

The years later, the town built the school's present plant and, in 1944, its name was changed to the Howell Cheney Technical School in appreciation for Cheney's interest and activity in the school in appreciation for Cheney's interest and activity in the school graduations.

Cheney was chairman of the Ninth District School Board from 1905 to its consolidation in 1932. He then served as chairman of the newly formed board for another 13 years. One of 12 children, Cheney was the twin brother of David Cheney who died in 1919. Cheney's death leaves only two slaters, twins, still living.

Member of State Board

He was a member of the State Board of Education from 1996 to 1919; member of the Yale Corp. from 1914 to 1935 and a trustee of Mt. Holyoke College from 1912 to 1925 and from 1930 to 1939. He was also chairman of the Board of Trustees of Hartford Junior College slince 1939.

In 1930 he was named to serve as the Connécticut member of the National Survey of Secondary Education in Washington, D. C.
