Counting LOCATES MISSING JACK

One of the best hands of the National Team Championship, held a month ago in Pittsburgh, was played by Tobias Sheinwold, well-known New York expert. When counting showed that the normal play was unlikely to work, he found an abnormal play that did work.

West opened the king of diamonds and then shifted to the five of clubs. Sheinwold in his hand was a trump to force out the ace.

The Amvil Charms
 It is no very pleasant development on the international scene that Russia is now engaging in a "heating wood or drawing water" used to be the fairly exclusive property of some military boys on the American side of the thing.

For the greater part of the cold war, it was always some impetuous, broad American war-bond, or some publicity-seeking publication, or a combination of both, which would produce a burst of how we could destroy Russia. During the same period, it was very seldom that Russia, whatever it may have been planning and thinking, would engage in the public game of threat. No doubt, Russian maps showed American cities ringed for destruction. No Russian military blow-drooled publicly over the number of casualties an attack on America could produce.

But now Russia, too, has come to this sort of thing. Perhaps it is the tests of the intercontinental missiles. Perhaps, with a little knowledge of psychology as ourselves demonstrated during the period when we thought that military dominance of one kind or another would produce a Russian diplomatic yielding, Russia now thinks it has a "situation of strength" which will make us turn weak and reasonable at the conference table. Perhaps Russia, by portraying the horrors of war, is trying to spur world sentiment for disarmament.

Anyway, it is now Marshal Verkhovnin, commander in chief of the Soviet Air Force, who is quoted at length in Pravda on the subject of the next war, and who claims that many major American cities are now within reach of Russian hydrogen bombs, who suggests the United States would suffer 50,000,000 casualties in such an attack, and who attacks the Russian prospect that they could deliver such damage to us without a "situation of strength" which will make us turn weak and reasonable at the conference table. Country Club (1)
 The ideal solution for the problem of the Manchester Country Club has been in the past to have purchased itself out of the hands of the City of Manchester. The club itself was unable to master the deal and was forced to purchase itself on the short notice that was given. The town was not satisfied that it had legal protection for the watershed land involved in this land owned by somebody other than the town.

What happened then was that the town bought the whole tract, one section at a time, for the park and recreational purposes, and the other section of it under the heading of park and recreational purposes. These were the legal designations of the purchase. But it was widely acknowledged, as the town voted in favor of the purchase, that the town might dispose of much of the land purchased, by lease or sale to the Country Club, for some thing, and by sale of portions of the tract which might be valuable for office building or high class residential purposes for another. Such potential sales, with an eye to the long term lease, designed to preserve the town's ultimate control of the land, and also to offer the club some long-term security in its site.

The town's lease proposal followed the club's purchase proposal in one important respect. It moves the club off the more valuable park and recreational land to the lower-valued watershed land. And under the lease, it is under its own purchase offer, the club would proceed to construct itself a new course.

The town's lease proposal has now been shaped into an ordinance, which has been passed by a party vote of the Board of Directors, and which is likely to be the subject of a referendum for which petitions are now being circulated.

There are certain arguments for and against the lease ordinance, as it has been adopted, which we intend to examine in later discussions.

Meanwhile, one largely negative thing has to be said. The dealing between town and club long ago left the realm of common sense. And the most ridiculous part of the situation is that, although every investigation of the proposition of having the town operate a municipal course has come up with a negative finding, it now seems inevitable that whatever proposition is finally approved will have the result of moving the Country Club off an established course and leaving the golf course in the hands of the town which doesn't want to operate it.

The town has no immediate plans of any kind for use of the land involved. The town doesn't want the holes for anything. The only "waiting" involved is that a few of our more vocal citizens are pushing the Country Club off the land, and

51 Years a Railroad Man

"It is a tradition in our industry that a good man and a good railroad are long-time companions." These words were spoken last week by George Albert, president of the New Haven Railroad to 11 "New Haven" employees who have shared 5000 years of combined service to the line.

The men, each of whom has devoted at least 50 years to his trade to the New Haven Railroad were honored at a dinner in New Haven where they were given gold life-line pins and pins.

Among the honored "old-timers" was Harry Milburn of Andover, now agent at the Manchester Depot-Milburn, 74, is in his 52nd year with the "New Haven." He began railroading back in June 19, 1906, as a track walker in Bolton.

Track-walker
 "I used to walk about five miles east toward Andover, and return every day, checking rails and keeping close watch for rocksfall at the North and South points along the way. I was only 23 then." Milburn said as he sat in his cubby-hole at the Manchester Depot. He lived in Bolton in those days, but has spent the past 33 at an Andover resident.

Much of his railroading has been spent around this area, in Andover, Williamstown and East Hartford. His longest stretch was at the East Hartford tower where he worked for 16 years as a signal operator until June of this year when he was assigned to Manchester.

Clicking Music
 Asked what his greatest experience as a railroad man was, Milburn replied, "Well, during my 51 years everything went along smoothly and safely, but I must say the best memories I have are of the old telegraph. I learned telegraphy in a little shack up in Bolton during my first year on the line. It didn't take me long to learn how to send, but receiving was something else again. It took me about six months of hard work to learn how to receive with any kind of speed."

Milburn sat at an old beat-up desk, a ring-arm telephone at his elbow and smoked a cigarette. His eyes dimmed a little when he recalled, "I think we lost our greatest telegraph man in the '30's when our telegraph was replaced by telephone. I was up in Andover when they came in and I felt good. I'll continue to work, I'll give up something, but my mind is on my '30's telegraph."

At the dinner in New Haven, each of the old-timers was given a gold life-line as a token of the railroad's appreciation. The class is different than just any life-line. It is a replica of an old steam engine. The type of engine Milburn remembers best in all his years with the "New Haven."

"This means more to an old-timer than if they had given us one with a diesel engine," he'll say proudly. "These diesel run smoother and they're more powerful, but you just can't beat the old steam locomotive. At least we like to think so."
