Phone Charge Hikes Granted

Hartford, Sept. 20 (AP)—Starting Saturday, the Southern New England Telephone Co. will put into effect a statewide increase in all types of telephone rates, to give the company an increase of \$7,490,000 above estimated revenues for 1957.

In the greater Hartford area, the rate for long distance calls will be increased 10 percent. The rate for local calls will be increased 5 percent.

In New Haven and Manchester the present rate is \$5.25, the company asked \$5.75. In Bridgeport, Old Greenwich, Waterbury and Stamford the present rate is \$4.00, the company asked \$4.25.

In Bristol and Willimantic the present rate is \$3.25, the company asked \$3.50. In New London, the present rate is \$4.00, the company asked \$4.25.

In Wallingford, where the present rate is \$2.00, the company asked \$2.25. In Middletown, the present rate is \$1.50, the company asked \$1.75.

New rates for private, 2-party toll-free lines, \$3.00 and \$4.00. Bridgeport, Fairfield and Trumbull, \$2.00. Private toll-free lines, \$2.00.

The rate for extension phones is increased from 75 cents a month to \$1.00. The rate for long distance calls is increased 10 percent.

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Faubus' Lawyers Walk Out From Injunction Hearing

Little Rock, Ark., Sept. 20 (AP)—Attorneys for Gov. Orval Faubus suddenly and dramatically walked out from the injunction hearing against the governor today after declaring they do not recognize the jurisdiction of the U.S. District Court.

Their walkout came immediately after U.S. District Judge Ronald N. Davies rejected their motion to dismiss the government's petition for injunctions commanding Faubus to stop interfering with the integration of Little Rock Central High School.

William J. Smith, Faubus' personal attorney, said "As far as we are concerned we're through."

With that, Smith and the Governor's other attorneys, Tom Harvey and Kay Matthews left the courtroom and entered an elevator.

The hearing continued Judge Davies called for witnesses to be reviewed.

The ancient issue of the right of individual states as against that of the federal government appeared for the first time in an argument.

The motion for dismissal was made by the Governor's attorneys in the first hour after the critical Civil Rights lawsuit began.

Dr. Harry N. Jones' decision was known to Gov. Theodore G. Bilbo, representing the County School Board which had promised him full support if he wanted to return his son to the one-room school.

Dr. Jones has kept his son home from school since a mob of whites drove past his home. Strickland was through when word of the school's refusal to accept the presence of Dr. Jones' son on Sept. 11, Dr. Jones said.

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Lawyer Asks Court Bar Hoffa's Election

Washington, Sept. 20 (AP)—Federal District Judge James H. Ladd today asked the court to bar Joseph P. Kamp, attorney for James H. Hoffa, from participating in Hoffa's election to the U.S. House of Representatives.

Hoffa, who was arrested last week on charges of racketeering, is running for the U.S. House of Representatives in the 11th Congressional District of New York.

Kamp, who is a member of the New York State Bar, has filed a petition with the court asking for Hoffa's election to be set aside.

The court has previously ruled that Hoffa is ineligible to hold office because of his conviction for racketeering.

The court has also ruled that Hoffa's election to the U.S. House of Representatives is illegal.

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### Lawyer Asks Court Bar Hoffa's Election

is confident of election despite the charges against him.

The court suit was alleged that Hoffa, Beck and others have "furthered or influenced a common effort or conspiracy to rig or improperly tampered the convention election."

The suit accused the Trustees' leaders of seeking to "pre-arrange its outcome by fraud, duress or stratagem, as well as by intimidation, coercion of threats and by other irregularities."

Major incidents to the suit were Beck, Hoffa and the union's entire executive board, which was accused of knowingly denying union members their democratic rights under the union's constitution and failing to punish recalcitrant leaders.

"Instead," the suit said, "they have submitted to the domination of dictatorial leaders who, with the encouragement, connivance or permission of defendants, imposed themselves on local union membership, imposed dictatorial leadership on their own members, who were of other ill repute, who permit no regular or free elections within the said local, who control the funds of said local without accounting and without the knowledge of its members, who have installed a system of bookkeeping and financial records which is grossly fraudulent and which constitutes as well as sound trust practices."

Hoffa fired a double blast at AFL-CIO opposition, his secretary and threats to disown the "Communist."

"It's up to the delegates to this convention to decide who they want for general president of the Teamsters Union, and no one else has anything to say about it," Hoffa said.

**Plot and Counterplot in Play of Clubs**

By Alfred Sheinwold

Today's slam contract depended on the play of the club suit. Any good player would make the slam, unless he happened to be opposed by an even better player.

West opened the ten of diamonds, and South won with the queen. South drew two rounds of trumps, cashed the top trumps, and ran the rest of his top diamonds. He was then ready to lead a club. When South finally led a club, he intended to finesse dummy's nine. He hoped that this would lead to the king or queen of clubs. If so, East would then be helpless. East would be forced to return a club up to dummy's ace-king, or any other return would allow declarer to discard a club while dummy ruffed.

West declines South.

There was nothing wrong with South's plan. There was also nothing wrong with the inventiveness of the West player. West could see what was going on, and he came up with a play that deceived South.

West simply put up the king of clubs on the first play of that suit.

Declarer naturally won in dummy with the ace of clubs and got to lead with a trump in order to hand another club toward dummy.

This time West played the seven of clubs. He thought about it, and finally decided that West had started with K-Q of clubs. South therefore put up dummy's jack of clubs. This lost to the queen, and back came another club to West's hand. This play defeated the slam.

Forbearance is the only virtue that worked out what West was doing. The fact remains that he was deceived, as most players would be. West had made his normal play in clubs. South would have fulfilled the slam contract without any struggle.

The drama in San Marino had its first act yesterday when the Communists, facing a defeat in the grand council parliament, issued a decree dissolving the cabinet. The factions since the Hungarian uprising were crushed by the Russian tank divisions.

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# The Fabulous Ford Family

60 million dollars was the price Henry Ford had to pay to gain sole ownership of the company he started. It was money well spent, for the next decade, Ford was able to create the dynamic empire which was to play a dominant role in the automotive industry and in the life of the world. This installment of "The Fabulous Ford Family" recalls what happened when every second car on an American road was a Ford.

Henry Ford made up his mind to get rid of the other stockholders in his company, no matter how much it cost him, because the position in his hands was a great idea that would produce a profit for the stockholder who owned it.

The last straw, as far as the stockholders were concerned, was Henry's plan to build the vast River Rouge manufacturing and tool and steel making center at Dearborn. As Ford visualized it, the net profit of more than \$100,000,000 would be carried down the Rouge where blast furnaces, foundries, open hearths, steel mills, and an array of manufacturing plants and assembly lines would perform the whole process of turning the iron into the steel.

Among the leading stockholders were the Dodge brothers, John and Horace, who had taken a 21.90 percent share of the Ford company in its early days as payment for their Detroit machine shop. The Dodge brothers had brought in to Ford the idea of paying out the company's profits as dividends instead of spending them on the building of the Rouge and, after three years of litigation, they won. Oddly enough, when Ford lost the court decision, he was forced to pay himself \$11,700. He was the company's biggest stockholder.

Getting rid of the Dodge and the other few remaining backers

wasn't easy because naturally they didn't want to sell an investment that was bringing them 500 per cent dividends. But Old Henry came up with a plot. He announced that 26-year-old son Edsel, president of the company and head of the Ford Motor Company, was going to start another business that would produce a bigger car than the Model T. The stockholders became frightened, and sold out. Old Henry had to raise up \$60,000,000 in a hurry to pay them off, but he did it by over-riding his dealers with cars that they didn't want and selling tools and spare parts from his factories. Then, with nobody breathing over his shoulder, he went back happily to the building of the Rouge, his grandson and namesake, Henry Ford II, now the president of the Ford Motor Company, in 1920 as first public appearance in 1920 as a chubby little boy of 3 in a heavy coat.

No Christmas Tree  
Now the Ford family was a rich dynasty. It had not happened until late in Old Henry's life, but when it happened, it happened big and fast. He was a poor man, 40 years old when the Ford Motor Company started in 1903. At Christmas, two years later, Edsel wrote a letter to Santa Claus that was found among the papers at Fair Lane after Old Henry and Clara had died. "Dear Santa Claus, I haven't had any Christmas tree in 12 years," the letter said.

Twelve years after the letter was written, the family-owned Ford company made a clear annual profit of more than \$100,000,000. Edsel's children not only had a Christmas tree but a live Santa Claus surrounded by toys and live reindeer at Santa Claus Workshop in the woods at Fair Lane. Old Henry tried hard to make up for what Edsel had missed as a child. When Edsel was 21, he was given a Christmas tree in the house at Fair Lane in 1912 because he couldn't get in or out of the house at 68 Edison Ave. in Detroit without being passed by panhandlers and job seekers. At first he bought land at Grosse Pointe in Grosse Pointe Woods, but various Grosse Pointe owners were carefully guarded and shrewdly while they were growing up. 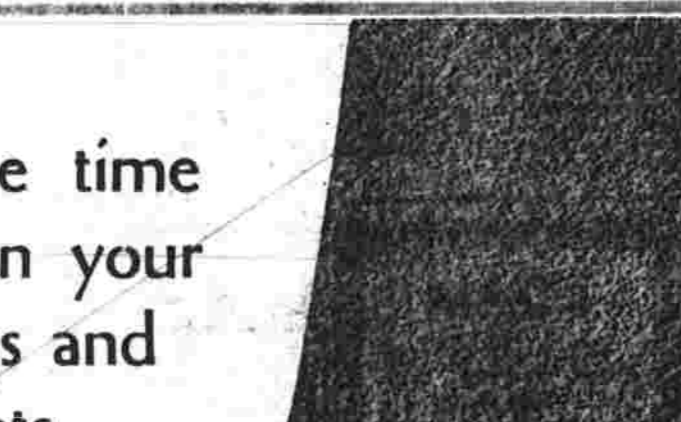

## Yanks Accepting Ticket Requests

New York, Sept. 20 (AP)—Mail orders for Yank baseball tickets now are being accepted, according to a spokesman of the club.

The spokesman stipulating that only applications from the club's accepted home territory and city admission tickets will be sold by mail. There will be no over the counter sales.

Tickets will be sold in two sets per customer with each set consisting of four tickets for the first, second, sixth and seventh games, scheduled for Yankee Stadium.

Price of two box seats for each of the four games will be \$24 and for two reserved seats \$20.80, both including federal and city admission taxes. Add to each order must be a \$1 fee for mailing and handling.

Ticket orders will be addressed to Ticket Manager, Yankee Stadium, the Bronx, N. Y., and must be accompanied by certified check, bank's cashier check, U.S. money order or express money order made payable to the New York Yankees.

No telegraph money orders will be accepted. Standing room tickets at \$4.75 each may be secured in any quantity for single games by mail or at the stadium.

All remaining standing room tickets, as well as 14,000 bleacher seats at \$2.10 each, will be sold at the stadium on the day of each game.
