dark days of Reconstruction that a significant step forward has been permitted by the Senate in the protection of the Southern Negro's civil rights.

True, the bill does not go as far as the one proposed by the Administration already passed by the House. Its main feature deals only with voting rights and guarantees alleged violators jury trials in criminal contempt cases. But its passage has significance far beyond the provisions of the bill itself. But when the vote came, as voted for it with the exception of Wayne Morse of Oregon, who apparently wanted nothing less than "Bill" cast in his image. Even Florida's George Smathers deserted the Southern bloc to support the measure.

Throughout the debate on the civil rights bill, both sides charged each other with playing politics, and it is true that political considerations played a part in the actions of the Senate. Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas, majority leader, and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey of Michigan, minority leader, were primarily concerned in his expert maneuvering, with holding the Northern and Southern wings of his party together. And in this he succeeded. Sen. William Knowland of California, the Senate's minority leader, who has not previously been identified as a racialist, had his eye on 1960 in his strenuous efforts to get the Administration's bill enacted.

And the individual senators who undoubtedly had at least one eye on the growing political strength of the Negroes when they voted last night. Nevertheless, even the political played reflected credit on the Senate for it indicated that body's responsiveness to the country's demand for a new era of freedom and dignity for the Southern Negro. The differences between the Senate and House versions of the bill will now have to be worked out before it can be sent to the President for his consideration.

Although House members who supported the original bill predicted, when the Senate tackled the jury trial amendment on to the measure, that it was dead for this session, it seems inconceivable that an agreement cannot be reached between the two Houses. It seems equally inconceivable that the two Houses cannot agree on a bill that would be acceptable to the President.

And yet, Ernst today finds himself on the verge of payment, and to conduct an investigation into the mysterious disappearance of the Juan Mares de la Cruz, a critic of the Trujillo regime—an investigation which Trujillo critics maintain can only result in a whitewash of the Dominican straggle.

A considerable body of evidence has been uncovered that seems to link Trujillo to the disappearance of de la Cruz. The Dominican attorney instructor who was last seen walking into a New York City subway entrance on March 12, 1956. Additional evidence suggests that Trujillo agents also had a hand in the disappearance and reported death of an American pilot, Gen. Al Murphy, who was said to have flown a kidnapped de Gallester from this country to the Dominican Republic.

A number of investigative agencies in this country, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the New York City police, are probing the disappearance of the pilot. The New York City police and officials have asked that the Dominican Consul General be refused entry into this country.

Trujillo, however, refused instead, to counter the mounting criticism brought upon his regime by the de Gallester case, he took the highly unusual step of laying out \$100,000 to finance not only private investigations but also good-will public-relations campaign.

sleep, ran from their homes into streets where they gathered in neighborhood groups.

Some workmen were inside the tunnel, but fortunately they were some distance from the opening and were not affected.

A timber 10 feet long and a foot thick went through a wall into the third floor apartment of a building about 75 yards away. Barbara Ann Mayhew, 11, asleep in bed, was showered with debris. She was not seriously injured.

A huge chunk of steel tore out a bay window in a second floor apartment of a South Boston home and then dropped to the street.

John Madden reported the blast blew out two windows from his home in Squantum, about 7 or 8 miles away.

What caused the explosion could not be determined immediately.

Some residents of homes nearby reported it was a near miracle they were not killed. Many said they were knocked from bed, Several went to doctors and hospitals for treatment of cuts from flying glass.

Mrs. Gertrude Young of South Boston said the blast not only knocked her from bed, but also toppled her kitchen stove, spilling oil all over the apartment.

The front of a house on East 8th Street, South Boston, was blown in, either from the force of the blast or debris.

Even a half hour after the explosion, a wide area was filled with acrid smoke.

The blast was at the South Boston entrance of an 811 million tunnel intended to carry Boston's sewage far out into Boston harbor. The Metropolitan District Com-
