Howell Cheney Dies; Local, State Leader

His wife later, the town built the school's present plant and in 1914 his name was changed to the Howell Cheney Technical School in appreciation for Cheney's interest and activity in the school. Until his death he was very active and a frequent visitor at school graduations.

Cheney was chairman of the Ninth District School Board from 1910 to its consolidation in 1922. He then served as chairman of the newly formed board for another 13 years. It was during his first year as chairman of the board that Prof. Ayer Vanhook, Manchester's "Father of Education," became the first superintendent of schools.

One of 13 children, Cheney was the twin brother of David Cheney who died in 1919. Cheney's death leaves only two sisters, both still living.

Member of State Board

He was a member of the State Board of Education from 1906 to 1919; member of the Yale Corp. from 1914 to 1918 and a trustee of Mt. Holyoke College from 1912 to 1928 and from 1930 to 1933. He was also chairman of the Board of Trustees of Hartford Junior College since 1928.

Cheney had been named to serve as the Connecticut member of the National Survey of Secondary Education in Washington, D. C.

Cheney served on the Connecticut Economic Council from 1926 to 1934; the engagement of his daughter, Miss J. Regina Barbara Opalich, to Joseph J. Mize, 277 Union St.

Miss Opalich is employed in the Connecticut Department of Manufactures from 1915 to 1916. He was also a director of the National Chamber of Commerce.

He was a trustee of the Manchester Memorial Hospital, the Hartford Institute of Physical Education and the Manchester Savings Bank. He had recently retired as vice president and trustee of the Manufacturers Association of the Horse Business Memorial.

Chaired NBA Unit

Cheney was appointed as a member of the advisory council of the NBA and chairman of the committee on industrial unit in July 1935. During World War II he was a member of the Board of Appeals, Selective Service System. He also served on the National Child Labor Committee in 1914 and was a member of the National War Savings Committee in 1918.

He was a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, the Connecticut University Clubs of New York and of Hartford, the Graduate Club of New Haven, and the Amiable Club.

Sheinwold on Bridge

DRAWING TRUMPS DOESN'T ALWAYS PAY
By Alfred Sheinwold

Even experts sometimes make the mistake of drawing one trump too many. An example comes to mind from a match between Austria and England of a few years ago.

At both tables, West opened the ten of clubs. The play proceeded in the same way for a few tricks. South took the king of clubs, cashed the king of hearts, and entered dummy with the king of spades to discard the diamond on the ace of hearts. Next came a trump to the ace.

At this point the two declarers parted company. The Austrian drew another round of trumps with the queen. He then cashed the ace of clubs and ruffed a club in dummy.

Clubs Not Established

Unfortunately for the Austrian player, the clubs were not established. He could get back to his hand with his last trump, but then he had to give up a club trick and the ace of diamonds. In fact, he was lucky to be down only one trick.

The English declarer avoided a drawing that fatal third round of trumps. Instead, he ruffed a new club with 4 in dummy's hand of trumps. Only one was left to lead a third round of trumps to his queen.

Now South could take the ace of clubs and give up a fourth club to the nine. South still had trump and two good clubs, and could therefore easily make the rest.

Rockville Housing Situation Study; Rent Shortage Seen Serious

Rockville, Aug. 22 (Special)—The Chamber of Commerce is embarking on a study of the housing situation in this area. Ralph H. Gibson, president, revealed today a civic meeting to study the night Gibson was empowered to appoint a committee to make the study. Gibson termed the shortage of rentals here "very serious" and said the Chamber plans to make the study realistic known in an effort to handle the growing problem on the local level, rather than with federal housing.

Gibson noted that the Chamber, since its reorganization last December, is "now thinking ahead instead of five years later." He cited the "entirely new attitude" regarding the Chamber.

Proposed Improvements Needed

The Chamber will also establish a program to create a better use of existing business property by conducting a campaign of remodeling, rebuilding and erecting new buildings, Gibson said.

The Board of Directors of the Chamber will on record this week. Favorable news already has been maintained high standards in trade and the public health.

The Board's statement was prompted by a request from Edward H. Zahner and Edward H. Schaeffer to back the plumbers attempt to have the city adopt licensing requirements.

Chamber President Ralph Gibson stressed that while the Chamber can urge high standards, it cannot suggest ways to enforce such standards.

Response to Survey

A labor survey recently conducted by the Chamber of Commerce was considered very successful by Gibson. He said that 300 firms polled showed any interest in the area of high standards. The survey was conducted to find out what the labor market is in this area and what jobs were available. He said that 100 firms were sent to 100 workers of Rockville, Vernon, Tolland and Ellington.

As a result of the survey, the Chamber office has already supplied two local employers with lists of workers. The executive secretary reported that about 30 per cent of the persons returning questionnaires would consider working full time in Rockville. The survey showed that the average mileage of residents working out of town is 25 to 30 miles per day.

The replies indicated that more wives from Vernon work than from the other communities surveyed. Of all the wives that work, 60 per cent of them have jobs locally.

It was also learned through the survey that about 50 per cent of the working group would train for better positions if opportunities were available.

Another interesting statistic gathered from the survey shows that 34 per cent of the Rockville residents who replied rent their homes, while in Vernon, the home renters are only 10 per cent. The Ellington total of home renters was 20 per cent and in Tolland, eight per cent rent their homes.

Vernon has the largest percentage of new residents, according to the survey, with 50 per cent of the replies coming from persons who had lived there less than five years. In Rockville, the figure is 36 per cent. In Tolland, 22 per cent and in Ellington, 28 per cent.

Girard Trial Judge Known as Stern Man

Manassah, Japan, Aug. 22 (AP)—A tall, gaunt man of 40, with a penetrating stare through the streets of this quiet city tonight, a shopping bag swinging from one arm.

Neighbors and passers-by bow as he passes. He returns their stares but does not stop to chat. In the tiny 4-room house where he lives alone he prepares his evening meal as a handsome German shepherd dog wags from beneath a chair.

The man is District Judge Yuzo Kawachi, who will preside at the trial of SP. 2-C, William S. Girard, accused of fatally shooting a Japanese woman on a U.S. military firing range last Jan. 30. The trial opens here Monday.

Unmoved by pressure, Kawachi has become known as a stern man who follows the dictates of his conscience and who does not yield to pressure. He was a measure of fame by refusing to bow to Japanese army pressure while serving as a civilian adviser to the Japanese during World War II.

"Don't think I am a misanthrope or a stick after seeing how I live here," Kawachi said with a smile during an interview.

Every weekend he goes to his Tokyo house and visits his wife and three children. He says he has to live in Tokyo because of the children's schooling. This way of life is as painful to him as anyone—particularly for a judge who must live with dignity and a low salary.

Kawachi has been district judge in this rural city some 10 miles north of Tokyo since 1927.

"A judge is not a diplomat and it is not good for a judge to stay long in one place where many enemies with questionable motives try to befriended him," he said.

Surprise Decisions

Kawachi, who reads widely and plays chess for relaxation, enjoys a high reputation in this province. In the past two years Kawachi has handled three famous manslaughter cases. In 1935 he surprised many people by sentencing to life imprisonment a young Japanese who killed his step-father and step-mother and sisters. The death penalty had been generally expected.

In 1936 Kawachi again surprised the province by sentencing a murderer to death. The prosecution had demanded only life imprisonment. Last July 1937 Kawachi sentenced three men to life imprisonment for the murder of a man—technically the same charges as that faced by Girard.

"Human life is precious," the judge told that man.

Judge's Past Fair Trial

Of the Girard case, he said: "I have not found all the facts of the case. . . what I can say is that I am determined to carry out a fair and just trial. I have asked prosecutors and defense lawyers not to engage in rhetorical arguments not pertinent to the case which serve only to delay the procedure. They agreed not to do that."

After a few minutes of meditation, Kawachi spoke softly, as if to himself.

"Human life is precious. . . no one is supposed to get away free after killing a man—no woman without provocation. Unless there were full extenuating reasons."

"I have not found out all the facts of the case. I plan to go out to the scene in the firing range Sept. 6 and 7 to carry out an on-the-spot survey. But do you think the U.S. Army orders its men to shoot and kill a woman without challenge?"

Japanese police in this city have quoted Japanese witnesses as saying Girard "enticed" the victim, Mrs. Naka Sakai, 46-year-old small pitcher, before he shot her to death with an empty cartridge fired from his rifle grenade launcher.

Kawachi, answering his own question, said: "I don't know enough about U.S. Army regulations. . . I don't know. But in case his commanding officer told Girard to shoot her, does an American serviceman have to obey orders without questioning? I don't know. I must find out."

Kawachi graduated from the law school of Tokyo's Keio University in 1920, became a judge the same year. In 1924-25 he was a civilian administrator in Java, Indonesia, supervising court proceedings in the Japanese occupied area.

"After the surrender I was kept in Indonesian prisons until February 1947 when I was repatriated," he said. "I was not a war criminal though."

At the Girard trial, Kawachi will be assisted by two associate judges, Tetsu Saitama, 49, and Takaaki Hirata, 30. There is no jury.

Tolland County Commissioners To Meet Tonight
