### SEATO Foe Grabs Control of Thailand

"Everything is fine," said Phao who commanded the 40,000-man police force. "There will be no trouble because Marshal Sarit is my friend."

A heavy guard surrounded the airport as Phao awaited his plane. Phao, a wealthy man, is going to the Buddhist priesthood or leave the country.

Diplomatic sources said, meanwhile, that Sarit had promised that Thailand will not change her foreign policy and that all treaty obligations will be met.

Sarit said foreign lives and property will be protected and that he wanted SEATO to keep its headquarters in Bangkok.

The Army radio made repeated broadcasts calling for Phibunsongkram, once Sarit's partner in power, to give himself up. The Premier was said to have been ordered to demand by Sarit and 45 Army supporters that he resign.

The Premier was last seen going to the palace to report to King Phumiphon Aduldet on the political crisis.

Bangkok radio broadcasts insisted the coup was inspired by the need to give expression to the will of the people following the government's changing of elections last February.

**Head Small Majority**

Phibunsongkram's Mangalaha party won a small majority over seven opposition parties and independents in close, hotly contested parliamentary elections.

Fading man, high among political leaders, Phibunsongkram proclaimed a state of emergency last March.

Marital law was declared at 1 a. m. Army announcements, made at 2-minute intervals, said Army, Navy and Air Force units had been dispatched to government buildings, post office, cable and telephone centers according to plan to prevent disruption.

Sarit's action climaxed a week of political turbulence and mounting pressure to oust Phibunsongkram.

Sarit has been the financial backer of Bangkok's most anti-American newspaper, Sam Buri, which editorially is opposed to SEATO and is friendly to Communist China.

Struggles for power are an old story in Thailand. Most come are bloodless. There rarely is any shooting. An exception was the kidnapping of Phibunsongkram by naval officers in 1951.

The Premier was spirited aboard a warship. The Army and Air Force bombed and sank the warship but Phibunsongkram escaped safely by diving overboard and only in his underwear.

After Phibunsongkram's rescue by the military, a 4-man military junta took over with the premier as the front man. The real power at that time were reported to be Sarit and Phao.

Sarit and Phao had long been rivals but they worked together with Phibunsongkram to keep the political opposition in check.

The crisis was set off last month when Phibunsongkram ordered cabinet officials to sever all outside business connections. The order was believed prompted by foreign criticism of governmental corrup-

### Committee Heads Set by President Of AL Auxiliary

Sarit's demand that Phibunsongkram resign came as a surprise. He had given repeated expressions of support for the Premier, but disapproval in high Thai military circles had been growing.

Phibunsongkram, who served collaborationist term as premier under the Japanese in World War II, had shown a strong leaning toward the West since visiting the United States 12 months ago. He had encouraged American loans and had brought U.S. military advisers to this country.

### Water Study, Fluoridation Before Board

Questions about the town's water supply may be asked Tuesday at a meeting of the Board of Directors tonight.

Consideration of a survey to find new surface and underground water sources is on the Board's agenda.

Fluoridation of the water supply will be brought up by Republican Director Paul Marx.

The Board will meet at 8 o'clock in the Municipal Building hearing room.

A water survey by professional consultants is being suggested to the Board by General Manager Richard Martin, a former director of the State Water Commission. It might cover the whole town or the Globe Hollow property alone, he has said.

**Chamber Backs Study**

The need for professional study of the water supply in the Globe Hollow purchase area, was mentioned in a report made by a Chamber of Commerce committee on Country Club use of the property.

"We feel that it is impossible to make an honest and intelligent recommendation as to sale or lease of Water Department lands until a survey of the needs and potential water demands of Globe Hollow, and especially the Taylor Reserve, have been made," the Chamber committee reported in July. The Taylor Reserve is part of the 1,000 acres bought by the town from Cheney Brook in 1956.

Director Marx, who suggested that the Board consider fluoridation of the water supply, said today that he expects to bring it up tonight. The Board voted Monday on Aug. 6 to study the feasibility of fluoridating the town's water.

Other items on the agenda include a request for downtown businessmen who property adjoins the west side of Farrell St. Businessmen whose property adjoins the west side of Farrell St. are willing to pay for the walkway.


The Board will also consider the resignation of Benjamin Cheney from the town's insurance advisory committee and a \$5,000 transfer of funds to the sewer department.

move restrictions on the size of milk bottles, now limited to a maximum of one quart.

"Distribution of milk in larger bottles should be permitted to reduce and increase consumption of milk," the Governor said. He added that Connecticut is the only state that limits the size of milk bottles.

"The Republican leaders conference yesterday indicated there would be opposition to this measure from 100-150 dairy farmers."

The Agriculture and Finance Committee held a joint public hearing last Thursday on all dairy farm legislation.

The drought caused an estimated \$9 million damage, with \$5 million of that borne by the 3,000 dairy farmers in the state. They produce more than 400 million gallons of milk annually.

The number of dairy farms in the state has steadily declined in recent years. In 1945, there were 4,000 dairy farms in the state. Last spring, just before the drought started, there were 3,000.

State Republican Chairman Clarence Baldwin said recently that while some farmers would like to be helped to slaughter their herds, the majority would prefer to keep their herds.

The dairy farmers saw their situation worsen as the drought withered the dry crop.
