men," as they call it. They are prepared to accept integration simply as the lesser of two evils.

Others shrug and say, "You can't fight the U.S. government. Why try?"

Still others, businessmen who are thinking of the future development of Arkansas, are anxious to regain the nation's respect.

Each of this sentiment came as a result of "Black Monday," and the two days that followed—three days that shook America.

Who were the people who gathered in front of Central High School that morning?

There were some hard-nosed haters, looking for Negroes and "Yankee supporters" to slug—provided the odds were right.

Some were merely curious, wanting to see what would happen. And some were crusading for "hicks."

Women—Miss Frankie

Soon after dark, reports began coming in of fights between whites and Negroes. One white man was hit on the head with a brick and suffered concussion. Police fired on a speeding car full of Negroes. The men in it were injured. There were reports of gang fights.

The Arkansas Gazette, Little Rock's morning newspaper, which has been fighting Frankie since he first called out the Arkansas National Guard, kept all the lights on at night, fearing reprisals.

The hard-core segregationists who first retreated away from classes came back last week. Then, soon after classes began, they tried to start a mass walk-out. They left the building themselves, urging the others to follow. The snowball didn't roll.

Sixty-nine students were suspended last week. Most had joined in the walkout. Some had attacked two Negro boys. Superintendent of Schools Virgil Blumson is prepared to crack down hard, he says.

But what of the future? The troops won't stay in Little Rock forever, will they?

Either way, South was down a trick.

The trouble started when South decided to ruff the hand as a clinch. It was indeed an easy hand if the trump broke normally. If both opponents follow, South can well afford to give up two trump tricks. If West shows out, South can later get to dummy for a finesse through East.

With all of the trump actually in the West hand, South would still have taken out insurance against just that risk.

soon as proper safeguards can be set up to prevent surprise attacks.

The United States wants to keep the disarmament talks going in the Geneva disarmament conference, which includes the United States, the Soviet Union, Britain, France and Canada.

The United States feels there is no cause at this stage for a general, despite wide differences which still persist between the western powers and Russia.

Lodge was followed by Japanese Ambassador Kishi, who formally presented a proposal for disarmament of nuclear weapons.

The committee adjourned after hearing Lodge and Kishi. Earth scheduled another meeting to hear the Soviet Union's main declaration.

International control of long-range missiles and space satellites was mentioned in the western plan outlined in London. But reduction of the resolution, which is sponsored by some 20 free world nations, was held up after the launching of the Soviet Earth satellite to put more emphasis on this point.

Justice Daily added that no subsequent legislation has been enacted to make Section 92 conform to the changed procedure of "filling" minor court judgeship offices.

The basic question argued today was the same as that argued in the special session on July 24—whether four judges appointed by Governor Ribicoff in 1955 or four judges be named this year to replace their terms.

The 1955 appointees involve Wesley G. Gifford, Harry H. Kaminaky of Hartford, and Selig Schwartz and Paul W. McMahon, both of Meriden. The 1957 group includes Jules Katz of Manchester, Ross W. Hartwig Jr. of Hartford, and William A. Jacobs and Francis J. O'Brien, both of Meriden.

In his arguments this morning, Atty. McCormick held that the 1955 appointees were named to uniform terms of four years, and that they should be replaced before July 1, 1958, by action of the General Assembly. He pointed out that under 1953 legislation, minor court judges' terms run for four years.

Atty. Ribicoff, however, argued that the constitutional provision for the filling of minor court judgeship offices is not applicable to the 1955 appointees, so far as certain appointees are concerned. He said that the terms of the 1955 appointees are still governed by the 2-year constitutional limitation.

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The Doctor Says

Loneliness is One of Man's Most Tragic Afflictions

By EDWIN F. JORDAN, M.D., Writer for NEA Service

It seems to me that the part played by loneliness in the development of certain physical and mental disorders has never been fully studied.

There is a well known fact that solitary confinement is one of the worst punishments which can be inflicted on human beings. But it is also possible to be lonely in a crowd, and from lack of appropriate social contacts.

Many people who are physically fit and who are not afflicted with any definite physical ailment would fall in this class.

It seems to me that loneliness may sometimes be a factor in the development of alcoholism and similar behavior on which society frowns. In other words, desperate loneliness may lead one to seek relief by developing symptoms justifying attention or by socially unacceptable activities.

Then if loneliness is an affliction, it is an extremely common one.

I believe, too, though it is hard to prove, that this frequently explains some of the so-called psychosomatic illnesses. Many people and pains which cannot be blamed on any definite physical ailment would fall in this class.


