Vernon, Sept. 18 (Special)—A 24-hour coverage of the town-city debate over "inequities" arising from the annual town budget hearing of the Board of Finance last night. 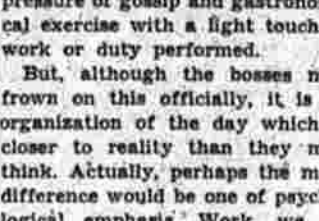

Teacher's Ex-Students Hold Regular Classes

A retiring Boston University professor, Edward A. Post of Sharon, Mass., who achieved national fame as a result of his "Chips" status last June, says he has discovered a new frontier in teaching. His unusual methods were brought to public attention two years ago when he rounded up a class of his former pupils after they had returned to the University. "Charles River campus for about a year. Instead of disbanding after a roomful of lectures and reminiscences, the class prepared to organize on a permanent basis. It now meets in my study every Saturday morning during the academic year at 10:30 a.m., in the University's Faculty Club. Some meetings have already been held. It is an unusual class in many respects. Instead of breaking up after an hour, the members sit at long tables in a service room of a nearby restaurant, while discussion is yammered over coffee cups. Many linger long after the luncheon is cleared away, often till the class goes out and until 8 p.m. The class presents a cross-section of the profession, its members include psychiatrists, newspapermen, publishers, certified public accountants, businessmen and teachers. Each one present contributes to the topics under discussion, usually relating it to his own life experience. "It has been a great education for me," Professor Post said with a twinkle. The class has already gained considerable local fame. Many people have inquired about it and some were disappointed when they learned that membership is limited to those who have been among Professor Post's students and graduates at Boston University. One student remarked that he had never continued the classroom discussions with his wife under the supper table—so persistent was the inspiration. Two facts seem to emerge from the comments of those who met with Professor Post. One was that instead of former classroom lectures and written themes, the pupils preferred to participate warmly in classroom discussions. "Secondly, these discussions are a way of being subjectively and personally significant to the 'teacher'." But all indicated that, more than the teaching technique, it was the personality of Professor Post,

'Propaganda' 'Echo System' Used by Reds

Moscow, Sept. 18 (AP)—An "Echo System" of propaganda has become an important Soviet weapon in the cold war.

It consists of bouncing a propaganda point back and forth like a ball between the Kremlin and the Russian press.

The system works equally well on a variety of other subjects.

The campaign against the United States report on Hungary was perfect ammunition for the echo plan.

The London disarmament talks produced an almost endless supply of topics.

At times the Cairo press has been used as an echo—and Cairo comments on Kremlin statements have been bounced back to the Soviet public.

Sometimes an Indian newspaper produces just the type of reaction which fits the system.

Even more often Indian editors contribute an editorial which fits the Soviet pattern and it too is included in the reports which go bouncing back and forth between the Soviet press and that of its Communist neighbors.

With some additions of the system. Then back it bounces to the Soviet Union again and a fresh version is distributed to the public.

The purported American "aggressive conspiracy" against Syria was a perfect ammunition.

It began with an announcement in Damascus, where Syrian leaders said the United States was plotting to overthrow their government.

Moscow picked up the story and issued a flood of editorials, and articles each one stronger than the last.

Then Peiping's Jen Min-Jia wrote a demand for "an immediate end of the United States conspiracy against Syria."

This bounced back to Moscow where it could be promptly published as another blast against American imperialism.

Esquimos Living In Plastic Igloo

Ottawa, Ont. (AP)—Even snowshoes aren't snowshoes anymore. An Eskimo family of three in Canada's Arctic is living in an igloo made of plastic foam.

"It is an experiment," says J. I. Nicol of the government's Northern Affairs Department. "Next year we may build a larger type snowhouse, divided off into rooms."

The plastic igloo was set up last summer on Baffin Island. It provides accommodation for the Eskimo family accustomed to the close quarters of a 15-room igloo made of snow.

A camp-type stove will heat the igloo up to 80 degrees. But the house won't melt or ice over inside and lose its natural insulation.

Like all igloos it resembles a large overturned nesting bowl. It is made of light-weight styrene, complete with a door and a door-knob.

Light comes through it in a similar type of foam plastic is being used this summer in construction of two houses at Probiher Bay. These dwellings, 16 by 24, make use of plastic foam panels faced with asbestos board—a type of sandwich panel to insulate inside pieces between posts and beams of pre-cut lumber.

The Eskimo family and a single government staff officer at Probiher will live in the new building this winter.
