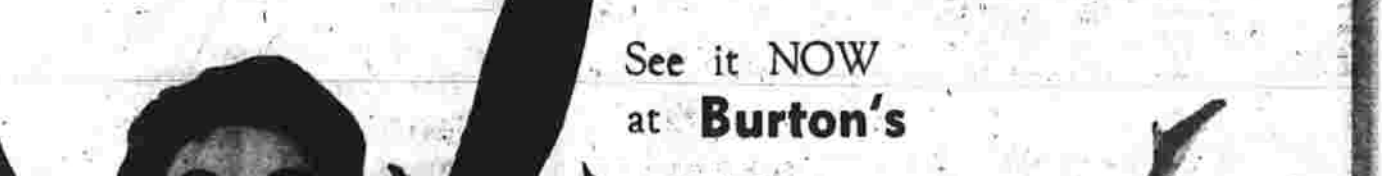

Copper Prices Fall As Living Costs Rise

New York, Sept. 11 (AP)—The demand for copper was even higher in western Europe where the industrial boom was rising high. The supply of copper was put in 1957 by strikes in the United States, Rhodesia and Chile. In all, world supplies are 100,000 tons less than the demand. American producers and smelters are having a hard time maintaining a price that would permit them to meet the demand. They will ask Congress for a four to six cent tariff to go into effect when a price per pound of copper would let them hold the price line here and remove the threat of more mines cut back or closed.

Copper's price has risen from 15 cents a pound in March 1956 to 25 cents a pound in New York. It is now 25 cents a pound and is being sold in the London Metal Exchange for 25 cents. At the start of 1957 the price was 20 cents.

Big consumers still appear to be buying of their stocks while supplies mount around the world. How did the wide swing in prices in the last 18 months come about?

Mining men admit that the top price was partly a fluke and they expect a steady decline in 1957 and early 1958 came about that way.

Demand was growing as American living standards rose and business set off its record expansion drive and the government was buying for its defense stocks.

In order to place the ordinance on the ballot, it must be signed by 1,100 signatures representing five per cent of the voters registered in the town. The signatures must be obtained by Sept. 25.

A spreading movement to overturn an ordinance to lease town land to the Country Club for 30 years was underway today.

The movement mushroomed after Town Directors voted five to four to pass the ordinance last night. The Young Democrats announced their opposition to the ordinance, and they will circulate a petition for its repeal.

Today, Chairman Steve Cavagnaro announced that a special meeting of the Country Club will be held by the Democratic Town Committee Friday night at the Municipal Building.

At the same time, members of the "Taxpayers League" will be discussing the referendum at a meeting of the Country Club.

Speaking against the ordinance, Leo Dwyer asked why no one knows what the property is worth and why the amount of land to be leased is so large.

Dwyer also asked why the directors are leasing the land to a private club for 30 years at a fixed rental of \$1,000 a year.

When the General Assembly authorized the town to lease the land, the bill passed in the legislature without any referendum provision. This is the only case in the town's history where the people of the town have not yet had an opportunity to decide whether they want to lease the land to a private club or anyone else.

Dwyer said he is in favor of putting up to a referendum the question of whether the people of the town want to lease the land to a private club for 30 years at a fixed rental of \$1,000 a year.

In order to place the ordinance on the ballot, it must be signed by 1,100 signatures representing five per cent of the voters registered in the town. The signatures must be obtained by Sept. 25.

At the same time, the directors will be asked to sign a petition for a referendum that will be filed in the town clerk's office within 10 days after an ordinance is passed, the petitioners must obtain 1,100 signatures representing five per cent of the voters registered in the town.

"The purpose of the investigating committee is not to take sides but to act as a fact-finding body," Leamer said. "Right now, we want to know more before jumping in any direction."

Meanwhile, additional stockholders meetings are in the offing. Leamer and Rottner are scheduled to meet with the board of directors next with a 2-member committee representing a group of non-employee stockholders.

They also said that the Pratt & Whitney company's support of its interest were "legitimate."

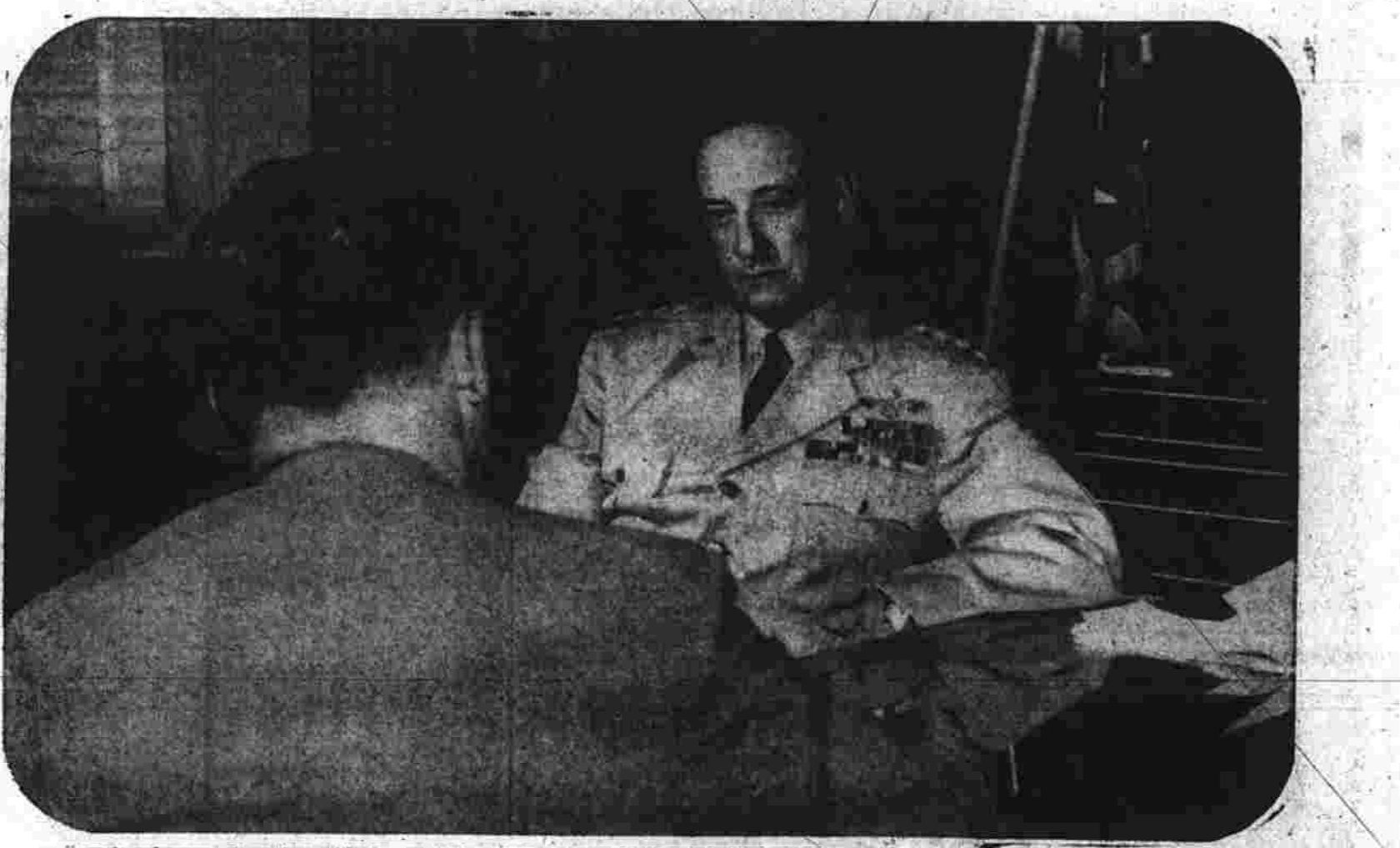

Under the drought-relief proposal, which won support of the State Farm Bureau, farmers would be allowed a 50 percent deduction of the cost of fertilizer.
