Sewer Plant Sum Has \$50,000 Left

The town of Manchester now has about \$50,000 left out of a \$1 million bond issue to build new sewage treatment plant. The balance remaining from the bond issue reported in a statement on the sewage treatment plant construction account made public today.

The report shows that \$55,061 has been spent on the construction contract and \$55,229.18 remains to be paid today.

Some of the remaining \$50,000 will be spent on equipment still to be bought. The rest will go into paying off part of the \$1 million bond issue.

Liner Flu Victims Being Observed

New York, Aug. 14 (AP)—Twenty-nine persons remained under medical observation today for mild influenza they developed aboard a transatlantic liner. Those still sick include 27 foreign exchange students, a bride-to-be and a crewman.

The ship, Arco Sky, docked yesterday with 847 passengers and 278 crewmen. There were no fatalities. All but two cases were among passengers studying to go to this country to attend a year with American students and attend American high schools.

Dr. Morris Greenberg of the city health department described the malady as a mild form of influenza. He said laboratory tests would have to be made to determine if the disease was Asiatic flu, a new type of flu that has swept many parts of the world and now threatens the United States.

Miss Boren, a blonde school teacher, is scheduled to be married Aug. 24 to Don Adams, 29, of Knoxville, Tenn., a petroleum engineer. Doctors assured her the wedding would not have to be postponed.

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Buyers Are Victims Of Own Motivations

New York (NEA) While Ward Cannon has gone home to work on a new book, Madison Ave.—the headquarters of the nation's advertising industry—is still trying to present his first book without gagging.

It is called "The Hidden Persuaders" and describes in minute detail how we are being sold one brand instead of another, one candidate instead of another, one point of view instead of another.

Why, asks Packard (who knows the answers), do cars keep getting longer and longer? Why are men's clothes becoming feminized? How do supermarkets sell 25 per cent more than the shopper needs?

On and on the questions roll. And the answer, according to this study, is because merchandisers, ad men, publicists are applying the findings of Motivational Research.

Psychology is selling. Mr. Packard's psychology applied to advertising. And Motivational Research is the depth men whose philosophy, according to one of their trade journals, says: "In very few instances do people realize what they want, even when they say they do."

You see the point, behind our specific purchases and points of view are unconscious and irrational motivating factors. For example, Packard cites the drive to conformity, the need for social stimulation, yearning for security.

Once these vulnerable points are located, he explains, the psychological hooks are baited and placed in the merchandising and the money consumer who has no way to defend himself.

Under chapter headings like "Marketing Eight Hidden Needs: The Hidden Demand Overlooked: Babies in Consumerism: The Package Deal; etc., Packard points to product after product and campaign after campaign which MR has successfully sold to us.

Well People, Not Products much anymore? Packard said about his findings. "Today, brand is often about the same as anything. By the merchandisers have to sell us as people. It's business and dangerous.

Ready contrivances of his colleagues are waiting to meet working men in the morning mail. A publicity release by a cigar firm, for example, promises that it has hired a good-looking woman to "promote" cigars so that women will buy them and young men will smoke them.

And an item from Blank Art studios who supply much of the art you see in ads explains that they "have been giving a lot more emphasis to the people rather than the product in the ad."

Even qualified market researchers find themselves baffled by what people say about a product before they buy it. Here's a news report

Higher Prices Giving Pain to Car Industry

Detroit (NEA)—You think it's just you've got headaches with rising prices?

You ought to see the rising prices of pain and panic which the possibility of price rises on the \$8 models is causing the auto industry.

For the first time since World War II styling and horsepower are taking a back seat to interest in prices on upcoming new models.

When the complex ingredients in the price pot are served up with the new models this fall the best estimate is that there will be about a four per cent price rise. The '57s averaged seven per cent higher than the '56s.

Try To Hold Price
But the current price ingredients are so explosive that anything could happen, including price cuts on some models. This will give consumers a wider price choice.

The Administration in Washington is applying pressure on the industry to keep any price increases to an absolute minimum or hold the line, if possible. The auto industry is said to hold the key to checking further inflation.

Trouble is, auto makers point out, two auto buyers already have more than enough to worry about. One is the \$8 model, which is being increased 10 per cent per ton and one is the average car. This is an increase of about \$10 per ton. The steel industry is also in a bind. It says that the steel industry has a surplus of about 300,000 tons of steel. This surplus is being used to build more schools and universities.

Number two factor was a two cent per hour cost of living increase and a six cent per hour improvement in factory wages which auto workers got June 1. The improvement factor was an increase in the cost of living. The cost of living increase was about 1.5 per cent last year.

This will end up as an increase of between \$15 and \$20 per car. If early production is about average, figures show.

But these increases just start the price spiral. The car makers say, increased costs to their suppliers, increase prices of tires, glass, other metals and fabrics to \$20.

The most persistent and troubling price problem is the price of steel. A recent national poll of dealers by Automotive News revealed that the high cost of steel is the greatest irritation against the manufacturers. Dealers blamed the relatively low sales of '56s on prices being too high.

For 13 months, dealers around the country have produced some kind of resolution saying that the biggest mistake Detroit made before them indicates that the public is fed up with high car prices.

Probably the most dramatic indicator in the big boom in small foreign cars, selling for around \$1,800. Sales of small cars could be near a quarter of a million units this year, registration figures indicate.

ment five years or the government will have to take over the industry. They blame higher repair and fuel costs, coupled with the fact that their planes cannot carry enough passengers fast enough and far enough to pay for the higher costs.

Delta president C. E. Woodman says "In 1950 we were carrying people in 120,000 planes at 160 miles an hour at an average investment of \$5,000 per seat. Today we are carrying them in \$2 million planes at 470 miles an hour at an average seat cost of \$25,000. This it would seem would justify some sort of increase."

Jet airlines are expected to wear price tags in excess of \$5 million.

Jetliners are expected to be available in 1958.

The International Civil Aviation Organization, an agency of United Nations, in a recent report said:

"Their depreciation and obsolescence are low and their productivity is expected to be much that at suitable load factors, the cost per passenger-mile of jetliners may be lower than that of the latest large piston-engine aircraft."

William M. Allen, Boeing president, predicts that customers won't ride in anything but a jet now that the tried-in jets will be used as fast as they can be produced and the airlines can afford them.

Aircraft manufacturers are in a race, of course, in the airfield position because many of them are getting ready to produce jetliners. It is expected that the Boeing 707 will be in production by the end of the year. The Douglas DC-8 is expected to be in production by the end of the year. The Lockheed L-1049 is expected to be in production by the end of the year.

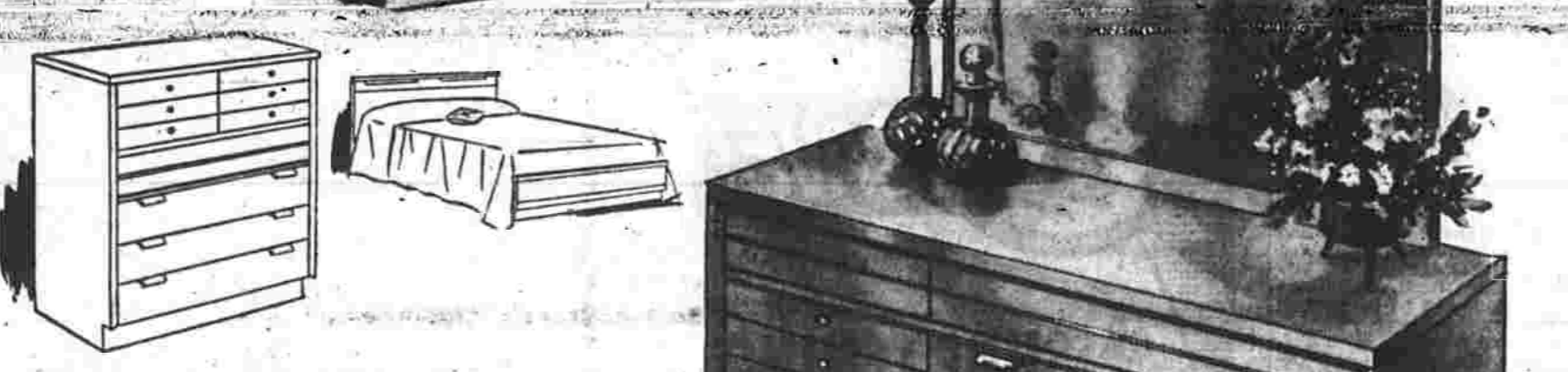
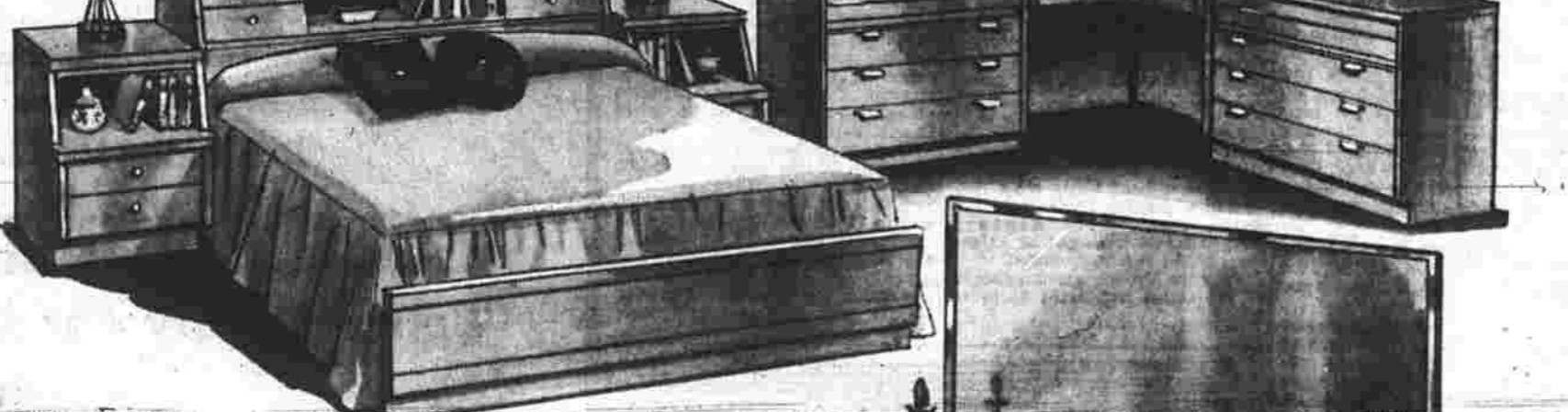
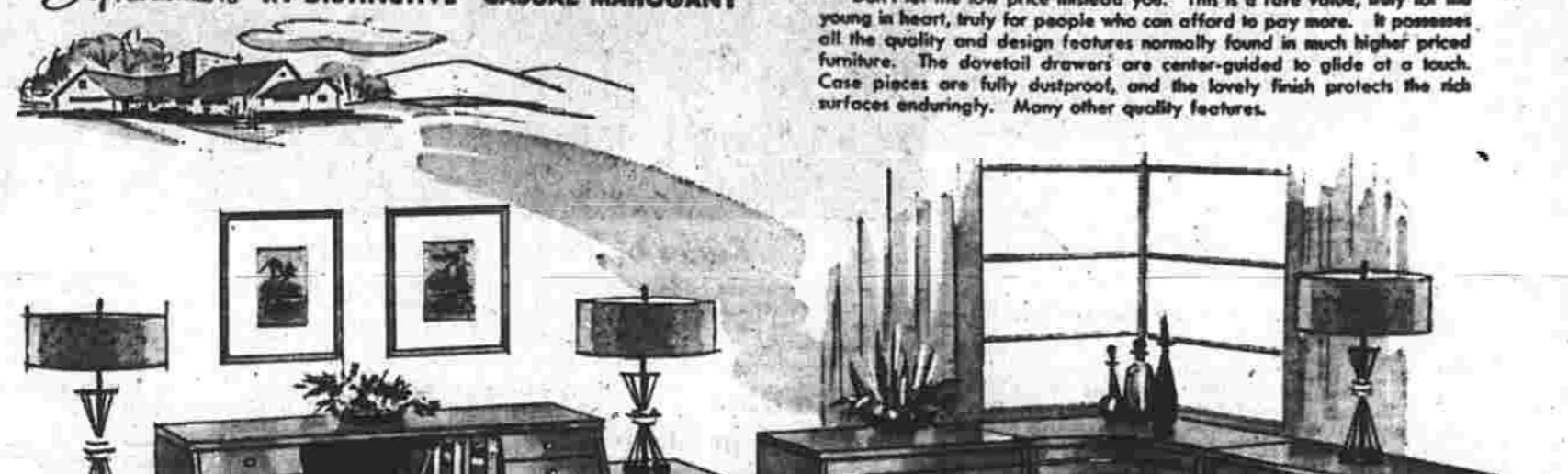
