# Russia Makes Bid For Airline to U.S.

Members of the Soviet delegation in the United Nations.

The TU104 is the only jet passenger liner operating commercially in the world. It flies from Moscow to Leningrad, Prague and points in Siberia.

Nearly 500 people, newsmen, photographers, Air Force personnel and Russian officials, lined up to see the aircraft as it landed at the big Soviet transport center in Leningrad. The plane was greeted by a band of 1000 men and women, and a 1000-foot-long red carpet was laid out for it.

The TU104 made a smooth landing at 10:45 p.m. American pilots estimate its landing speed at 128 miles an hour. A lighted path guided it across the tarmac to the disembarkation point.

# WHO Backs Fluoridation

Geneva, Sept. 5 (AP)—A report by the World Health Organization (WHO) says only fluoridation of drinking water can halt tooth decay on a large scale.

The report declared the "effectiveness, safety and practicality of fluoridation as a means of preventing dental caries (cavities) is now established. It added that no other method for applying fluoride can at present substitute for its general addition to drinking water as a public health measure.

The report was based on a survey of fluoridation programs in 17 countries, some of them in progress more than 12 years.

The survey showed the "prevalence of dental caries in permanent teeth of children decreased some 60 per cent" in the report said.

"Furthermore, children who benefited from fluoridated water had well formed teeth, aesthetically pleasing and more resistant to caries than the teeth of other children," it added.

"Fluoridation of drinking water has been the subject of much controversy in many U.S. and Canadian cities.

order his headquarters and ordered police to arrest. He fled before later was seized by the rebels and his headquarters surrounded.

An aide to the Army commander was reported killed in early shooting.  
Castro's tanks and other heavy weapons were used. One Cuban plane was shot down. It has been reported that the Cuban Navy planes were circling the area. Navy headquarters in Havana said it had no information of any outbreak in Cuba.

Castro, a city of 60,000, lies about 200 miles southeast of Havana and is a big port shipping sugar.

The Cuban Navy is reported to have a strength of about 7,000 officers and men. It has two aircraft carriers, two escort vessels and some smaller craft such as minesweepers. The Army has about 15,000 officers and men.

The fighting came only a day after President Fulbright had congratulated the 5th anniversary of the first coup.

The Cuban struggle, which has been in and out of power several times since 1933, was an Army struggle which he seized control of the government from the hands of the so-called "Bergans" Revolution.

In yesterday's anniversary speech, Batista had announced that he was determined to finish his four-year term in 1958 next year. He promised to turn any revolutionary military force over to the government.

Most of the speech was devoted to an attack on Fulbright and Carlos Prío Socarras, ousted by Batista in 1952. Batista accused Prío of attempting to perpetuate himself in power and said his regime was ridden with graft.

He denounced rebel leaders Castro as a "mafioso Communist entrepreneur" and Fulbright as a "Communist agent."

Castro, a young lawyer, organized his revolt from Mexico and landed in Cuba last December. He lost many of his men in subsequent fighting.

He has been in and out of power several times since 1933, was an Army struggle which he seized control of the government from the hands of the so-called "Bergans" Revolution.

The Batista forces have reported that the rebels, while possessing for the moment, claim that the government men often plant the bombs just to place blame on the rebels.

At least 18 bombs have exploded in Cuba in the past 24 hours, 11 of them in Havana.

The bombings coincided with Cuba's celebration of Armed Forces Day.
